



The members of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Company are pleased to announce the recent procurement of a special piece of equipment designed to help those you love the most in a fire or hazardous fumes incident. On December 10, 2012 we received through a generous donation from Wayne Schiavone, owner of Earthworks by Schiavone, a new Wag'n O2 Fur Life pet oxygen delivery system. This system is designed to allow firefighters to administer oxygen to pets rescued from house fires and other hazardous fumes incidents such as carbon monoxide. Recently the members of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Company were trained on the use of the equipment and it was placed in service on Rescue Truck 66. We are pleased to say that the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Company is one of the few agencies in the area with this equipment and we look forward to the continued service to our community. WE NEED YOU!

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Company is actively seeking members of the Clarendon and adjacent communities to join our all-volunteer team. We offer positions in the Emergency Medical and Fire service fields. The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Company owns and operates a Basic Life Support Ambulance requiring Emergency Medical Technicians, and is used to treat and transport members of the community needing medical attention. We also own and operate a heavy rescue which carries our "Jaws of Life" extrication tool, one Engine, one 75' Quint ladder truck, one Tanker which carries 2,000 gallons of water for large fires, and an Off Road Rescue vehicle which has the ability to float and can be used in snow and on dry ground with tracks or tires. In 2012 we responded to 306 calls for service in all weather conditions and all hours of the day. Of those calls 123 were fire type calls which bring the response of a fire truck and 183 were emergency medical calls for persons needing medical treatment. Training is provided as well as personal protective equipment at no cost to you. The basic courses for entry level duties are provided by Orleans County and New York State. The Firefighter 1 course which is required for interior firefighting operations is approximately 90 hours in length. The Emergency Medical Technician Basic is required to treat patients in medical emergencies and is approximately 180 hours in length. We accept ages 14-16 which are classified as Junior Firefighters and are allowed to train with us in-house and help out with duties around the fire house when needed. At the age of 16 members can join or become Restricted Firefighters and are allowed to respond on calls and perform exterior operations on fire scenes with the commands approval. Once a member reaches the age of 18 they can become an interior fire fighter which allows operations entering structures on fire. The age of 18 is also the pre-requisite to become an emergency medical technician and care for patients in need. Drivers of apparatus must be at least 21 years old and will be trained in the use of pumps, ladders, and water supply. If you are interested please stop by the firehouse located at 16169 East Lee Road on a Tuesday evening around 6:30 p.m. or stop in anytime you see a vehicle in the parking lot. We would be happy to provide information, answer any questions, show you around, and give you an application. CLARENDON TOWN BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS January 2013

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Larry Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reported plowing was done in the past month. Water meter readings are complete for the fourth quarter 2012. Work is being done on equipment in the shop.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Richard H. Moy, Supervisor

Supervisor Moy reminded all that the Town Board meeting in February will begin at 1:00 pm. Association of Towns has sent information regarding its annual meeting in New York City. Supervisor Mov sadly acknowledged the loss of Nick Quaranto, Clarendon's Cemetery Administrator. He passed away on January 1st.

CORRESPONDENCE

Monroe County Water Authority has sent notice of increase in water meter base charge rates for wholesale out-ofcounty water districts.

The Town has received a partial restitution payment for

Munger Road Cemetery vandalism from the Orleans County Probation Department.

OLD BUSINESS

Board members discussed the final \$320,000 net savings in refinancing some of the water districts and adopted a Bond Resolution authorizing the issuance of refunding bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$3,300,000; for the purpose of refinancing water districts.

Supervisor Moy felt the board should wait to discuss Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 11 until the Rural Development Agency census information for Clarendon's income is corrected to enable application for grant funding. It was explained that as the income information was omitted from the census, a sampling was done of each town; all high income households were included from Clarendon.

The Board amended the Clarendon Water Rules and Regulations, Section 31(A) to authorize a 15% late payment penalty added to bills not paid

within 30 days following the billing Board members did date. authorize informational letters be sent to water customers informing them of adopted water regulation changes.

NEW BUSINESS

The Town Board re-appointed Supervisor Richard H. Moy as Marriage Officer for the Town of Clarendon.


