OPEN END

Steve Kibler, Hall Road resident, gave copies of Clarendon Zoning Ordinance Section 719 (Alternative Energy Systems – Solar Energy) to Board Members. He explained that he has solar energy and has been issued a special permit. Mr. Kibler requested the special permit portion of the ordinance be changed; that he objects to the annual inspection and renewal fee. Mr. Kibler has checked with a couple other towns and found they do not require the permit and annual fee. Supervisor Moy stated this item will be put on the January agenda.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Larry Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reported plowing snow most of the month; that this has been the worst December he's seen in the past 24 years. Gravel roads were graded before the snow came. Four graves were dug last month. The weather is now making it difficult to measure/find grave sites so storage in the chapel may be necessary.

Discussion was held regarding purchase of a new John Deere mower for Hillside Cemetery. Superintendent reported over 700 hours on the current machine. Lakeland Equipment will take that for a trade-in on a new tractor. The Board did authorize purchase of John Deere Select Series X304 Tractor with 4 Wheel Steer and 42X Edge Xtra Deck at a cost of \$1404.49 after trading in 2012 John Deere X304-1MOX304ACCM222077 for \$1980.

CORRESPONDENCE

Central Orleans Volunteer Ambulance (COVA) has sent a request that the Town send a letter of support to expand their Certificate of Need to include all of Orleans County. The Town Board held its 2014 Organizational Meeting on January 2nd approving the annual designations and appointments. Supervisor Moy was reappointed Marriage Officer, term to expire 12/31/2015.
