Tickets go on sale April 1, 2017, for the annual **"Raise a Glass for Reading"** Wine Tasting and Farmers' Market at the Community Free Library in Holley, NY, scheduled for Friday, April 28, 2017, from 7-9 p.m. Community members will have the opportunity to taste wines, meads and beers, shop with local farmers and entrepreneurs, listen to music, have fun with friends and support the Summer Reading Program.

This sell-out annual event, held on the last Friday in April, provides funding for the library's summer reading program for children. Because of the success of previous wine tastings, the Library has been able to double the number of programs offered to children throughout the summer, going from six to twelve. Each child who attends five or more programs and documents his/her summer reading will receive a free book. Special programs are being planned to attract area teens. The theme for the summer reading program is "Build a Better World."

The 2017 event welcomes the two new stops on the Niagara Wine Trail- Black Willow Winery and Meadery (Burt), and Vizarra Vineyards and Becker Brewing Company (Gasport). Returning are favorites Leonard Oakes Estate Winery (Medina) and Schwenk Wine Cellars (Kent). All four of this year's vineyards have won awards at State or Nation wine competitions!

As a Farmers' Market, this event will provide attendees with the opportunity to find out about alpacas as well as purchase alpaca products from Stoney Meadows Alpacas. They will also be able to visit with Lora Partyka from Partyka Farms, find out about this year's plans, purchase hanging baskets and bedding plants, jams, jellies and other products.

The event also provides a showcase for local entrepreneurs. Aromantium is an apothecary spa with a natural skin care line. Sue Sew-It-All specializes in tailoring as well as making memory bears from nostalgic fabrics.

While sampling the wines and talking to the vendors (and buying wine, mead, beer, farm products, farm products, and other gifts), guests will be able to listen to jazz, and Broadway music by Sound Foundations, featuring Wendy and Sean Williams

This highly anticipated evening has something for everyone, promoting local businesses and the Niagara and Ontario Wine trails, and highlighting community support for children's reading. CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights March 2017

The Town Board held a workshop meeting on March 6th to consider a proposed Water District No. 12. Discussion was held regarding district area boundaries, available grant funding and income surveys to determine the Median Household Income of the proposed service area which are used by State and Federal programs to access funding program eligibility. A public informational meeting has been scheduled for May 16th at 6PM regarding WD#12. (*See Notice on Front Page of this Gazette.*)

HIGHWAY DEPT REPORT

Superintendent Swanger reported two burials last month; a third was delayed because of the snow. Some lawn restoration and filling of pot holes was done prior to the snow. Some of the trees down due to the storms have been taken care of. State Association of Highway Superintendents went to Albany again to lobby for CHIPS funding. The Highway Crew plowed and sanded for three days straight. Hillside Cemetery has a mess with trees down from the storm. The three-month old fax machine, microwave and a relay on one of the new furnaces at the Highway Garage were damaged. It's been a busy month! Replacing the 2006 Ford 550 Dump Truck w/plow was discussed. Superintendent just put new springs on it; it was determined that the 2006 wouldn't last through another winter. The Town Board authorized purchase of a new dump truck with plow and stainless steel box at a cost not to exceed \$90,000.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Deputy Supervisor Allen Robinson reported that Jim Bensley from Orleans County Planning will be the guest speaker at the next Orleans County Association of Municipalities meeting. Orleans County has sent a safety training schedule; highway employees will attend. New York State Agriculture & Markets has sent Inspection Reports for the County Municipal Shelter and Animal Control Officer; both are satisfactory. The County Youth Bureau is requesting nominations for awards given annually to youth and adults volunteering service to Orleans County youth.

CORRESPONDENCE

We have received approved resolutions by The Association of Towns for the 2017 Legislative Program. Monroe County Probation has sent payment toward the court loss; Orleans County Probation has sent payment toward the cemetery vandalism. An abstract of 2016 payments to the Town from the county has been received and NYMIR Insurance Underwriting survey resulted in no recommendations to the Town.

OLD BUSINESS

Discussion was held regarding proposed Zoning Amendments and a public hearing was scheduled. (*See Front page of this Gazette for Notice*) The Town Board authorized the Planning Board to draft Language for the mobile home requirements prior to expiration of the moratorium. Planning Board Chair reviewed the recommendation to reinstate seasonal use properties and storage units in Business/Commercial District. The Board added Storage Units; Seasonal Use properties will be considered later.

NEW BUSINESS

The Town Board authorized an increase in pay-rate for election inspectors to \$9.70/hour. Resolutions adopted included: Support to partially repeal the New York SAFE Act; Support of an increase in share of revenue counties retain for DMV services and Urging NYS to fund departments/agencies full costs in raising criminal age. The Board did not authorize a brush pick-up; residents with large amounts of brush from the storm can call Highway Garage. There is a lot of clean-up to do at the cemetery yet. The Board did renew the Orleans County Town Highway Shared Service Agreement for five year contract, from May 1, 2017 through April 30, 2022.

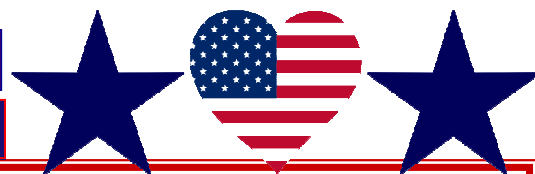

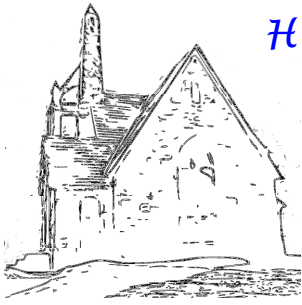

Hillside Sketches

Kirk S. Blanchard was born on October 6, 1852 and died on January 6, 1934. He was the first born of Alvah Smith Blanchard and Amanda Jane Freer. He was born on a farm in Murray and moved to Clarendon in 1860.

He was employed by Miller & Pettingill but opened a canning factory, dryer and cider mill in 1888 in Clarendon on Brockport Street. It was written that he had a payroll of 30 and the expectation was that it would be a prosperous business.

He is listed as holding several positions within the town of Clarendon. In 1879 he was a constable and a collector. In 1882 he was an excise commissioner.

The Blanchard Vinegar Company was organized in the autumn of 1889 by seven citizens of Albion, with paid up capital of \$16,000, which has since been increased to \$25,000, all paid up. The company purchased a plant which Kirk S. Blanchard has established in the preceding summer. The business of this company is the manufacture of cider and pure cider vinegar, and the evaporation of fruit. The works have a capacity for producing daily 300 barrels of cider and three tons of evaporated fruit. Eighty hands are employed during the working season. (taken from the book Landmarks of Orleans County by Isaac S. Signor 1894)

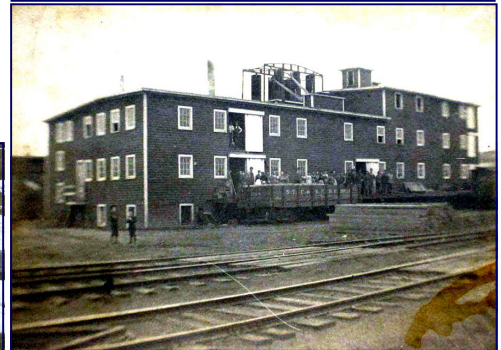

Residential Brush Burning in NYS Prohibited Through May 14

**Burn Ban has decreased spring wildfires
35 percent since 2009. Ban reduces wild-
fire risks, protects lives and property.**

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) reminds residents that with warming temperatures and dry conditions, residential brush burning is prohibited March 16 through May 14 across New York State. Due to the lack of snow cover over much of the state and with rising temperatures forecasted for the coming weeks, conditions for wildfires could be heightened. "While many people associate wildfires with the western United States, the early start of spring weather, dry conditions, and lack of snow pack increase the risk for wildfires in New York," DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos said. "New York prohibits residential burning during the high-risk fire season to reduce wildfires and protect people, property, and natural resources. The ban has been extremely effective in reducing the number of wildfires, and we're encouraging New Yorkers to put safety first." DEC will post a [Fire Danger Map](#) rating forecast daily for the 2017 fire season on its website and on the [NY Fishing, Hunting & Wildlife App](#) available on DEC's website. Currently, fire conditions in most of the state are low risk. Open burning of debris is the largest single cause of spring wildfires in New York State. When temperatures are warmer and the past fall's debris and leaves dry out, wildfires can start and spread easily and be further fueled by winds and a lack of green vegetation. New York first enacted strict restrictions on open burning in 2009 to help prevent wildfires and reduce air pollution. The regulations allow residential brush fires in towns with fewer than 20,000 residents during most of the year, but prohibit such burning in spring when most wildfires occur. In the seven-year period since the ban was established, the average number of spring fires per year decreased by 35.5 percent, from 2,925 in 2009 to 1,886 in 2016. Campfires using charcoal or untreated wood are allowed, but people should never leave such fires unattended and must extinguish them. Burning garbage or leaves is prohibited year-round. Some towns, primarily in and around the Adirondack and Catskill parks, are designated "fire towns." Open burning is prohibited year-round in these municipalities unless an individual or group has a written permit from DEC. To find out whether a municipality is designated a "fire town" or to obtain a permit, contact the appropriate DEC regional office. A list of [regional offices](#) is available on DEC's website. Violators of the state's open burning regulation are subject to both criminal and civil enforcement actions, with a minimum fine of \$500 for a first offense. 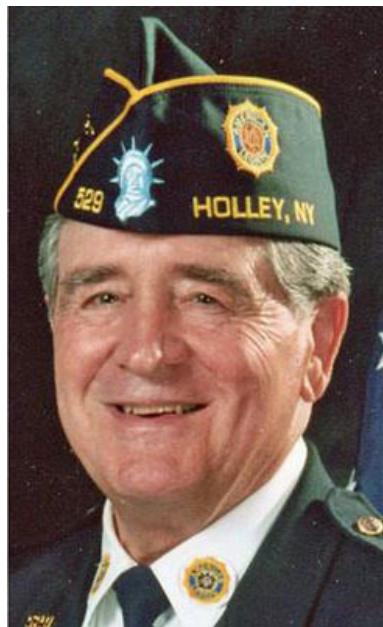
