HILL TALK

Things that go "bump" in the night!

The kitchen table was always the center of our household, especially when we had guests. Children loved it when relatives and friends came to share a meal and visit. When the table was cleared, the adults pushed back their chairs, sipped their coffee, and started talking.

We listened at the usual starting topic about the weather and animated discussions forecasting the severity of the coming winter, made plain by how wide the bands on the wooly caterpillar were or how much white was on the skunk's skins this year. That information with the "Farmers Almanac" factored in, told us all what to expect! With the weather taken care of, memories would come to the fore and we loved to hear the antics of our parents and relatives when they were young. Laughter would fill the house as funny things were remembered.

Finally, as the evening wore on and people became tired, a new atmosphere seemed to take over and then weird stories would begin to emerge about strange happenings. In the light of day no self respecting adult would own up to a belief in ghosts and whatnot, but in this setting all were believers. We youngsters sat quiet; eyes wide, as these stories were told, leaving many of us with a lifetime belief in such things!

First of all, I must say that I have a very scientific bent to my nature. As a young man it not only made ghost-talk ridiculous but it interfered with my ability to practice any relationship at all with God. Religious teachings in those days also didn't help as the age of the Earth was put at about 4300 years and when I walked down into the Letchworth gorge I could surely see that it was a lot older than that! I was very comfortable in my belief system until I bought a home for my parents at #9 Fayette Street in Brockport.

Not staying there much myself, I listened to stories about ghosts and strange happenings with a jaundiced mind and placed these stories amongst the fables I had heard around the kitchen table as a kid. When my mother passed we were forced to move in there because my father was getting too old to care for himself and I had a teenage brother to take care of.

As we raised our family in that house things began to happen; strange things, really weird things, some of which were: My teenage brother had some friends stay overnight. When they went down the stairs late at night to sneak outside and do who knows what, they met a lit apparition coming up the stairs! It passed through some of them and gave them a weird feeling. Needless to say, they never stayed overnight again! One of them would sit in a corner when he visited so a ghost wouldn't pass through him! One upstairs bedroom became uninhabitable because anyone sleeping there would feel someone breathing on their face in the middle of the night. Lights would turn on over and over when you turned them off. If one corner of the cellar was disturbed the cellar door would smash open with a loud bang!

It is strange how people get used to the weirdest things! We began to view this entity or entities as good things that would warn us if the house caught on fire or other danger threatened us. That changed when we smelled a strong gas odor coming from the basement. RG&E were called. Meanwhile, after getting everyone out, I opened the cellar windows from the outside and placed a fan in the cellar doorway to keep the gas from building up. The RG&E arrived and produced what I think he called a "snifter" and checked around the gas pipes in the cellar. He said that everything looked fine and there was no gas leaking. He started up the stairs as I lit my cigarette lighter and held it near the large intake pipe. A six inch flame shot out from the fitting and I yelled for him to come back. He said I could have blown both of us up and I retorted that if I hadn't done that the whole house would have blown up when the pump kicked on. The large collar fitting had been unscrewed but there were no marks on it!

Our idea that this was a beneficial entity was gone and we proceeded to sell the house with some difficulty as people would sense something when they walked in. A single man and his mother bought the place. We didn't share our experiences with them because we had read that our young children could have been the catalyst that attracted things like that and also knew they would think we were just a little "flaky" in the head.

The mother died shortly after they moved in and the young man died in the fire when the house burned down! I don't know if "spirits" caused that tragedy but I do know that every house we have lived in since has been thoroughly prayed over before we set foot in it.

So my scientific mind used to say to me that all of these things must have a logical explanation with good scientific principals behind everything that has happened. But my scientific refuge has steadily melted away! The latest theories about the nature of the universe are the "string theory" or the "ring theory" where there exist at least eleven dimensions! Our limited brains can only see or imagine four of these dimensions leaving much of the universe a complete mystery to us and allowing a lot of space for our God, Heaven, and the spirit world.

Who can say for sure then that there are no ghosts, goblins, and things that go Bump in the night?

STUDENTS VOLUNTEER TO TAKE CHARGE OF SCHOOL SAFETY

Thirty students at Holley Elementary School have been working hard to ensure that their school is a safe and comfortable environment for learning and having fun. The Safe School Ambassador program is in its fifth year and this year, 30 fifth and sixth graders are participating.

Ambassadors are selected by teachers and fellow students then have to apply by writing an essay and getting parent permission. Once accepted, they must go through two days of training in the fall. Over the two days, students participate in various activities that help them get to know each other and build trust between them, and role playing games to give them practice seeing, identifying and reacting to mistreatment situations. Then throughout the school year, they meet twice a month – once as a group and then in smaller groups or "families" to discuss situations they encountered and how they reacted to them. The family facilitators are Teachers Tricia Draper, Leigh Onisk, Karen Quaranto, Lynnette Short and Sue Thornton, and School Counselors Wanda Farrell and Micaela Lauer.

During a recent group meeting, the ambassadors took turns wearing a "tool belt" that prompted them to think about different bullying situations and tactics they can use to diffuse the situations. The students are not asked to step in the middle of a situation and be the police, but to be a shaper of social norms.

HOLLEY COUNSELING AND TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENTS TEAM UP TO HELP STUDENTS UNDERSTAND THE BENEFITS OF HARD WORK

The Counseling and Technology Departments at Holley Middle School have teamed up to create a unit for eighth grade technology students to make them more aware of where money comes from, adult financial responsibilities, the benefits of education, and setting goals for their own education and careers. "In Technology 8, we talk about engineering and potential jobs in the technology field, so it seemed like an appropriate setting for School Counselor Amanda Zimmermann to join us for a couple of classes to talk about career planning," said Teacher William Wedgwood.

In the first session, students completed a "money pie graph" to indicate where they get their money and sources of income for adults. Then each student wrote down an item they would like to buy, how much it costs, how they would earn the money to buy it, and how long they would have to work to earn enough money. "As eighth graders, the students are of an age where they will be getting their first job," said Zimmermann. "The students came up with some really creative ways to earn money and many realized that once they earned the money, they would probably want to save some of it rather than spend it because it would have more value that way."

In a second session, classes worked with the web site www.showmethefuture.org to create a whole new identity including occupation, income, married or single, children or not, and more. Students had a virtual checking account with a register, which contained the money they earned as their new identity. Then they were able to make choices, like the

kind of house they'll live in and what they're going to eat, based on their identity. Every choice costs money, which was deducted from the money in their checking account. The trick to the game is to see if they can make ends meet and still have some cash at the end.

"Many students shared that they were not aware that people paid so much money in income tax," said Zimmermann. One class talked a lot about health insurance and the choices they might need to make in order to have it. "In the end, many students felt encouraged to go to college because it would help them earn a higher salary and be able to pay bills more easily, which led to conversations about starting to look at colleges in ninth grade."

Their teacher said the assignment is a way for the older students to share with the younger ones, and that it is less intimidating for them to practice their presentation skills in front of a young audience.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER REPORT CEO Melissa Ierlan

requested Attorney Schubel clarify interpretation of the town zoning ordinance in regard to the fire and burned structure at the Dodson property on Holley Byron Road. The adopted Resolution to demolish the structure upon engineer inspection was referenced; Attorney Schubel felt that a public hearing regarding the property needs to be held and suggested the CEO inform any recorded lien holders of the hearing as well. CEO was informed that personal service of the hearing is preferred but if you can't locate the owner to exhaust the mailing options to prove notice was sent and post notice on the property. Town Clerk informed of the numerous mailings to the owner that have been returned undeliverable by the post office, including the tax bill. Attorney Schubel stated the need to again send notice to the same/only mailing address on record for the property owner. CEO reported receiving calls from contractors, wanting to bid for the demolition job; CEO was instructed to maintain a list of names and phone numbers regarding such until after the public hearing. Upon questioning, CEO Ierlan confirmed that there was no insurance on the structure at the time of the fire. See notice on front page of this Gazette for hearing information.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

Larry Swanger, Superintendent reported time spent plowing and sanding the roads. The Highway Crew has also started patching potholes. The 2009 fourth quarter water readings are complete and bills will be mailed next week. Superintendent Swanger reported that six people have hooked up to Public Water District No. 9; Superintendent will contact the Village of Holley regarding any deadline for the private line serviced homes to hook into the Clarendon water district and be disconnected from the village water. It was confirmed that Thomas Estates is serviced as Clarendon Water District No. 1; that the water for this District is supplied through the Village of Holley.

Superintendent Swanger informed that a resident on North Manning Road always has a problem with flooding on his property where the natural drain is;

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that sometimes water goes out over the road. The resident gained permission and has contracted to have a ditch put in on the land to help with the issue.

Resident Pat Gigleo questioned action regarding the Historical Society's concerns regarding changes at the dark corner of Church Street and 31A. Superintendent Swanger reported contacting the NYSDOT; they said they would 'look into it'.

<u>SUPERVISOR REPORT –</u>

Richard Moy, Supervisor referenced the Town Clerk Annual Report as submitted for 2009 and compared the reported annual income paid to the NYSDEC for Sporting Licenses sold at \$24,038.86 to the Town revenue for license sales at \$656.09. Supervisor Moy reported ending the 2009 year with slightly more money than anticipated and Congratulated Legislator Dave Callard as the new Chairman of the Orleans County Legislature and Legislator George Bower as Deputy Chairman.

nan. CORRESPONDENCE – County Health The Department has sent notice of concern with issuance of building permits prior to a percolation test and sewage disposal system permit being issued and the issuance of Certificates of Occupancy or temporary C of O's prior to a final inspection letter from the Health Department. The Town has received \$27.60 from the Falls Railroad PILOT payment for 2009. Corneles Engineering has requested Health Department waiver for the required distribution field 50% expansion allocation for the Akeley Landing Senior Apartments. CEO Ierlan explained that the project plans include a double sand filtration septic system that will be costly to install. The waiver will allow the system built without the required room to expand if there is a problem with the system. CEO confirmed that if the filter fails there is no room for repair, everyone will need to vacate and the system will have to be completely removed and replaced; no questions asked. The Health Department has sent a copy of the letter to the town so both agencies are covered in the situation. It was said that the Health Department typically grants variances in such instances, but that this is a brand new system and

slightly unknown; that with the money being spent, the Health Department wants it clear that if a problem arises, the system needs to be removed and replaced. CEO reported a call from an Akeley Manor tenant that complained their water smelled like septic; the health department is checking into the complaint.

Supervisor Moy reported notice from the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation in that the Butterfield Cobblestone House at 4690 Bennetts Corners Road in Clarendon has been added to the State Register of Historic Places. The nomination will now be forwarded to the Keeper of the National Register in Washington, D.C. A quarterly status report for the Town Clerk Office Grant funding awarded in 2009 has been received, even though no funding has yet been paid to the Town. Amount budgeted for the award is \$15,199.

Upon request of Superintendent Swanger, Chatfield Engineers has prepared a map of the town's water systems, indicating the location of 17 sample stations. Request has been sent to the Orleans County Health Department for consideration of revising the sampling plan to provide a more representative system sampling.

Monica Beck, Church Street resident, has sent a letter to the Board requesting re-appointment to care for the Town Hall flower gardens; for the 2010 season. Kingdollar Lawn Care submitted a bid to provide services for the 2010 season. The bid includes four Pioneer Cemeteries, Water Tower lot, the triangle lot on Upper Holley Road, Clarendon Town Park and the Town Hall grounds . A & K Lawn and Garden has submitted a bid for 2010 season mowing services. The bid includes the Town Hall, Town Park, Water Tower site, and 4 Pioneer Cemeteries. Supervisor confirmed these appointments will be on the March agenda.

The NYS Office of the State Comptroller has sent notice of the capital project threshold allowed without Comptroller approval; it is \$677/year. Supervisor explained this to apply to the town's proposed water project; that the debt charge on residents' tax bill plus the cost of water needs to stay below \$677 annually or it will need Comptroller

approval. NYSDC has renewed the Keeler Construction Co., Inc. mining permit for the Chugg Road pit. A copy of the permit has been provided to the Town. The Orleans County Self Insurance Committee will hold it's quarterly meeting on 1/25/10. Supervisor Moy is on the committee and will attend.

OLD BUSINESS -

The Town Board adopted an amended Procurement Policy, indicating purchasing limits for departments without Supervisor/Town Board approval.

Lengthily discussion was held regarding water district parcels given hardship status. Supervisor Moy presented a sample report prepared by the account clerk showing the monetary impact hardship parcels would have on a district if allowed after construction. Examples were given: If Water District #9 lost 5 parcels to hardship status, the per parcel charge would raise from \$382 to \$500/year. If Water District #8 lost 4 parcels to hardship status, the per parcel charge would raise from \$409 to \$465/ year. Supervisor Moy suggested the Board consider eliminating any hardship parcels not only for new water districts, as already approved, but to include present water districts. It was clarified that those already receiving hardship status would retain it. It was stated that intent is for a parcel to retain the annual charge if a tap is installed on the property, even if the parcel, initially with a house on it, demolishes the house and the lot becomes vacant. If a roadside service tap was installed, a full annual charge will remain on the parcel. Board members reviewed that the cost per parcel in any water district cannot be increased above the amount originally offered to the residents at the public hearing. A motion was passed to amend the adopted Resolution for discontinuing Hardship Status to include all water districts, future and present.

Supervisor Moy presented information for the next possible public water district, proposed WD#10. Areas being looked at include: Bennetts Corners Road - from Taylor Road, north to the Town of Murray boundary line; Taylor Road - from Bennetts Corners Road, east to the Countyline Road; Upper Holley Road - from Clarendon WD#3, south to one lot past #5467; Lake Road - from WD#6, east to Holley Byron Road; Holley Byron Road - from Lake Road, south to WD#2; Holley Byron Road - from Glidden Road south to Boots Road. Cost per parcel has totaled \$753.43, which is over the Comptroller's threshold and would require Comptroller approval. Supervisor's meeting with Jeff Smith of Municipal Solutions informed him that Clarendon's annual debt service charge is inexpensive compared to other towns, who pay anywhere from \$1200 to \$1600/year on their taxes. Jeff Smith is researching a funding possibility through the government program, Rebuild America. If approved for Water District #9, it may lower the cost by 35%. If WD#9 is approved, application will be submitted for WD#10. The program ends December 2010. Supervisor Moy reviewed that Clarendon's income is too high for grant funding eligibility. See front page of this Gazette for notice of

meeting.

Supervisor Moy reported receipt of six bids from different companies on a new phone system for the Town Hall and reviewed the bids aloud. The existing system is out of circulation and can not be repaired if there is a problem. Board members requested Supervisor Moy do additional research prior to accepting a bid. Action tabled to February meeting.

<u>NEW BUSINESS</u> –

The Town Board adopted a Resolution designating the ceiling cost for the Town's payment of 2010 employee medical and dental insurance, approved contracting CEO Services for 2010 with Melissa Ierlan, authorized agreement with HV Audit, Hungerford Vinton LLC, 2125 Buffalo Road, Suite 118, Rochester, NY 14624 to compile the Annual New York State Audit for the year 2009 and approved signing of the Legal Services Agreement as presented by David C. Schubel, Attorney, PO Box 606, 343 Main St., Medina, NY 14103 for the year 2010. Board members accepted Dan MacDonald's letter of resignation as a County Planning Board Alternate Member and adopted a Resolution recommending Planning Board member Chris White's appointment to that position; to complete Mr. MacDonald's term which will expire 12/31/2011.

Supervisor Moy reviewed the New York State and Local Retirement System regulation in reporting retirement service credits. Account Clerk confirmed that timesheets need to be on file and available for auditors, representing time worked for three months of the year; for use in reporting to the NYS Retirement.
