A Compassionate Alternative to Closure

Orleans County Legislature

The court has wisely determined that the legislative decisions regarding the Villages of Orleans were within the legislature’s authority. The discussion regarding the nursing home has been a very emotional one, but the ultimate goal has always been to ensure its long term sustainability. Now we must return to our goal for the Villages, to continue to provide a high quality of care for our residents; maintain its jobs; preserve its programs; and continue its community ties without dire financial consequences to the taxpayers.

The choice here hasn’t been about privatization versus public ownership. It has been about maintaining the facility or losing it altogether. We can no longer delay the decision and hope that everything will be all right. That is fiscally irresponsible and brings grave uncertainty. We must ensure that the Orleans Health Facilities Corporation is able to complete its work.

It is important to remind people that this course of action was decided by a super majority vote. The actions being taken are intended to balance the interests of the residents, the employees, and the taxpayers. I commend my colleagues in the legislature for having the courage to make this very difficult decision.

What to Look For:

Most tick bites are characterized by a rash resembling a bullseye and are accompanied by symptoms including chills and fever, headache, fatigue, stiff neck, muscle and/or joint pain, and swollen glands in the early stages.

Symptoms can occur between three and 30 days after a bite, so it is important to remain vigilant.

If Lyme disease goes untreated in the early stages, more acute symptoms may occur like severe fatigue, a stiff, aching neck, and tingling or numbness in the arms and legs, or facial paralysis.

Symptoms including severe headaches, painful arthritis, swelling of the joints, and heart and central nervous system problems can continue for weeks, months or years after the tick bite if they are not addressed.



Because ticks cannot fly or jump, they can only be transmitted by direct contact. It is especially important to remember that, even if you are not entering a high-risk area, ticks can be carried by family pets and visitors, and contact can still occur.

How to Prevent a Tick Bite:

- Wear light-colored clothing with a tight weave to spot ticks easily.
- Wear enclosed shoes, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt. Tuck pant legs into socks or boots and shirt into pants.
- Check clothes and any exposed skin frequently for ticks while outdoors and check again once indoors.
- Consider using insect repellent. Follow label directions.
- Stay on cleared, well-traveled trails. Avoid contacting vegetation.
- Avoid sitting directly on the ground or on stone walls.
- Keep long hair tied back, especially when gardening.

While not all ticks are infected with Lyme or other diseases, it is critical to remove them immediately if they are found attached.

How to Remove a Tick:

- Using tweezers, grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible.
- Gently pull the tick in a steady, upward motion.
- Wash the area with a disinfectant.

When trying to remove the tick:

- **DO NOT** touch the tick with your bare hands.
- **DO NOT** squeeze the body of the tick as this may increase your risk of infection.
- **DO NOT** put alcohol, nail polish remover or Vaseline on the tick.
- **DO NOT** put a hot match or cigarette on the tick in an effort to make it “back out.”
- **DO NOT** use your fingers to remove the tick.

Safe Guard Your Home Against Ticks

- Keep grass mowed.
- Remove leaf litter, brush and weeds at the edge of the lawn.
- Restrict the use of groundcover, such as pachysandra in areas frequented by family and roaming pets.
- Remove brush and leaves around stonewalls and wood piles.
- Discourage rodent activity. Clean up and seal stonewalls and small openings around the home.
- Move firewood piles and bird feeders away from the house.
- Manage pet activity; keep dogs and cats out of the woods to reduce ticks brought into the home.
- Use plantings that do not attract deer; contact your local Cooperative Extension or garden center for suggestions, or exclude deer through various types of fencing.
- Move children's swing sets and sand boxes away from the woodland edge and place them on a wood chip or mulch type foundation.
- Trim tree branches and shrubs around the lawn edge to let in more sunlight.
- Adopt drier or less water-demanding landscaping techniques with gravel pathways and mulches. Create a 3-foot or wider wood chip, mulch, or gravel border between lawn and woods or stonewalls. Consider areas with decking, tile, gravel and border or container plantings in areas by the house or frequently traveled.
- Widen woodland trails.
- If you consider a pesticide application as a targeted treatment, do not use any pesticide near streams or any body of water, as it may kill aquatic life or pollute the water itself.

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

July 2013

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Larry Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reviewed that the Highway Department was shut down the week of July 4th. The second mowing has been started and the waterline dead-ends have been flushed. The new pickup truck was delivered on June 26. A water leak was found and fixed on Fancher Road two weeks ago; it was the service feeding the Germeo farm. There were three small holes in the copper line; it was replaced with PVC pipe. Superintendent Swanger reported checking for what may be water leaks since things have dried up.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman Griggs submitted the following written report:

No issues were noted with the proposal. Applicant requested waiver of pre-conference. Motion made, seconded, and approved to amend the agenda from a pre-conference to a formal review. HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

President Moore reported that maintenance at the museum site this year will include work on the Nature Trail (Eric Spsychalski's Eagle Scout Project seven years ago). Some of the old equipment at the museum barn has wood on it and is deteriorating; restoration work will be done on that also. Erica Joan Wanecskis will present a program on old snake oil medicines to present at the Ice Cream Social.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Richard H. Moy, Supervisor

Supervisor informed that Attorney Schubel would be a little late to this evening's meeting. Next month, the Board meeting will be at the Historical Society Museum Site. There will be free hot dogs, drinks and music by Ryan Klatt's band – Brick from 5:00 to 7:00 PM. The meeting will begin at 7:00. Today the Town received its share of the Traffic Diversion Program for April, May and June in the amount of \$1866.67.

It was mentioned that NYSDOT will be repairing two culvert bridges on Route 237 ; the road will be closed from North Bergen Road to Cook Road. It is unknown exactly when this will take place.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Town of Sweden has sent notice of a public hearing for subdivision of land on the Monroe Orleans County Line Road.

Cornell University has sent notice to terminate the Local Technical Assistance Program, the outreach program of the Cornell Local Roads Program. The Local Roads Program provides technical assistance and training for local highway officials through Cooperative Extension. The Dean has decided not to host the training.

Orleans County Planning & Development has sent certification of four hours training for Zoning Board Chairman, Arthur Kaminski.

Supervisor Moy read aloud a letter sent by County Legislature Chairman Callard regarding the Villages of Orleans nursing home. The County Court has determined the legislative decisions regarding such were within the legislature's authority. Chairman Callard's letter stated that the choice hasn't been about privatization versus public ownership, but rather about maintaining the facility or losing it altogether.

The Orleans County Department of Personnel and Self Insurance will hold the Self-Insurance Advisory Committee standard quarterly meeting on July 22, 2013 at 10:00 AM at the Villages of Orleans.

MVP has sent new rates effective 9/1/2013; they will increase 11.5 percent across the board.

OLD BUSINESS

Supervisor Moy reported that septic system plans for the Old Stone Store building have been submitted and fees for review paid to the Orleans County Health Department. From there they will go to the County Engineer for review. We're waiting for their response.

The Board held a water workshop and consensus was that the Board include all areas proposed except for Brown Schoolhouse/Transit Road and Upper Holley Road, leaving the following areas for WIBA 11: Hinds Road from WD #5 to WD #7; South Holley Road from WD #2 to Sandy Creek; Glidden Road from Holley Byron Road to South Holley Road and 1500 on Merrill Road; Holley Byron Road from Boots Road to New Guinea Road; Howard Road and County Line Road from Howard Road to Taylor Road; Chugg Road from WD #6 to the end of Chugg Road. When Attorney Schubel arrived, he confirmed that Chatfield Engineers will need to prepare a map, plan and report before the board can hold a public hearing and vote.

The Ground Lease Agreement / County Communications System and Brown Schoolhouse Road town property were tabled to the August meeting.

Local Law No. 2 of 1993 regulating Peddling and Soliciting in the Town was discussed at the workshop meeting. Board members proposed no changes.

NEW BUSINESS

The Town Board reappointed Cynthia Boheen Davis to a six year term as Sole Assessor for the Town of Clarendon; term to expire 9/30/2019.

Supervisor Moy suggested the Town hold another electronic recycling day. Superintendent Swanger in agreement that it's a good idea; there are televisions all over the roadsides. The garbage collection does not take them anymore. Supervisor Moy will call Adam Johnson at Blue Top Management on East Lee Road to see if he's interested in hosting it at his collection center.

Language was added to the Out of District Water Agreement to ensure notice of the agreement to subsequent purchasers of the property. The Board accepted a computer maintenance proposal for the remainder of the 2013 year as submitted by Bill Downie of V2D LLC, Batavia, NY. A statement was added to the Town Park Reservation form, releasing the town of injury liabilities during functions and a Bond Resolution was adopted for the upcoming \$1,491,000 Bond Anticipation Note (BAN) Sale; Water/Equipment Projects.

Town Board was in agreement that "Soliciting & Building Permits Required" signs be put on the state highways at the town line. It was recognized that the Highway Department has cleaned the graffiti off the "Welcome" sign.

The Town Board, Attorney and Assessor held an executive session regarding Pending Litigation.
