


SCOUTING FOR HUNGER














Husband takes the wife to her high school reunion.

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Supervisor Moy introduced Paul and Deb Selke, parents of Greg Selke who has been doing an internship with the Town of Clarendon in helping to prepare a Climate Action Plan. Mr. Selke informed that Greg needs about ten more household energy surveys so his information is statistically valid. Survey responses are completely anonymous. Blank surveys were handed out to those present at the meeting and blank ones left on the table in the back of the meeting room.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT Larry Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reported getting the equipment ready for winter the past month and having to use that equipment the past couple of days plowing the roads! The highway equipment inventory is complete as is the paperwork for CHIPS. Water readings have been done and bills sent out; usage this billing is for four months.

Supervisor Moy questioned the burial scheduled at Hillside Cemetery for the Saturday after Thanksgiving; manpower alone will be \$264. The Town charges \$150 for Saturday and/or Holiday burials. Board in agreement; the Town increased the fee for a Saturday and/or Holiday burial to \$300

Consensus to add reference to Article VI, Section 643 to condition 9, exterior lighting. Hours of operation determined to be 7 am. To 7 pm. Monday through Saturday. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve Special Use Permit and submit to County PB for review.

CORRESPONDENCE

Joanne Best sent letter requesting appointment to the Board of Assessment Review; the Town Board did appoint Ms. Best to the five year seat vacated by John Dellaquila; term to expire 9/30/2019. Partial payment for cemetery restitution was received in the amount of \$190.00. The Genesee Valley Branch of the American Public Works Association has sent notice of its annual award ceremony, recognizing individuals in Public Works; nominations are being requested. Community Action has sent a letter of thanks for the budgeted funding that goes toward operating the Holley Community Center.

OLD BUSINESS

The NYS Comptroller has requested additional data prior to its review of Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 11 project application. Attorney Schubel will contact the Assessor. Because of the delay in Comptroller approval, it is too late to borrow funding for the project this year; it will have to be next year.

The Town Board adopted Local Law No. 3 of 2014, regulating the outside storage of junk material, amending the enforcement of the law. A copy of the law is available at the Clerk's Office or on the web at townofclarendon.org; go to legal notices.

Supervisor Moy reported no need to adopt Local Law No. 4 of 2014 to Override the Tax Cap. The Town Board adopted a final budget for the year 2015. A copy of the budget is available at the Clerk's Office or on the web at townofclarendon.org; on the supervisor or town board members page.

The Town Board scheduled the 2015 Organizational Meeting to be held on January 2, 2015 at 9:00 AM at the Town Hall.
