CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights July 2015

The Town Board held a public hearing to consider proposed zoning amendments to Section 636 - TRAILER, TRAVEL/CAMPER/RECREATIONAL VEHICLE. Supervisor Moy explained that the ordinance initially allowed using a camper in town for a total of thirty days. Then the Board decided to allow seasonal dwelling permits for up to 180 days/year and removed the 30 day limit. When the Board decided to remove the seasonal dwelling permit, nothing was put back into the ordinance for limited use of a camper. Residents present expressed concern over the fact that the amendment as proposed would leave them physically unable to comply with position and/or setbacks required due to lot size and/or placement of structures on their land. Also mentioned was the proposal to allow only two trailers, campers and recreational vehicles on a private lot at the same time. Residents felt that was harsh; that the amendment was too restrictive and will make it difficult to comply for many. Discussion was held at the meeting following the hearing and board members agreed to add that the Zoning Officer have authority to issue a non-compliance letter to residents unable to comply with Sections D, E and F of the amended Section. (After checking with the attorney, this change can be made without an additional public hearing. It will be on the August agenda for adoption.)

OPEN END

Pat Giglio informed that the American Legion Ladies Auxiliary will host a pasta dinner on Sept. 17. Raffle tickets will be sold for cash prizes; to benefit the Batavia and Buffalo VA.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPT REPORT

Superintendent Swanger reported that Clarendon has been working with other towns and the county highway crew. One half mile of Wood Road has been paved, south from LaDue Road. The second roadside mowing has been started. Work has begun to pave Bennetts Corners Road from Taylor Road south to Rte 31A and to pave Taylor Road from Bennetts Corners Road to the county line. The Town Board authorized disposition of the old 10 wheel truck being replaced, at the auction in October; Auctioneer takes 10% off the top. The new truck is being built and should be done in August; then the equipment has to be put on. The truck will be available in September or October. The contractors for Water Improvement Benefit Area 11 are on Glidden Road near South Holley; then will do Merrill Road; then Hinds Road. Water meter readings have been delayed due to a problem with the reader. The problem was fixed today; bills will be out by the end of the month. The lead & copper water testing in 20 homes was done last month; it's required every six months. All hydrants and dead-ends have been flushed. The Village of Holley has offered to spray around the hydrants; Clarendon will pay for the material.

HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Historian Ierlan reported that Ed Evans was the speaker for the Historical Society last month about the CCC Prisoner of War Camp, with about 40 people in attendance. The Historian was able to give Mr. Evans new information on the actual guarry that provided the medina sandstone for the buildings, etc. The O'Brien/DiLaura Quarry on Howard Road was the actual quarry materials came from. Next month, Bill Desiardin will speak about the Bergen Swamp. Work on the Hillside chapel began last week on Thursday with the initial chipping off of loose mortar. The contractor was there again most of the day on Saturday; work is going to be done on the weekends. The Society will help the county historian by repainting one of their historical markers; Russ Bosch will sand blast it; a Holley High School student will do the painting. Historian Ierlan has two other students helping to photograph and catalog the collection at the barn and school house museum. Two additional college students in Derek Mayfield's History Class at Genesee Community College have emailed volunteering to do their service hours with the Historical Society. Historian Ierlan has loaned the town's WWI uniform and accessories with many photographs to the county historian for the upcoming traveling display for the 100 year anniversary of the beginning of WWI. Historian Ierlan is working with a student from Spencerport who has a senior year project that involves community service; she chose to work with the Clarendon Historian and do a family research project. She is the daughter of Lisa Brockway and granddaughter to Linda and John Nielson of Brown Schoolhouse Road.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Moy passed out a line graph, showing a history of town, county, fire and school tax from 1985 to 2012; the town taxes have remained fairly level over the last 30 years. Supervisor reminded all that the August meeting will be at the Historical Society Museum site; free music, hot dogs and drinks. Supervisor Moy reviewed that last winter the private waterline on Route 237 south to Powerline Road froze and two residences were left without water. The Health Department has determined the residents on that line have one year to abandon the un-engineered waterline. After a meeting with these residents, Clarendon will have Chatfield Engineers prepare estimated cost to install a public waterline there instead of digging wells.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Town has received \$79,992.08 in sales tax revenue for the second quarter of the year. The NYS Department of Public Service sent notice of informational forums regarding a study on the state of telecommunications in New York State. Environment New York, a statewide environmental advocacy organization has requested support for EPA's proposed Clean Power Plan. Revenue of \$1021.50 has been received for the solid waste fees collected with tax payments. Orleans County Personnel Office has sent a copy of 2015 payroll salaries for all towns.

OLD BUSINESS

Supervisor Moy reported the WIBA #11 waterline construction on Glidden Road is almost complete; then will do Merrill Road, Hinds Road, Howard Road and County Line Road. Route 237 is expected to be done last.

Board members discussed the Vacant Building Registry. The Village of Medina has adopted it; Supervisor will call the Mayor in a couple of months to see how it's working there.

Councilman Major did visit Clarkson to view their solar system set up. Supervisor reported insurance for a solar system would be \$300-\$400/year if the town owns it. Board members were in agreement to have Larson Engineers come back for another presentation prior to a regular meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

The Board authorized Supervisor Moy to sign an agreement renewal with Municipal Solutions for financial services.

Supervisor Moy and Councilman Robinson spent two days at the Hillside Cemetery picking up garbage; there is more to do. The Village of Holley has offered to help with cutting down the sumac. Superintendent Swanger will meet with Holley officials in the fall to plan it. Construction of the private waterline needs to come first.

The Town Board accepted resignation with regret from Chris White from the Planning Board. Her term on the Board of Assessment Review expires next year and she does not intent to request reappointment.

From your Local Dog Control Officer

Now that the summer is in full swing, after a too long and nasty winter, everyone is eager to go out and enjoy the weather. This includes the four legged, furry members of our family. Please remember that there is a New York State law that requires EVERY DOG four months and older to be licensed in the municipality in which it lives. It doesn't matter if your dog weighs two pounds or two hundred pounds, or if it stays inside your house and doesn't go outside at all. It still has to have a valid license. In order to obtain a license a current rabies certificate is needed. A rabies vaccination for your dog protects it against any rabid animals that it might come in contact with. This is also a public safety issue. Dogs on the loose can chase and bite people. Imagine being bitten by a dog and not knowing if it was vaccinated. Licensing is a good way to make sure that every dog has a current rabies vaccination. License yours today and have a safe and happy summer.



The History of Bergen Swamp

with Bill Des, Jardin

Bill DesJardin has been a trustee for the Bergen Swamp Preservation Society for 16 years and Clarendon resident for 25 years. He is an engineer at ON Semiconductor in Rochester.

His presentation will cover a geological history of the Bergen Swamp from the time when NY State was covered by glaciers to present day. The Swamp's underlying geology was critical for its formation and its continued existence. The uniqueness and biodiversity of the Bergen Swamp will be described through a photo tour of its many rare plants and animals.

Mr. DesJardin will also discuss the history of the 75 year old Bergen Swamp Preservation Society, the motivation for the preservation of the swamp, the early efforts at forming the organization, and the influence it had on the larger land conservation movement.

SPORTSMEN LICENSES GO ON SALE AUGUST 10th

Facts for 2015-2016 Season

Hunting and trapping license year runs from September 1 – August 31.

Annual fishing licenses and the Recreational Marine Fishing Registration are valid for 365 days from the date of purchase.

Deer Management Permits (DMPs) will be available via instant lottery from August 10th through close of business on October 1st.


Lifetime license holders should receive their annual tags prior to September 1, 2015; you don't need this in hand to apply for DMPs.

Lifetime holders of trapping or fishing privileges only, should not expect annual privilege panels to be mailed to them. You should already have a hard plastic ID Card. That's all you'll need to trap or fish.

DEC has adopted new fall hunting seasons for wild turkey. Fall turkey hunting seasons in New York State have been shortened due to a declining turkey populations across the state. The new fall seasons are two weeks long with a statewide season bag limit of one bird of either sex. Season dates vary regionally with the season in the Northern Zone running October 1-14, the Southern Zone running October 17-30 and Suffolk County (Long Island) running November 21-December 4.

Hillside Sketches

Joseph Hess was born July 16, 1850 in Buffalo, NY. When he was 15 he took his first drink of wine when a pretty young lady offered it to him. He was at

this time living on his own and serving as an apprentice of a cooper (barrel maker.) Within four months he had been fired from his job for carousing all night and being less than punctual for his employer. His work was below standards as well.

By the time he was 20, he was married and a father. He owned a bar, and then became involved in the sport of prize fighting. He became very well known for his fighting troupe that traveled town to town. In his mid 30's he returned to Rochester where he heard P.A. Burdick,



the well-known temperance lecturer. He converted to Christ and then lived a devoted life, travelling to speak to others about temperance. His life changed dramatically for the better and for nine years he was devoted to his family and his tireless work as a temperance speaker. His style was described as "not a polished orator, but his originality and enthusiasm make up for minor defects and there are few

more entertaining..."

The reformed prize fighter and pugilist wrote an autobiography called Out of Darkness, Into Light" in 1890 which detailed his early life, his subsequent religious conversion and the importance of a life dedicated to temperance.

Joseph Hess died at his home in Clarendon in 1893. He left behind his wife, Johanna, two daughters and a son. Curiously, his gravestone lists his death in 1892.



The Clarendon Historical Society is planning a presentation on the history of the apple industry in Clarendon this fall.
