CLARENDON RESIDENTS TAKE NOTICE that the Town Board of the Town of Clarendon has introduced the following amendments to the Zoning Ordinance (changes in italics) and scheduled a Public Hearing to be held July 21, 2015 at 6:30 PM at the Clarendon Town Hall, 16385 Church Street. Anyone wishing to speak in favor of or in opposition to said amendments may do so at this hearing. ALSO BE ADVISED that the Regular Monthly Meeting will begin upon close of the public hearing.

SECTION 636 -TRAILER, TRAVEL/CAMPER/RECREATIONAL VEHICLE

- Travel trailers, campers and recreational vehicles shall not be used in Lieu of permanent storage, nor shall they be used in lieu of a permanent residence.
- Travel trailers, campers, and recreational vehicles lawfully located within an approved campground, or where permitted as a seasonal dwelling, may be occupied for a period not to exceed 180 days per calendar year. (Rev. 6/19/2007)
- Travel trailers, campers, and recreational vehicles lawfully located on a private lot may be occupied on an overnight basis for a period not to exceed 30 days per calendar year.
- No more than two travel trailers or campers and recreational vehicles shall be parked on a private lot at the same time.
- Ε. Travel trailers and, campers and recreational vehicles lawfully located on a private lot shall be positioned in the side yard or rear yard of the lot.
- Travel trailers and, campers and recreational vehicles lawfully located on a private lot shall comply with the setbacks required for residential buildings in the respective zoning district.
- Any/All Travel trailers, or campers and recreational vehicles occupied on an overnight basis shall be equipped with self contained potable water and sanitary sewage collection, comply with all applicable health standards (potable water and waste disposal).. (Cont. on pg 7)

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CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights June 2015

OPEN END

Resident Pat Giglio reported that several years ago, prisoners were brought in to clear out the terraces in the Hillside Cemetery and suggested that be done again. Paul does a good job, but is only one and there's a lot to be done

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Larry Swanger reported 200-250 tires picked up in May. The Highway crew has been changing culvert pipes and fixed the very bad spots on Chugg Road. Superintendent Swanger reviewed that the waterline will be going down Chugg Rd shortly. There were large branches that had come down from a tree in Hillside Cemetery; that has been cleaned up. Roads have been graded as has the Fire Company parking lot. Having the equipment, the Clarendon crew replaced a water service line under the road at Hillside Cemetery. Four graves have been dug in the last five weeks and there is one more this week. The first roadside mowing is complete and the County side mower has spent seven days in Clarendon, cutting brush back and trimming ditches. Superintendent Swanger reported his intention to pave Wood Road 1/2 mile down south from LaDue Road. Attendance at the Water conference and then the Highway conference in Ithaca went well. Councilman Campbell suggested some of the big trees be taken down at the cemetery. Superintendent Swanger agreed but confirmed not having the manpower or money in the budget. Supervisor will check on the possibility of having prisoners there to work.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Moy reported the joint public hearing scheduled for next Tuesday at 7:00 PM at the Clarendon Town Hall with the Town of Barre in regard to possible court consolidation. Supervisor Moy accepted an invitation from the Holley Student Council to speak to them about politics and volunteering. A thank you card has been received. We've received formal confirmation that The Sommerfeldt House at 5482 Holley Byron Road has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places, recognizing the importance of the property to the history of our country and providing it with a measure of protection. In addition, owners of income producing properties may qualify for federal and/or state income tax benefits.

CORRESPONDENCE

New York Municipal Insurance Reciprocal (NYMIR) has sent notice that the rates for 2015 will remain the same. The Town has received \$26.735 from the NYSDOT for severe winter conditions in accordance with our snow and ice agreement. A partial payment of \$190 was received in restitution payment for cemetery vandalism. NYS Real Property has sent notice of final telecommunications ceiling for assessments; Verizon is \$177,048 and Frontier is \$1,915. NYS Real Property has sent notice that the Town's tentative equalization rate is 100%. MVP Health care, if approved, will change the insurance group premium by 2.48%. Supervisor Moy and Assessor Davis will meet with another insurance company representative next week. The Community Foundation has received the submitted proposal for funding for the preservation goal for Hillside Chapel Restoration. The Orleans County Legislature has sent a rebuttal to the Village of Medina regarding sales tax distribution. Supervisor Moy agreed with points made by the County. The Orleans County Legislature has authorized distribution of Mortgage Tax Receipts received October 2014 through March 2015; Clarendon has received \$17,020.98. A copy of the report submitted for The Government Efficiency Plan by the County has been received. Supervisor stated Clarendon was the first to submit its information and feels the report shows good results. A satisfactory report was received from NYS Agriculture & Markets for the June inspection at the Orleans County Animal Shelter.

OLD BUSINESS

A pre-construction meeting with the engineer and contractor for WIBA #11 project is scheduled for 6/18/2015 at 9:00 AM. The contractor would like to

begin the project on 7/1/3/2015. Suggested changes in the Employee Handbook were reviewed and approved by Board Members. Orleans County District Attorney Joe Cardone addressed the Board about court consolidation. He confirmed that the DA, Public Defender and County officials schedule Court DA Nights around the Judges docket and will be there as the Judge requests. Justice DiFante felt DA night not to be a deciding factor. Mr. Cardone felt consolidation would benefit the town in that it will have a second judge at no additional cost; that revenues stay in the town where the matter happens. Trying to consolidate to an East, West and Central Court system in the county will only be consistent with what the towns want. The west end is consolidated now. To consolidate Barre and Clarendon now makes the most sense due to timing. Clarendon Justice DiFante stated that as a judge, consolidation doesn't make a big difference; that the court clerks have expressed concerns. There would be an expense to add a judge to the town SEI court software. If someone sentenced in the Barre Court wants to pay a fine in Clarendon, the court will have to accept it, according to the NYS Comptroller's Office, making more work for the clerks. DA Cardone was unsure of that and reviewed that the Shelby Ridgeway Court share a facility, so it wouldn't be a problem. It is unknown how Yates handles the books in such a situation; this will be discussed at the public hearing. Justice DiFante suggested that as Barre is already down to one judge, that Clarendon go down to one judge and the towns remain separate for one year to see how it works. Temporary coverage as needed can be handled between the judges; Judge Punch will assign a justice to cover for a long term absence, that expense to be paid by the town. Supervisor Moy and Justice DiFante believe the court load can be handled by a single justice. Justice DiFante feels this consolidation is being rushed without enough detailed discussion between the towns; that it could be discussed further during the year and if the towns felt at that time consolidation would be beneficial or that going back to two judges would be best, do it then. DA Cardone will reach out to a judge and clerk on the west end of the county for attendance at the public hearing. There was not the required quorum of the Barre Town Board at the joint public hearing on the 23rd, so it was considered an informational meeting rather than an official public hearing. Town and County Officials present were introduced and Supervisor Moy reviewed options for the towns; after a public hearing, the towns would need to adopt resolutions to move forward. If one town decided not to consolidate, it would be a dead issue. Items confirmed from the meeting with Supervisors, Judges and Court Clerks from both towns were reported; if consolidated: Clarendon and Barre would be one court, but each would operate from its own facility; bank accounts for each Justice would be needed in each town; the revenue would stay in the town of the event; grant funding is available at \$12,000 per town. This is a matching funds grant and would be used to help fray cost of expenses in considering the consolidation. If consolidation takes place, the other 50% of the funding would be available. The Town of Barre already has one justice; Clarendon can too if a resolution is adopted, subject to permissive referendum (vote).


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
Híllsíde Sketches

One of the most evocative gravestones in Hillside is near the north end, east of South Holley Road. Look for a broken column (symbolizes loss of head of the family) draped with cloth (symbol of loss and mourning) topped by an urn (symbol of the body as a temporary vessel for the soul.) The family name is Buddery.

Upon reading the stone, you will see that it memorializes John W. Buddery. John was married to Mary Youngs. They lived in Hulberton and he died in 1888. The most striking part of this stone is discovered when you read the other inscriptions. Four of John and Mary's five children are also included. They all died within weeks of their father. The oldest was 7 years old. A little research will tell you that they died of diphtheria. Only Mary and her infant child survived, although both were struck ill. It was thought that Mary somehow developed a resistance to the disease and passed her immunity onto her nursing child. Diphtheria is an infectious disease caused by bacteria. Starting with flu like symptoms it can lead to respiratory failure or death due to a



pseudo membrane formation that blocks the airway. A vaccine was developed in the 1920's and in countries such as ours, where vaccination is common, the disease is seldom heard of today. Reflecting on this stone, one can appreciate the difficult challenges that our ancestors faced from disease and be thankful for what modern medicine can do.


CLARENDON PERSONALITY—Hill Bill



Niel William "Bill" Nielsen, better know to Gazette readers as 'Hill Bill', passed away at 81 years of age on June 3, 2015 at Strong Memorial Hospital. Born October 18, 1933, Bill was a Greenwich. CT

native and moved to the Rochester area after serving in the United States Marine Corps. He was a resident of Clarendon for the past eight years, moving from Kendall. He was preceded in death by his wife of 55 years, Janet Sealy Nielsen, who recently passed in December 2014. Bill served in Korea with the United States Marine Corps from 1953-1956, after which he did many things professionally. He retired and discovered his passion for writing. He authored two publications: a technical book on the button-dyeing process, which he co-authored, and a fictional book called "The Qaakil," which was recently rere-

leased under the title of "Passion and Pandemonium." Bill's life was celebrated by many from fishing, book clubs and friends that he made along the way using his strong, magnetic personality at the Kendall United Methodist Church on Friday, June 12th. I've been in contact with Bill's



daughter Lorrie who said that Bill so enjoyed writing for the Gazette; that it gave him a deep sense of purpose and helped him to branch out with writing his book. I know the entire Gazette Community shares the loss of our Hill Bill. Lorrie said that to say she will miss him would be like saying that she is going to miss breathing. Due to her own health issues, Lorrie could not attend her father's service but sent me the following:

My Dad was born just a few years after the crash of the stock market on the brinks of WW II and into a family that faced the ups and downs of the economy along with the rest of the world. He lost his beloved brother Eddy to WWII something that he never really got over.

He spoke of simpler times when relationships were created based on face to face interactions. Friends made by bringing your pole down to the local fishing hole or simply climbing trees. Not unlike scenes from the Little Rascals

with pocketbooks filled with rocks dragged by a string with cousins on a lazy Sunday afternoon placed perfectly on a gravel road. He fought for our country in the Korean War, pieces of him lost there never to be found again. Something he spoke of seldom yet the damage done to him seen easily if you made the mistake of accidentally touching him to wake him as an automatic response of self preservation, his fist would jet out faster then a jack in the box. Or the way that he would walk in agony without his inserts in his shoes due to months of walking with no socks and broken boots in freezing cold weather. As I type this now it brings tears to my eyes. Now we speak of words like Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. Then it wasn't even discussed. I wonder if it would have made a difference at all in his life.

He strove to be the best that he could be in all that he tried. He loved to cook, write, fish, paint, make people laugh, watch the birds, garden, shop for unusual items at garage sales, car rides around the lake enjoying each and every mile but most importantly, he enjoyed living. He lived each and every day to its fullest and tried to do all that he could for those around him. Even when he purchased his new car he wanted to be sure it had room to help transport friends to local events in the community so that they were not stuck in their homes.

I'm not going to sit here and say that he was a saint. If he was his soul would have had no reason for being here. Dad was Dad, he got into mischief however he was loved by all and we all were so lucky he was here with us. He did do something that we all should be doing though is strive to be as perfect as we can be...expecting to fall and to get up and keep trying.

To me at times my Father was my hero...not unlike Superman. Some of my favorite moments involve my Dad putting me on the back of his bike for a family bike ride through the Brockport and the SUNY College. I felt secure and safe....nothing could catch me. The way I would keep my eyes closed even if I woke up on the way from someplace in the car just so he would have to carry me inside. I often wonder if he knew and did it anyhow. Of course doing that at age 17 he finally said one day "Lorrie, your awake come on go inside" (just joking!) He taught me how to fish, placing my finger on the line waiting to feel the little vibration on the line teaching me patience. He taught me how to cook the family recipes that always came along with a family story he recalled.

With each season came another event for our family. During the fall there were walks, scarecrows and big family dinners. With winter came snow perfect for sledding parties and his homemade hot chocolate and cookies for all. A trip to the favorite sledding hill that seemed to go on forever sitting on that toboggan with a smile from ear to ear, never once thinking he could have been tired of walking up that doggone hill with me and younger brother in tow. After all, all we did was sit there! With spring came Easter egg hunts, fishing, picnics at the lake with family and gardening. With summer came more lake time and the long awaited two week yearly trip to Canada. Looking back now we were blessed.

As I grew older and began a life of my own I no longer took the time to hear his stories, or wanted to be there as he made Christmas Cookies or the family kuchen and not once did he ever complain. As I moved away with my husband to St Louis he and I talked but our conversations lacked true substance more of ships passing in the night because we had our translator, my Mother that filled in the gap. Upon her passing six months ago we found each other again. My mother no longer here to bridge the gap between us we had to discuss issues we had with each other and resolve them. We found a way back to each other as such our relationship became stronger then ever before. I was that little child again on the back of my Dad's bike feeling like he could conquer the world. We talked morning and night and in between on the phone. He spoke of his new challenges being without Mom and his newly found friends that were helping him to create a new life, his donut buddy, his ride-around-the-lakeburger-bird watching friend and all of his church buddies. We exchanged recipes our recent writings and exchanged our deepest fears locked in each of us from the rest of the world with a key. We were blessed to have mended our fences and found each other again on a level we should have had all along. It is my sincerest hope that whoever hears this does the same with those that they love. Dad was able to quickly forgive and forget and differentiate the difference between something worth worrying about and something to let go of. He was capable of not taking other persons actions personally even if directed towards him. I can only hope that someday I am able to do the same. To be half the person he was on this level I would be happy with.

In closing, during moments when tears stain my face, I find myself desperately wanting for my phone to ring with him on the other end. I will strive to remember the moments he would want me to. Like the time he wanted the kids to laugh at the family holiday party and he put olives in his eyes never thinking about the vinegar and its impact. Or the times he would ask me while camping in Canada what I wanted for breakfast and I would request wild strawberry or blueberry pancakes and he would literally go and find them in the woods and make them. To me no big deal as a kid, but now as an adult I am amazed. Most importantly what I will remember is his ability to rebuild himself over and over no matter what knocked him down, he was going to get back up and try again. Try he did and never stopped. For him life was not wasted. He lived it to its fullest.

Thank you to all of you...his extended family in the church and the community that were there with him at the buffalo dinners, BBQ's, community center events, family at the Gazette, church picnics, holidays and more. Always know that you were cherished and spoken of often. He was grateful for each and every one of you as am I for the joy you brought into his life.

It was reviewed that overall, consolidation would not show a big savings. District Attorney Cardone offered that the Towns can 1) Do nothing, electing a second justice at the November election; 2) Maintain separate courts, each with one justice; 3) consolidate to one court. Board members discussed the vacant building registry. Clerk to provide board members with the Village of Medina policy. Board members discussed Solar Power; Councilman Major will visit solar sites and look more in depth regarding their savings. Councilman Robinson has attended a seminar on this and feels that the grant funding and free electric in ten years may be worth it; that the panels should be on the ground, not a roof mount. It was said that 1" severe hail will break through the glass; that the town can own or lease the system and it's considered to have a 20 to 30 year life before repair is needed. Supervisor Moy will check on cost of insurance for a solar system.

NEW BUSINESS

The Board adopted a resolution approving an Amendment to the 2015/2016 Snow & Ice Contract Extension as prepared by New York State Department of Transportation including a cost increase for fuel for the 2014/2015 winter season. Planning Chairman Dave Griggs explained the reason for the proposed zoning amendment. The Ordinance initially allowed using a camper in town for a total of thirty days. Then the Board decided to allow seasonal dwelling permits for up to 180 days/ year and removed the 30 days limit. When the Board decided to remove the seasonal dwelling permit, nothing was put back into the ordinance for limited use of a camper. There are currently two seasonal dwelling permits that have grandfathered use as long as the permit fee is paid each year. Supervisor Moy read aloud optional language for camper use limitations as prepared:

- * Travel trailers, campers, and recreational vehicles lawfully located on a private lot may be occupied on an overnight basis for a period not to exceed 30 days per calendar year.
- Alternate language for consideration Travel trailers, campers and recreational vehicles lawfully located on a private lot may be occupied on an overnight basis for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) days per calendar year. Additional time may be granted by requesting a camping permit issued by the OIO. Up to two (2) camping permits may be issued per calendar year. Each camping permit shall be issued for a maximum of fifteen (15) days. Permit fee to be determined by the Town Board of the Town of Clarendon.

The Board introduced the amendments to the Zoning Ordinance to include the initial 30 day limit on use of campers and scheduled a public hearing (see notice on front page).



PROPOSED ZONING AMENDMENTS cont from pg 1

- H. No "gray water" or sewage shall be drained or dumped from any camper except into such collection vehicles or septic disposal systems approved by the Orleans County Health Department for such purpose.
- I. All Travel trailers, campers and recreational vehicles shall maintain and display a current license/registration/inspection as required by the State of New York.
- J. No skirting, permanent tie downs, attachments to permanent buildings, attachment to a permanent foundation, electrical supply, water supply, natural gas, or septic system shall be allowed for *Travel trailers*, campers and recreational vehicles lawfully located on a private lot.
- K. No Travel trailers, campers, and recreational vehicles shall park or remain parked on any public thoroughfare within the Town of Clarendon for a period to exceed four (4) hours.


History Helpers


