## CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights March 2016

On March 10<sup>th</sup>, the Town Board held an informational meeting at the Clarendon Fire Company Recreation Hall in regard to a possible 'take-over' of water systems by Monroe County Water Authority. Forty residents out of 1066 chargeable parcels were in attendance. Supervisor Moy presented data showing differences if MCWA were to operate the system vs the Town of Clarendon maintaining the water system. Representatives from MCWA were present to answer questions. Major items of information: *IF MCWA takes over* it will repair and replace all waterlines up to WD#9 ext.; anything constructed after that, MCWA will repair but not replace. MCWA will paint the water tower; they will do all billing and collecting; the contract would be for 40 years, after which they can purchase the waterlines from Clarendon; a new service fee would be \$2290; any money left in water accounts could be used to pay down the debt or returned to property owners. *If the town keeps responsibility*, the cost to paint the tower is estimated at \$500,000. The funding can be borrowed for five years, costing each parcel an average of \$100/year for 5 years. A daily meter charge should be assessed at \$.21/day; town would continue to read meters, prepare bills and collect payments. Town will be responsible for repair and replacement and will need to charge each parcel to save for future costs. Concerns included being able to keep well water supply and integrity of the Authority over the situation with MCWA's former security director. *(Please contact the Clerk for a complete set of minutes from this meeting if you're interested.)* The Board held two public hearings prior to the regular meeting on the 15<sup>th</sup> in regard to amending the size of structure allowed without a building permit.

**HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT**— Superintendent Larry Swanger reported being busy dealing with the snow storm that cancelled the February Board Meeting. The crew has been filling potholes, removing trees around town and making repairs to equipment. A new rug has been installed in the Superintendent's office and one new water service has been installed. Last week, Highway Superintendents from New York State went to Albany to lobby for CHIPS money; increased funding sounds promising. There was a record turnout of Superintendents at 750 people. Board members commended the Highway Department for the good job removing snow. Supervisor Moy informed that Melissa Ierlan is attending training for CEO this entire week. Tonight she will attend the Town of Greece meeting. They are dealing with 'zombie houses' Vacant Building Registry.

**SUPERVISOR REPORT**—Supervisor Richard Moy informed that Mr. VanLogden, Clarendon resident on Holley Byron Road, is co-owner of the Intergrow plant on Route 98 in the Town of Gaines. He has offered to give a tour of the plant. Anyone interested should let the Town Clerk know. When Supervisor has a head-count, he will schedule a tour; for sometime in May. Every Friday through April 15<sup>th</sup>, Natalie Heller has been teaching a Nutrition class from 11am-noon at the Clarendon Town Hall. Supervisor has attended a few sessions; it's very interesting and informative. Natalie is a Clarendon Native; Kozlowski. Last month at the Supervisors/Legislators meeting, Orleans County Chief Financial Officer Chuck Nesbit reviewed the New York State budget. Several county CFO's had a personal meeting with the Governor to go over the budget. Supervisor has a copy of the State Budget for anyone interested. Supervisor Moy informed of the "Thank a Vet Discount Program" offered through the County Clerk's office and read aloud requirements to obtain a discount card that is good at many businesses in Orleans County.

**CORRESPONDENCE**—Proposals to maintain town hall gardens have been received from Beth Skehan, Church Street resident and Monica Beck who has done the job for past years, now a Clarkson resident. Board members in agreement to give the job to a resident if possible; proposal was accepted from Beth Skehan.

The Town has received \$2,533.33 revenue from the Traffic Diversion Program for the period of October through December, 2015.

The 2016 meeting schedule including host towns for the Orleans County Supervisors/Legislators Association has been received; Clarendon will host in September; guest speaker will be the director of Social Services for Orleans County. Letter of interest in serving the Board of Assessment Review as secretary has been received from Beth Skehan, Church Street resident. Supervisor reviewed that last year's secretary Nyla Gaylord, has been appointed to the BAR, leaving the secretarial position vacant; Beth Skehan was appointed. The Orleans County Treasurer has sent an abstract of revenues received from the County in 2015; this includes mortgage tax, county snow removal, mowing, solid waste administration fee, traffic diversion program proceeds, DWI cases and sales tax revenue. Supervisor Moy read aloud a letter of thanks from Wendy Basile, 4821 South Holley Road resident. Assessor Cindi Davis helped keep Ms. Basile's horses and car traffic/roads safe while her two horses were loose on South Holley and Jackson Road. Ms. Basile asked that Ms. Davis be recognized and commended for her help and two other good citizens that came to her assistance that day also. Ms. Basile apologized for Ms. Davis being late to work and thanked her in helping with what could have resulted in serious car accidents and animal deaths. Through her quick thinking and good citizen/official manner all ended well. Supervisor Moy recalled the winter weather that day and recognized Ms. Davis for her service to the community.

**OLD BUSINESS**—Funding for Water District No. 9 ext. 1 will be received April 15, 2016. The Town Board authorized Chatfield Engineers to bid out materials for WD#9 ext. 1 Project. The Highway/Water Department will install the waterline with the assistance of the Village of Holley crew.

Supervisor Moy reported that after the MCWA informational meeting, he has received many emails. Residents have been asked to come into the office and talk with the Supervisor. Supervisor Moy informed he is undecided on the matter; that once it's turned over, that's it. After 40 years, MCWA can buy the lines. The Water Authority and the Town would each pick an appraiser and the appraisers would together come up with a selling price. Hopefully it would be someone that can be trusted and is specialized in the area. The skill level among appraisers varies dramatically. It was confirmed that there are approximately 800 water usage accounts and 1600 parcels that pay water district debt service charges. Supervisor Moy received many calls and emails with questions both before and after the informational meeting. Craig Lane sent a packet of information to Supervisor Moy. It states that PVC pipe has a figured life of 100-110 years. It has only been used since 1976 and is a fairly new material; much depends on the ground it is in. There are many variables.

If the town initiated a \$.21 daily meter charge it would produce \$62,000/year. In two years, there would be \$124,000 collected to go toward painting the water tower, bringing the cost to borrow down to \$380,000. That meter charge would, the following years, make payment on the borrowing and pay it down in the five years. In 20 years beyond, there would be enough to pay to paint the water tower again. To keep the water 'in-house', the Town will need to charge like MCWA does. The meter charge would be kept in a separate fund and only used for repair/replacement – like painting water tower. Superintendent Swanger reviewed that the chlorinator system needs to be repaired. It should be automatic, but has been manually operated. Superintendent Swanger thinks it should be turned over to MCWA. Councilman Nicosia stated that the town finances have been well run and the town has survived the state tax caps and mandates, but questioned if it would cost more money for the town in the long run. Superintendent offered that the valves are deteriorating. If there are breaks in the winter, there are only three employees and they would be needed first to plow the roads. It was confirmed that it has been a couple of years since the valves have been worked. Superintendent

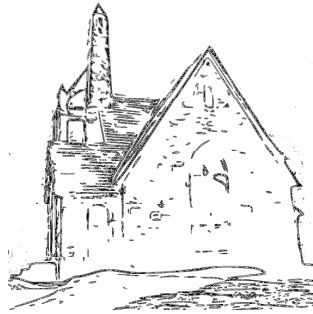

## Hillside Sketches

The many beautiful monuments in Hillside are eye catching. It makes you wonder who was responsible for their existence. While researching various individuals memorialized by these works of art in stone, I kept running across the name of George Savage. Savage was a monument dealer who opened a marble and granite business in 1882 on Mechanic Street in Holley in a rented building. In 1884 he established his Steam Monumental Works on White Street and the Public Square. It was the only steam plant of its kind in the area. He handled all kinds of New England granite and marble for the manufacture of monumental work. He employed 4-5 men year round. In 1891 he advertised he had discovered an entirely new method for finishing marble, done completely by steam, that gave a fine glossy surface more impervious to wear and dirt. Some of the finest monuments in Hillside are attributed to him. These include the ones for Ogden Miller, Edwin Bliss, Harley Hood, Abraham Salisbury, Horace Keys, Orange Eddy, John Berry and others.

**George Savage** (1859-1944) experienced much loss in his personal life. His first wife, **Jessie F. Sears** (1862-1886) died less than 3 years after their marriage and a couple weeks after the birth of their first child, **Walter**, who survived only a couple weeks longer. He married **Emma B. Blanchard** (1859-1924) in 1887. While married to Emma, they lost three young children. Their first son, **James** (1889), lived only one day. Their daughter, **Lucia** (1892-1902), died of heart failure accompanied by scarlet fever. Myra (1890-1905) was lost to appendicitis. After Emma's death, he married a third time with **Amy Barber** (1866-1948.) The family is all buried with him in Hillside.



You might expect a grand monument to mark his family's plot. But, simple rectangular markers, set close to the ground, mark the graves and are nearly obscured by lichen. Another bears the family name and two small Maltese crosses. The eight flared points of the Maltese cross represent the Beatitudes, the declarations of blessedness spoken by Jesus at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount. Perhaps, George was tired of the grandness of some of his creations, or maybe he had a profound sense of modesty. However, without his artistry and skill, Hillside would be a much less beautiful place.

**Eligibility Guidelines:** The Veteran must be an Orleans County resident and show proof of residency by presenting an official government photo identification showing the Orleans County address (New York State Drivers License or Non-Driver ID Card). The Veteran must also be a qualified, honorably discharged Veteran of any branch of the United States Armed Forces. An official discharge paper (DD-214) must be on file in the Orleans County Clerk's Office. If the DD-214 is not on file, it must be presented for filing prior to issuance of discount card. Supervisor Moy suggested the Board invite volunteer organizations (Lions Club, Fire Co., Historical Society, etc.) to present needs of its organization and what is involved, to a board meeting. It was stated that the Fire Association of the State of New York offers two years free community college for volunteers 18 years and older. Councilman Major confirmed that Clarendon uses that as a recruitment tool. Board members in agreement with presentations; Supervisor will schedule. Superintendent Swanger stated not being in favor of the New York State Shared Services Agreement (SSA). Now, towns use each other or the county if they need assistance. The State wants towns to use the State. Many towns are opposed to this, even in Genesee County. No Action was taken by the Board. Proposals to mow for the 2016 season were accepted from King-dollar Lawn Care and A&K Lawn and Garden.

reviewed that when he started, there were four full time employees and no water. Now, there are three full time employees and 60 miles of waterline. Every time hydrants are flushed, residents pay for that water Superintendent Swanger will prepare statistical documentation for the Board by the next meeting. MCWA increased the water rate in January by seven cents; the Town Board increased Clarendon Water rate to \$3.35, effective January 1, 2016. The Board approved the prepared SEQR for proposed zoning amendments and declared a Negative Declaration. The matter will go to the County Planning Board for review.

**NEW BUSINESS**—The Board authorized expenditure of highway monies in the amount of \$304,000 Resolutions adopted requested New York State restore funding parity; MTA and NYSDOT and opposed Governor Cuomo's proposed increase in minimum wage. The Board authorized Melissa Ierlan to lay out a plan for Veterans and spouses' burial plots in Hillside Cemetery; for future consideration of the Town Board.

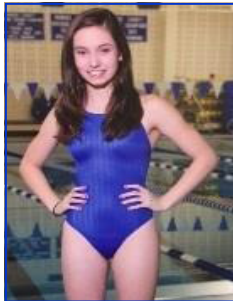

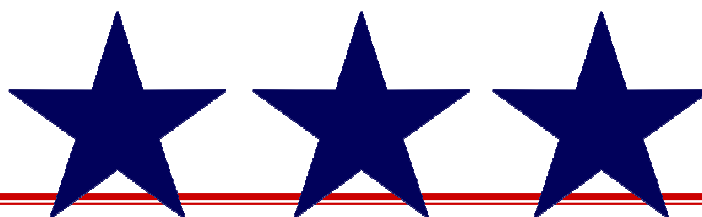
