

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CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights March 2016

On March 10th, the Town Board held an informational meeting at the Clarendon Fire Company Recreation Hall in regard to a possible 'take-over' of water systems by Monroe County Water Authority. Forty residents out of 1066 chargeable parcels were in attendance. operate the system vs the Town of Clarendon maintaining the water system. Representatives from MCWA were present to answer questions. Major items of information: IF MCWA takes over it will repair and replace all waterlines up to WD#9 ext.; anything constructed after that, MCWA will repair but not replace. MCWA will paint the water tower; they will do all billing and collecting; the contract would be for 40 years, after which they can purchase the waterlines from Clarendon; a new service fee would be \$2290; any money left in water accounts could be used to pay down the debt or returned to property owners. If the town keeps responsibility, the cost to paint the tower is estimated at should be assessed at \$.21/day; town would continue to read meters. prepare bills and collect payments. Town will be responsible for repair and replacement and will need to charge each parcel to save for future costs. Take time to do charity, it is the key to Heaven.



Hillside Sketches

The many beautiful monuments in Hillside are eye catching. It makes you wonder who was responsible for their existence. While researching various individuals memorialized by these works of art in stone, I kept running across the name of George Savage. Savage was a monument dealer who opened a marble and granite business in 1882 on Mechanic Street in Holley in a rented building. In 1884 he established his Steam Monumental Works on White Street and the Public Square. It was the only steam plant of its kind in the area. He handled all kinds of New England granite and marble for the manufacture of monumental work. He employed 4-5 men year round. In 1891 he advertised he had discovered an entirely new method for finishing marble, done completely by steam, that gave a fine glossy surface more impervious to wear and dirt. Some of the finest monuments in Hillside are attributed to him. These include the ones for Ogden Miller, Edwin Bliss, Harley Hood, Abraham Salisbury, Horace Keys, Orange Eddy, John Berry and others

George Savage (1859-1944) experienced much loss in his personal life. His first wife, Jessie F. Sears (1862-1886) died less than 3 years after their marriage and a couple weeks after the birth of their first child, Walter, who survived only a couple weeks longer. He married Emma B. Blanchard (1859-1924) in 1887. While married to Emma, they lost three young children. Their first son, James (1889), lived only one day. Their daughter, Lucia (1892-1902), died of heart failure accompanied by scarlet fever. Myra (1890-1905) was lost to appendicitis. After Emma's death, he married a third time with Amy Barber (1866-1948.) The family is all buried with him in Hillside.



You might expect a grand monument to mark his family's plot. But, simple rectangular markers, set close to the ground, mark the graves and are nearly obscured by lichen. Another bears the family name and two small Maltese crosses. The eight flared points of the Maltese cross represent the Beatitudes, the declarations of blessedness spoken by Jesus at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount. Perhaps, George was tired of the grandness of some of his creations, or maybe he had a profound sense of modesty. However, without his artistry and skill, Hillside would be a much less beautiful place.

An official discharge paper (DD-214) must be on file in the Orleans County Clerk's Office. If the DD-214 is not on file, it must be presented for filing prior to issuance of discount card. reviewed that when he started, there were four full time employees and no water. Now, there are three full time employees and 60 miles of waterline. Every time hydrants are flushed, residents pay for that water Superintendent Swanger will prepare statistical documentation for the Board by the next meeting.

MCWA increased the water rate in January by seven cents; the Town Board increased Clarendon Water rate to \$3.35, effective January 1, 2016.

The Board approved the prepared SEQR for proposed zoning amendments and declared a Negative Declaration. The matter will go to the County Planning Board for review.

NEW BUSINESS—The Board authorized expenditure of highway monies in the amount of \$304,000

Resolutions adopted requested New York State restore funding parity; MTA and NYSDOT and opposed Governor Cuomo's proposed increase in minimum wage. The Board authorized Melissa Ierlan to lay out a plan for Veterans and spouses' burial plots in Hillside Cemetery; for future consideration of the Town Board.

Supervisor Moy suggested the Board invite volunteer organizations (Lions Club, Fire Co., Historical Society, etc.) to present needs of its organization and what is involved, to a board meeting. It was stated that the Fire Association of the State of New York offers two years free community college for volunteers 18 years and older. Councilman Major confirmed that Clarendon uses that as a recruitment tool. Board members in agreement with presentations; Supervisor will schedule. Superintendent Swanger stated not being in favor of the New York State Shared Services Agreement (SSA). Now, towns use each other or the county if they need assistance. The State wants towns to use the State. Many towns are opposed to this, even in Genesee County. No Action was taken by the Board. Proposals to mow for the 2016 season were accepted from Kingdollar Lawn Care and A&K Lawn and Garden.
