

Cooperative "Raise and Release" Program Applications Due by March 25

The opening of the application period for the cooperative Day-Old Pheasant Chick Program to enhance opportunities for pheasant hunting in New York has begun, the State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced today.

The program provides pheasant hunting opportunities through a partnership among DEC, sportsmen and sportswomen, 4-H youth groups, and landowners interested in rearing and releasing pheasants. The program is funded through the State Conservation Fund, which is supported by license fees paid by hunters, trappers, and an-The Day-Old Pheasant Chick Program began in the early 1900s, when pheasant eggs and chicks were distributed to farmers and rural youth. Today, dayold chicks are available at no cost to participants who are able to provide a brooding facility, a covered outdoor rearing pen, and an adequate release site. Daily care is necessary to monitor the health of the birds and to ensure there is adequate feed and water for the rapidly growing chicks. The pheasants may be released when they are eight weeks old and no later than Dec. 1. Approved applicants will receive the day-old chicks in April, May, or June. All release sites must be approved in advance by DEC and must be open for public pheasant hunting opportunities. In 2016, DEC distributed more than 34,000 day-old pheasant chicks to qualified applicants. Individuals interested in this program should contact the nearest DEC regional wildlife office for applications and additional information (see information below). Applications must be filed with a DEC regional wildlife manager by March 25. A "Pheasant Rearing Guide" and applications are also available on DEC's website.

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights January 2017

OPEN END

County Legislator John DeFilipps informed that the County intends to replace the culvert bridge on South Holley Road, south of Route 31A, this summer.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Swanger reported salting the roads due to the freezing rain last month. The highway employees have attended the Health Department's first responders training and the Department of Labor's follow-up on inspection was good. One new furnace has been installed at the highway garage and is working well. The second one will be installed in two or three weeks. Triple O is doing the work. The house fire on Munger Road used 40 to 50 thousand gallons of water and there was a controlled burn on LaDue Road. One grave was dug today; another burial is planned for next Saturday.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Moy will meet with Chatfield Engineers tomorrow to look at probable areas for Water District No. 12. Supervisor acknowledged that Art Kaminski, past Zoning Board Chairman, passed away. The Board agreed to waive the additional fee for Saturday burial in Hillside Cemetery for Art. Supervisor Moy presented a pie chart showing the breakdown of taxes paid; School 58% (85% of cost is State and Federal mandates); County 26% (76% of cost is State and Federal Mandates); Town 13%; Fire 3%; Library 1%.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Orleans County Legislature has approved the 2017 sales tax apportionment to towns and villages. It is based on population; Clarendon \$116,260.89. Heritage Wind, LLC sent notice and requested input regarding its proposed turbine project based in the Town of Barre. Chatfield Engineers has sent an engineering service proposal for the Clarendon Hillside Cemetery Chapel Restoration project.

OLD BUSINESS

A request to have the speed limit lowered on Upper Holley Road and Upper Holley Road Extension coming into the hamlet has been sent. We've not yet received a response. Legislator DeFilipps informed that for 2017, the Animal Control Contract with the County will be the same as in 2016.

NEW BUSINESS

The Town Board approved an increase in the water rate of \$.15 per thousand gallons pursuant to an increase to the Town from Monroe County Water Authority. The new rate will be \$3.50 per thousand gallons effective usage from January 1, 2017. The Board authorized expenditure of budgeted highway monies and set \$2.00 each as a bulk rate for over five tires that the highway department takes for residents.


Hillside Sketches

Phoebe Sprague, MD (1846-1904) was born in Holley on December 11, 1846. Her parents were Danly and Eunice Sprague.

Their home site on Geddes Street has been designated with an historical plaque. The last owner of her home was Edna McCrillis Weed. It was dismantled to make room for Merrill's parking lot.

Miss Sprague attended the Holley Academy and the Brockport Collegiate Institute. Her medical training took her to Chicago's Women's Medical College. After moving to Springfield Mass., Dr. Sprague was recognized for her skill and dedication. While there, she devoted her time and talent as an obstetrician at the Home for Friendless Women. Due to poor health, she returned to her home in Holley. She continued to serve as a board member for the House of Refuge for Women of New York State in Albion, and remained active in her various medical societies and the Rebekah She founded the Holley Chapter and served as Worthy Matron. The local chapter was named in her honor. After attending the Holley Academy's first reunion in June 1904, Dr. Sprague died on November 28, 1904 at the age of fiftyseven, two weeks before her fifty-eighth birthday. The stones in the Danly Sprague family's Hillside plot indicate some who are buried there, but didn't indicate Dr. Phoebe Sprague. In 2015, a member of the Clarendon Historical Society had a memorial placed there to honor this outstanding female physician, a native of Holley.

Roy Bubb's latest book, <u>The Family Scrapbook;</u> An Era in Holley's History will cover more detail. Anticipated publishing date is Spring 2017.

"Show Stopper" Articulated Cub Cadet

John Lusk of Clarendon, N.Y., would love to build a full-size articulated tractor, but he doesn't have enough shop space. So he built a small one using a couple of the old Cub Cadet Garden tractors he had collected. Apparently he did a good job because when he took it to an area tractor show a man asked him, "When did International make those?" The retired machinist says articulated vehicles have always fascinated him, and when he dug into the project he thought it would take a month. It ended up taking about 2 1/2 months, with much of the time spent looking for parts he needed. Lusk started with 1969 and 1980 Cub Cadets that he'd purchased for about \$200 total. He cut off the front end of one to make a new rear end. "All the cross members of the tractor had to be cut out and



moved," Lusk says. "The front wheels were set ahead 15 in., so the front end didn't look like it was hanging too far over." It was trial and error to figure out how far he could make it swivel without the wheels touching and how to get the power to the rear end. Lusk made wooden prototypes of knuckles and hinges before making what he needed out of metal. "The hardest part to figure out was how to keep the rear fenders low to the tires yet still have side-to-side swivel," Lusk says. He solved the problem by making the back fenders and hood raise with the tires, when the tires go over a hump. Lusk's final result is a 12 hp articulating Cub Cadet with two 3-speed transmissions and two creeper gears, which help him win "slow" competitions at shows. It also has electric-over-hydraulic steering (electric motor driving a hydraulic pump). With the gears, big tires, other new parts and the \$200 for the old Cadets, Lusk spent \$1,400 on his creation. It can be driven in front-wheel drive, rear-wheel drive or all-wheel drive. 
