TAKE NOTICE that the Town Board will hold a public hearing on August 19, 2014 at the Clarendon Historical Society Museum Barn, 16426 Fourth Section Road (Corner of Rte 31A and Church Street), Clarendon, NY at 7:00 PM. Purpose of this hearing will be to review proposed amendments to the Town Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations. Proposed Zoning Ordinance language will reclassify certain Special Use Items as Accessory Uses within several Zoning Districts; as follows: Alternative Energy Systems (Solar & Wind Powered), Church and Public Utilities (Essential Services) will be added to Permitted Accessory Uses and Removed from Uses Allowed by Special Permit in Residential Hamlet (RH) District, Residential Agricultural (RA) District, Rural Residential (RR) District and Business Commercial (BC) District. Definition of Accessory Building or Structure is proposed as: A Subordinate building or structure on the same lot as the principle building or structure which is operated and maintained primarily for the benefit or convenience of the occupants of the principle building or structure. Procedures for Building Permits has been revised to Note: The Ordinance Inspection Officer may waive the need for a site plan review for structures greater than 144 square feet provided such structure is single width, is a single storey and is not permanently attached to the soil or to any other structure. Proposed language in the Subdivision Regulations will clarify definitions and procedures and adds Type I State Environmental Quality Review Assessment requirements in regard to projects likely to have a significant adverse impact on the environment. Anyone wishing to speak in favor of or in opposition to said changes may do so at this hearing. AND BE ADVISED that immediately following the foregoing advertised Public Hearing for Zoning & Subdivision Changes, the Town Board will hold a Public Hearing in consideration of Local Law No. 1 of 2014, entitled a Local Law Increasing the Maximum Income Eligibility Level for the Senior Citizen Tax Exemption under Section 467 of the Real Property Tax Law. Anyone wishing to speak in favor of or in opposition to said proposed local law may do so at this hearing.

Local Law Increasing the Maximum Income Eligibility Level for the Senior Citizen Tax Exemption under Section 467 of the Real Property Tax Law

SECTION 1. This local law is adopted pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Real Property Tax Law of the State of New York.

SECTION 2. <u>TEXT:</u> The income eligibility level and the percentage of partial tax exemption previously established by Local law No. 1 of the Year 1997 pursuant to Real Property Tax Law section 467 for persons sixty-five years of age or older is hereby repealed and there is substituted therefore the following schedule which shall control the income eligibility levels and the percentage of partial exemption to be allowed effective immediately and shall apply to assessment rolls prepared on taxable status dates occurring on and after March 1, 2015; to wit:

SECTION 3. <u>REPEALER:</u> Local Law No. 1 of the Year 1997 and any other prior inconsistent local law, ordinance or resolution adopted pursuant to Real Property Tax Law section 467 is hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Department of State and shall apply to assessment rolls prepared on the basis of taxable status dates occurring on and after March 1, 2015.

ALSO BE ADVISED that the Regular Monthly Meeting of the Clarendon Town Board will commence upon close of the Public Hearing in regard to proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2014.

The Holley Rod & Gun Club has announced that its Hunter Safety Instructor Team will be holding a New York State Basic Hunter Education Course at the club grounds on Pumping Station Road, just south of the Village of Holley.

HILL TALK:

OH WELL! ALL'S WELL THAT ENDS WELL!

Many strange things happened at the house at #9 Fayette Street in Brockport as told in the February 2010 issue, "Things that go bang in the night". The house is now lost do to a tragic fire in the early 80's; lost except for the well cover still prominently visible behind the New York State shed at the canal bridge.

I'm not completely sure of this but suspect that was the last well actively used in the village. It was a hand dug, spring fed, and twenty-some-odd foot deep hole lined with stone. Half way down, a pipe entered from the side with an elbow allowing it to continue down to the bottom. That pipe came from the cellar of the house where it was hooked up to a shallow-well pump and tank, providing water to the household.

When I bought the house in the mid-50's it was possible to connect to the town water supply but the water was adequate and free, except for electricity to run the pump, so we kept the well.

There came a time during one winter that the pump ran longer than normal to fill the tank. Suspecting low water although that had never been a problem before, I opened the well cover and looked down. With the help of a flashlight I could see that the water level was fine. A friend who had his own well out in the country told me that it sounded like the foot-valve was the source of the problem.

I came up with a plan to fix that valve. An old, narrow, wooden ladder was in the shed when I bought the house and I now realized that it must have been used for this same purpose sometime in the past. I would climb down to where the pipe entered the well and with a monkey wrench, unscrew the whole pipe connected to the foot-valve, pull it up out of the water, pass it to the surface. repair it, and put it back. Sounds easy, right? I momentarily forgot this was #9 Fayette Street where nothing was ever normal or easy.

Every spring we had an unusual occurrence in our yard. As soon as warm weather came, dozens of snakes would suddenly appear. It would take several days for them to finally disperse to wherever they spent their summers. I had no inkling that I would soon solve the mystery of where they all came from!

Not quite sure about the ladder's length, I tied a rope on it and lowered it into the well. It was about six feet too short. Being an agile ex-marine, that didn't keep me from climbing down anyway. I disconnected that length of pipe and passed it up to the surface. My eyes were now accustomed to the darkness in the well as I reached the top of the ladder and prepared to scramble up the rest of the way.

Do you know that feeling when you first see a snake? You experience an involuntary jump, right? What if you are stuck in a narrow hole and see them all around you and you have nowhere to jump to? As I looked for places to step I was horrified to see snakes on all the ledges surrounding me! They weren't moving, but my shirt collar felt wide open as I almost flew out of that hole!

What to do? There was only one answer; I would have to face that fearful ordeal at least twice more. I did and lived through it although to this day I have a fear of a snake somehow climbing down my neck.

Oh well! All's well that ends well!

"Creating the Muck Lands" will be presented at the Clarendon Historical Society on Wednesday, August 20th. John Swartz will discuss the history of the muck lands of Orleans and Genesee Counties in a program starting at 7:00 p.m. The Society's site is at the intersection of Route 31A and Church Street in Clarendon. It is hard to imagine that just about one hundred years ago, the very fertile land we know as "the muck" was the Tonawanda Swamp. Instead of yielding up tons of onions and other vegetables, it was the home to squadrons of mosquitoes and numerous reptiles and was the cause of malaria and other ailments for those who lived near it. Its only economic value was the timber taken from it to be burned into charcoal and potash. An amazing engineering feat drained the swamp and made the

land the productive acreage it is now. However, its agricultural lifespan is limited.


John Swartz will discuss the process of draining the swamp and its development into the land we know today, as well as relating real life experiences as a muck farmer.



HOLLEY MARKS 65TH ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY

Friends, family, faculty, staff and 81 members of the Holley Class of 2014 gathered on Saturday, June 30 at Woodland's field for the 65th annual Commencement ceremony. The event opened with "Pomp and Circumstance" performed by the High School Concert Band under the direction of music teacher Dan Wakefield. This was followed by "The Star-Spangled Banner" which was performed brilliantly by graduating senior Bailey Flint.

Class President Claudia Passarell gave opening remarks followed by a Salutatory Address by Daniel Flanagan and a Valedictory Address by Shelby Kunker. Music Director Kelly Marzano then led the Holley Women's Choir in a performance of "No Day But Today" from the musical "Rent" before Mr. John Heise, former Holley administrator, was introduced as the Speaker for the ceremony.

Before receiving their diplomas, graduates were presented with 51 awards and scholarships totaling \$17,000. Overall, the Holley Class of 2014 earned 500 college credit hours is eligible for up to \$380,000 in specific college scholarships. Supervisor Moy read aloud the written report submitted by President Ierlan:

Joe Fertitta (owner of the stone store building) has donated the repair of the Historical Society school house damage and will be putting a new gutter up also.

I spoke to the Cobblestone Museum Board about getting the Akeley Fox looked at and a condition report done. George Dante in New Jersey will be preparing this report and Mike Oropallo (the gentleman who accompanied John Janelli at the Akeley Celebration) has graciously volunteered to transport it. He is a partner in the law firm Hiscock & Barclay and they have offices in New York City.

The Society's kitchen will have its annual inspection from the Health Department on Wednesday. Cindi Davis and I have cleaned and organized it. Two of our members, Erin and Denise Bedard, assisted the Holley Historical Society as they hosted a rest stop on Monday at the canal bike trek. We are trying to do things together in order to gain more exposure and also to help each other. Erin, Denise and I met with Ann Gavenda and her husband at the Elba Historical Society to look at and scan their photos of the mucklands. We plan on using some of them for the August speaker.

Two senior students from Holley have spent time organizing my files here in the Town Hall. They were here yesterday and plan to return and finish this week. WOW is all I can say. Jessica Skehan and Taylor DeSimone both live in Clarendon. Wednesday, July 16, 2014 at 7PM, Rev. Paul Letiecq will speak on the History of the Universalist Church in Orleans County. Future programs in the planning stages are August 20: Muckland of Orleans and Genesee County; September 17: History of Medina Sandstone; October 15: Roy Bubb's Stories from Manning; November 19: Annual Meeting and elections.

CORRESPONDENCE

Payment has been received from Orleans County for 2013-2014 sanding

and plowing and the first roadside mowing in the amount of \$88,628.45.

The New York State Comptroller has sent a check in the amount of \$1,580.00 for unclaimed funds. Zoning Board of Appeals Chairman, Art Kaminski has fulfilled his requirement of training. Payment for second quarter sales tax has been received from the Orleans County Treasurer in the amount of \$80,819.41. \$1,021 has been received from Orleans County for Solid Waste Collection Fees.

OLD BUSINESS

It was reviewed that Chatfield Engineers is completing the State Environmental Quality Review of Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 11. The Town is waiting on approval from the NYS Comptroller.

The Town Board authorized Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 11 Out-of-District User Status at 4538 County Line Road in the Town of Sweden, NY; Parcel ID 067.04-1-1.101; Ronald & Arlene Miller Property.

Board members looked at drawings submitted by Mr. Strabel, showing possible town hall office changes. At Councilman Nicosia's request for additional time to review options, this item was tabled to August. Supervisor Moy reported that to change the existing structure, the town would need to meet all new codes for handicapped persons. And code now required 'his' and 'hers' bathrooms. Councilman Major felt the cost for reconfiguration as drawn, was too much money and reported his discussion with the Assessor, Court Clerk and Judges; they have an idea worth reviewing. The court has some grant funding that may possibly be used also.

The Board scheduled a public hearing regarding the proposed amendments top the Zoning Laws and Subdivision Regulations; to be held August 19, 2014 at 7:00 PM at the Clarendon Historical Society Museum Barn at the corner of Church Street and NYS Route 31A; AND to schedule a public hearing regarding proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2014 to immediately follow the zoning/subdivision public hear; AND to

schedule the regular meeting to immediately follow the public hearing regarding proposed Local Law No. 1 of 2014, A Local Law Increasing the Maximum Income Eligibility Level for the Senior Citizen Tax Exemption Under Section 467 of the real property Tax Law.

NEW BUSINESS

Budget workshop meetings were scheduled to be held at the Town Hall at 9:00 AM on Tues, Sept. 9, 2014 and if needed, Thurs, Sept. 11, 2014.

Supervisor Moy informed that the speaker at the 9/23/2014 Supervisors/ Legislators Meeting will be from the NYS Comptroller's Office in regard to the tax freeze and tax cap.

Supervisor and Town Clerk did open the three sealed bids received for the wood pile at the Highway Garage on July 14, 2014 at 4:01 PM. The bid was awarded to the highest bid: Richard Moy, Jr. at \$200.00.

The Board adopted a Resolution for 2014 NYS Retirement Standard Work Day & Reporting Correction pursuant to NYS Comptroller Notice of 06/27/2014.

A copy is available on the town website.

Supervisor Moy informed that when the Town's health insurance policy expires on August 31st, the current coverage plan will not be available. A broker came to the town hall today and spoke to employees

about 'Healthy New York' plan through MVP insurance; cost would be approximately \$3522.49 less than the current but has a July 31st deadline to enroll. Supervisor has an appointment with another broker on Friday. Supervisor Moy spoke with the town's current broker two weeks ago about options and hasn't heard anything from her. The Board approved Healthy New York MVP Plan at a decreased cost than the current plan; unless a better

plan is available through another broker on Friday 7/25/14.

The Board adopted Resolutions Opposing expansion of Federal Control under the Clean Water Act and Urging New York State

Public Service Commission to set conditions of company merger for Comcast's proposed buyout of Time Warner creating voting seat on their Board of Directors representing a customer voice and another representing a voice of government.

Councilman Campbell would like the Board to consider tax incentives for people to fix up their houses and mentioned a five year plan. To modify or modernize a home would mean a tax increase; it was suggested a tax break be given on an amount of increase in taxes as an incentive to fix up their home. Supervisor informed that there are currently programs through the state if income eligible. Other Councilmen not in favor; that some people already fix up their homes; that it would create a division. Assessor Davis submitted loss revenue in Thomas Estates due to tax exemptions; school \$187,000; Town \$3000; County \$6300.

The Board amended the Water District Rules and Regulations pursuant to the March 26, 1996 meeting to include "When a vacant property owner is ready to build, the Town will install a water service." Discussion and intent was determined back then, but never was put into the Rules & Regulations.

Superintendent Swanger reported that New York State has *required* 'town and county identifying' license plates on highway department vehicles; all plates have been changed.

Councilman Robinson acknowledged Irene Hammerick's service to Clarendon; she used to clip news articles for the history scrapbooks. Irene has passed away; her service was today. Councilman Robinson would like to thank Irene's family.

Regarding shared services and working together, it was stated that the town needs the County Legislature to help pay (tax) law suits; to share in the legal services. Upstate counties are changing and the county is getting involved. Supervisor and Councilman Robinson will go to the County Legislature with said request.
