The following contains parts of the **State of the County Address** presented by Orleans County Legislature Chairman, David B. Callard on February 22, 2012. To read the entire presentation, go to orleansny.com or contact the Orleans County legislature's office at 589-7053.

Perhaps the biggest challenge of the year was the comprehensive review of The Villages of Orleans Health and Rehabilitation Center. This was necessitated by the submission of its budget estimating an operating loss of \$1.1 million for 2010 and projections for 2011-2015 showing consistent growth in its annual operational deficit in each subsequent year from over \$2 million to nearly \$4 million. Since then, unexpectedly favorable rebased Medicaid rates have been established and overdue Medicaid reimbursements have been received, resulting in a significant reduction in net operating losses. We are hopeful that as we continue to expand available services revenues will increase providing needed relief to the continuing Nursing Home deficits.

This year, the legislature plans to implement the recommendations of the energy efficiency study, implement the new county-wide emergency radio system for law enforcement, fire-fighters, ambulance, and highway workers. There will be a major overhaul to the county emergency communication system. We shall also undertake an upgrade of the county Marine Park including replacement of the decking and the south stair case.

The budget will continue to be closely scrutinized. Salaries are held to less than 1%, which is exceptional, but health insurance and New York State retirement will rise 10% and 28% respectively. The state continues to lower revenue aid to the counties, while it increases unfunded mandate costs. One such unfunded mandate cost - Medicaid - is the county's greatest expense. New York spends over \$1 billion a week on Medicaid and over \$7 billion of that cost goes to the counties. The legislators review departmental operations on a monthly basis encouraging department heads to make cost saving recommendations wherever possible. The legislature is also looking to reduce operational costs and increase services on a multi-county basis. While Orleans County has never formalized regional alliances with its neighboring counties, it has had informal working relationships. At the February 8th meeting of the legislature a historic first alliance was established with the creation of the Niagara-Orleans Regional Alliance (NORA). The legislature will seek next to formalize an alliance with Genesee County, then Monroe County.

Increased emphasis will be given to the infrastructure. Highways have been well-maintained and bridge work completed as planned, but now, with reduction in state and federal aid, very carefully planned preventive maintenance will have to be undertaken to extend the life of our existing infrastructure.


CLARENDON'S STONE STORE PLACED ON STATE REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES

In March, the efforts to save the Old Stone Store achieved an important milestone. The New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation placed the property on the State Register of Historic Places. This register is the more local version of the National Register of Historic Places. These registers are the federal and state government's official lists of historic properties worthy of preservation. The listing provides recognition of our local heritage and assistance in preserving it. NY State has now forwarded the nomination information to the federal government with the recommendation that the Stone Store also be placed on the National Register of Historic Places. We hope to hear that decision soon.

Beyond the pride of having another of our local buildings recognized as significant, placement on the two registers provides a significant incentive to a potential buyer. If the property is rehabilitated as an income producing property, the owner could be eligible to receive 40% of the rehabilitation costs back in the form of tax credits. This can make the rehabilitation project more financially attractive.

We are currently working with Brenda Swanger and the Landmark Society of WNY to develop a marketing plan for the Stone Store. The Town has agreed to sell the property for \$1 to the person who comes forward with a rehabilitation plan that meets their criteria. SO YOU THINK YOU CAN DANCE?

Physical education (PE) classes at Holley Middle School/ High School recently worked with Heather Kelley, dance instructor and cheerleading coach, to put together a "flash mob" dance to the LMFAO song "Party Rock Anthem." A flash mob is a term coined in 2003 to denote a group of people who assemble suddenly in a public place, perform an unusual act for a brief time then disperse, often for the purpose of entertainment. Kelley has been teaching dance and coaching since 1997, and has a bachelor's degree in Arts for Children from The College at Brockport.

The dance lesson aligned with the NYS Learning Standards for PE. Students participated in a dance activity that improved or maintained their personal level of fitness. They had to apply previously acquired movement patterns for successful participation, including performing a sequence that allowed for creativity and self expression. Everyone was engaged and moving for almost the entire 42 minutes.

At the end of the second day over 200 students gathered in the gym to perform the dance, which helped build a sense of community among the grade levels. "It was a real teambuilding experience," said PE Teacher Jill Mann.

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Karen Bradshaw and Jeff Schwartz, representatives of the Orleans County Board of Ethics, reviewed its advisory services available. The Ethics Board consists of members

appointed to staggered 3-year terms; Ms. Bradshaw is the one county employee, the remaining members are citizens of the county. Three towns in the County (including Clarendon) utilize the County Ethics Board. Services are to assist paid and unpaid town representatives in avoiding potential conflicts of interest prior to taking action on a matter. The ethics board is required to maintain confidentiality.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Larry Swanger reported a few days of salting roads this past month and one day of plowing. Trees have been cleaned up on Hinds Road with help of the county bucket. Trees down from the winds at Hillside Cemetery have been cleaned up and piled out front. The Board will wait until the fall to bid out the wood pile so it can be added to all summer. One grave has been dug at the cemetery. Paul Burley, seasonal cemetery worker, is back to work three weeks early. Superintendent Swanger informed that six hundred highway superintendents went to Albany this year to request increased CHIPS funding.

The Town Board authorized disposition of the joint owned 1987 Roller, as Superintendents of Barre, Murray and Clarendon determine. Discussion was held regarding the 1999 ten-wheeler; the frame and body are rotted out. It was also discussed that the 2004 pick-up is four years old and should be on a three year replacement rotation. It has 100,000 miles on it; gauges don't work; speedometer doesn't work.

There are a couple lenders that will give rehabilitation loans at 4% interest rates for up to 75% of the total cost. Any interested party would need to have, say \$25,000 in order to get a loan for \$75,000. The tax credits would apply if we get the designation.
