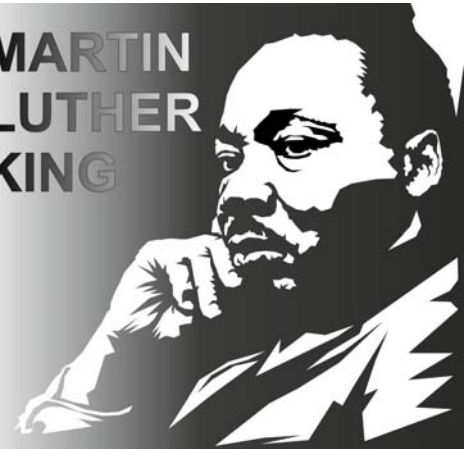

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE BOARD

Workforce Literacy – Will be offering literacy services to local employers. We are also reaching out to Genesee Community College and ten other major businesses in the interest of collaborating efforts.

Adult Literacy – IN 2013-2014 several people are working on basic literacy, ESL and math. There were 21 tutors with 343 teaching hours. Age ranges of clients are 9 to 71. We will start the new year with 22 tutors.

Family Literacy Program – This year we completed our third year at ABCD Holley. Three tutors worked with sixteen children who showed above par readiness skills when they started Kindergarten in September. ABCD Newfane services eleven students and will continue to provide services.

Tutors – We will continue to support the Albion and Medina Liberty Partnership program at the middle school level.

Nominating Committee – Discussed responsibilities and job descriptions of board members. Don Colquhoun was familiar with board responsibilities at a state level and he offered to help make a few changes to our job descriptions. He also suggested we add a conflict of interest policy and continued board of director training. It was decided that we will recruit more board members and more evenly share the workload. We also discussed the need to regroup the board list so that all board members don't rotate off the list at the same time.

Please remember that speakers are available to talk to various groups about our organization and programs and to present opportunities for volunteer work.

**Hillside Chapel endeavors to win grant money
in 2014 fell short of a very aggressive grant
writing campaign.**

Unfortunately we applied for and did not receive a grant from the NYS Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation department for \$125,000. Also, we did not receive the grant for \$25,000 for which we applied through the Rochester Community Foundation.

However, the Historical Society has so far raised \$6,421.25 in cash donations towards the project and is brainstorming additional fundraising ideas. We have informational brochures soliciting tax deductible donations distributed throughout the community, including at the library and churches.

The Historical Society has been granted \$4,500 towards masonry repairs by the Elisabeth Dye Curtis Foundation.

We will continue to pursue the funds to do a proper restoration of this “Five to Revive” property. Any and all help, advice and ideas are welcome!

AM I A HOARDER?

It all started innocently enough, my collecting. The belief that I could never become a hoarder kept me from worrying about holding onto Venetian-blind parts, assorted wire, strings and cords, electric parts along with numerous extension cords, and partial cans of paint. Those three cabinets with multiple drawers filled with nails, screws, tacks, paper clips, eyeglass repair kits, and many other items too numerous to name or even to remember in what drawer any of those items are to be found, didn't register as a problem.

My main toolbox in the shed is filled to overflowing. I have at least half-a-dozen or more of every socket made including metric sizes except for the one I need at any particular time. Screwdrivers with socket and tip sets are scattered throughout along with various pliers and some weird tools painted yellow and green. That color means that my father, who passed in 1974, had them in one of his toolboxes. Some of those toolboxes also sit in my shed.

Under our bed are two large containers containing hundreds of photographs along with yearbooks and other memorabilia. Once a year or so we might look through them, usually to find a particular picture.

Grandchildren and other relatives seem to think that we have inexhaustible places to display gifts of pictures, statues, fancy bowls, and all manner of other nick-knacks. We don't, as totes stashed everywhere can attest to. We can't even get rid of them at a garage sale because, Heaven forbid, that one of the gift givers should happen by. That would be worse than re-gifting.

During World War 11 it was a criminal act to hoard food. We remember that, but no matter how hard we try to use everything up, our cupboards seem to attract more food than we can eat. I can blame it on our experiences during the depression and the rationing during wartime that caused us to feel more secure with an overflowing larder. I guess I'll just have to find a use for those really old cans of Fava Beans that sit in the back.

Our clothing has become too abundant to fit our closets and shelves anymore. My weight changes give me an excuse to keep those that don't fit, at least that is what I tell myself. I don't know if that excuse covers my holding on to my Korean-era marine boots and sea-bag because I doubt that I'll be called up again. If I ever am, watch out! The country is about to take a "deep six".

As I look at all these items I find very few to throw away without worrying that I might need them sometime in the future. So, am I a hoarder?

THE MANNING DISTRICT #11 SCHOOLHOUSE was donated by Mr. & Mrs. Jim Gaylord to a newly formed Clarendon Historical Society in 1986. It was moved from Manning (the northwest corner of Manning Road and East Lee Road (NYS Route 31A) nicknamed "Mudville") on a flatbed by Jeff Farley, Riggers & Movers of Lockport, NY to its present location at 16426 Fourth Section Road in Clarendon. The Schoolhouse is used on the Society's Museum Site to house artifacts and to educate residents on life in a 'one room schoolhouse'. As a school, the building sat on a mortar and stone foundation; it now sits on a cellar foundation. The Historical Society has also constructed a barn at the Museum Site that is used to house artifacts and old farm equipment.

DECEMBER 2014

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Larry P. Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reported being busy with snow removal for a week. Since then, the highway crew has been busy patching holes and cutting trees in danger of falling in the road.

Superintendent Swanger reported collecting twenty water samples for copper and lead testing. One burial was held at Hillside Cemetery – on Thanksgiving weekend.

Supervisor Moy requested help from the Highway Department to move office furniture/items on January 16th. The construction project on the offices will begin January 19, when no one is in the office. Supervisor reported receiving two bids for carpet today but that one did not use prevailing wage.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman Griggs submitted the following written report:

A. Planning Board appointment recommendations. A motion was made, seconded and approved to submit the following recommendations for appointment to the Planning Board to the Town Board for their consideration and approval;

David R. Griggs, Planning Board Chairman, one (1) year term to expire 12/31/2015.

Kevin Johnson, Planning Board Deputy Chairman, one (1) year term to expire 12/31/2015.

Nicholas Bianchi, Alternate Planning Board member, one (1) year term to expire 12/31/2015 (Conditional on completion of required training).

B. Special Permit renewal, SP 94-004, Diann Hillabush, 4229

Fancher Rd. Chairman Griggs informs the board that the fee has been paid, inspection is done and there are no complaints received. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve renewal of SP 94-005.

HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Supervisor Moy reported on behalf of Historian/President Ierlan that the Society has speakers lined up for its monthly meetings in 2015.

ATTORNEY REPORT

David C. Schubel, Attorney

This being his last Clarendon Town Board meeting, Attorney Schubel expressed appreciation for the Clarendon Town Board, its readiness for meetings in that the Council reads its correspondence. Attorney Schubel shared that he has enjoyed the past eight years working with the Town, the Assessor and Planning Board Chairman on the different things that have come up. Supervisor Moy thanked Attorney Schubel for his simple, down to earth approach on legal issues and presented him with a 'Clarendon' coffee mug and t-shirt.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Richard H. Moy, Supervisor

Supervisor Moy wished all present Happy Holidays. Supervisor Moy thanked the Town Board and employees for staying under the tax cap with the budget, keeping it flat from 2014 to 2015. Supervisor Moy expressed appreciation for the good office staff at the Town Hall. He reported that each morning people gripe at him with comments on how to do business at the town and informed that it is a hard job; that all town employees try to please most of the people. Supervisor reported receipt of \$190.48 toward court loss restitution.

CORRESPONDENCE

Association of Towns has sent a report regarding recommended amendments to the association constitution and by-laws. Village of Holley Department of Electric/

Water has sent information showing fuel sources and air emission used to generate the power used for the year 2012. Orleans County Legislature has sent the distribution of mortgage tax receipts from April 1 through September 30, 2014; Clarendon received \$15,725.35. The apportionment of the 2015 Sales Tax to Towns/Villages was approved; Clarendon will receive \$116,260.89. Only one town will receive a higher amount. Clarendon's self insurance 2015 assessment is \$34,280 and \$879 for the Fire Company; total due \$35,159.00.

OLD BUSINESS

Attorney Schubel reported that he has been supplying the Comptroller's Office with items in regard to the Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 11 project application. Attorney Schubel confirmed each water project application seems to have a different process. The Town Board adopted a Resolution imposing lateral restrictions within WIBA No. 11 boundaries in Orleans County Ag District No. 2, limiting connections to public water supply only to existing non-farm uses and to farm related uses.

NEW BUSINESS

The Board appointed Clarendon resident Amy DiFante to the remainder of a five year term on the Board of Assessment Review; term to expire September 30, 2017. Abstract 13 was authorized for payment of year-end bills. The Board accepted the proposed Animal Control Agreement with the County for 2015 at the annual cost of 2766.24. At the Town Planning Board recommendation, the Town Board recommended the County Legislature make the following appointments to the County Planning Board: Kevin Johnson, Full Representative and Russ Bosch, Alternate Representative. Dave Griggs was reappointed to a five year term on the Town Planning Board; term to expire 12/31/2019. Marge Morse was reappointed to a five year term on the Town Zoning Board of Appeals; term to expire 12/31/2019. The Town Board adopted Resolutions in support of the County's request to the State to amend insurance law; confirming a Brown Schoolhouse Road property within Water District No. 3 and accepting affirmation of Highway/Cemetery Equipment Audit.
