CLARENDON TOWN BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

May 2013

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Larry Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reported ditch work done around town. Approximately 200 tires were collected during the tire pick-up. A couple of people paid for additional tires to be taken. There are 400-500 tires at the highway garage to get rid of; cost to rid of them was estimated between \$600 and \$800.

Bodies held in the Hillside Chapel over the wintertime have been buried. Additional gravel has been put on gravel roads and the first roadside mowing has been started. The highway crew helped the Town of Barre with roadwork for a few days.

Superintendent reported revenue from equipment taken to the Palmyra auction; John Deer Mower \$1600; 2008 Chev pick-up \$12000; 1996 Equipment Trailer \$4000; 1999 Sterling Dump \$20,000. Net income \$33,840 after 10% was paid to auction.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

James Moore, President

President Moore reported 'spring clean-up' at the museum site tomorrow. Roy Bubb has donated four items to the Society for a fund-raising raffle; two Father Christmas figures, an elf riding on a llama and a woolen sheep. These things were hand made in New Hampshire. The raffle winners will be pulled at the CHS November 2013 meeting. Next month, President Moore will have information on this year's activities.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Richard H. Moy, Supervisor

Supervisor Moy reviewed services planned for Memorial Day. The Town Clerk has been working with the Supervisor on updating the Town Emergency Plan. It will be submitted to Paul Wagner at the County Emergency Management Office for review prior to adoption.

At Supervisor Moy's request, Historian Ierlan presented donated artifact items from the old Bennetts Corners Schoolhouse. The schoolhouse used to be located on the northeast side of corner at Bennetts Corners Road and

NYS Route 31A. Harry Warren, property owner, donated two bells and a book/ ledger from 1862 that documented purchases and expenses. Numerous postcards with photos of Clarendon, Holley and Niagara Falls were also donated.

Supervisor Moy acknowledged Community Service work done at the Hillside Cemetery by Kyle Ierlan, Dalton Major and Jacob Downey, supervised by Melissa Ierlan and Joanne Major. The team cleaned old stones and stood up stones that had fallen or been pushed over. Thank you.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Town has received a distribution of mortgage tax receipts received 10/1/2012 through 3/31/2013 in the amount of \$17,854.17. Supervisor commented that this amount is higher than usual for the first check of the year.

The town received its share of Traffic Diversion Program revenues for the period of January through March 2013 in the amount of \$1,597.32.

Notice from New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation has been received that the Hillside Cemetery has been listed on the State Register of Historic Places. Nomination will be forwarded to the National Register in Washington, D.C.

Partial restitution payment for cemetery vandalism has been received in the amount of \$190.00

Resident Deb Day has sent a thank you to the Board for its action against the NY SAFE Act.

Genesee & Orleans County Youth Bureaus have offered activities to municipal park programs this summer at no cost.

Orleans County Legislature has sent copies of their adopted resolution concerning total repeal of NY SAFE Act.

Supervisor Moy read aloud a notice from the U.S. Postal Service, informing that effective 6/1/2013, the Clarendon Post Office will provide four hours of window service each weekday from 1-5 PM and on Saturday from 10AM to 12 Noon. Customers will have access to post office boxes from 8:15AM to 5:15PM Monday through Friday and from 8:30AM to 12:15 PM on Saturday.

The Town has received two partial payments for restitution of court money; \$100 and \$95.24.

OLD BUSINESS

OIO reported that the Fertittas hired someone to prepare septic system plans for the Old Stone Store property within a couple of weeks. The Fire Company pumped six inches of water out of the building basement. Supervisor will meet again with the Fertittas if the town hasn't heard anything by next week.

Supervisor Moy confirmed that Financial Advisor Jeff Smith of Municipal Solutions and John Schepp of Chatfield Engineers will be present at the Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 11 informational meeting scheduled for June 18 at 6pm, prior to the regular meeting. All properties within the possible boundaries will receive a notice of the meeting in the mail. No one from the Town of Sweden will initially be involved in the project.

Supervisor Moy reported town board concerns regarding the County Communications System Tower Ground Lease Agreement; Attorney Schubel will look into making changes.

NEW BUSINESS

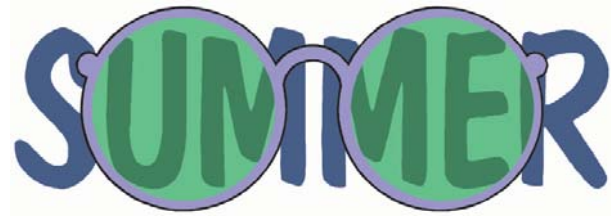
Board members discussed the 4.30 acres of vacant land on Brown Schoolhouse Road; Parcel 108.-1-12.23. The following Town Board Resolutions were adopted: Authorizing Municipal Deposits by Supervisor and/or Deputy Supervisor; Authorizing Municipal Deposits by Town Clerk; In Support of NYS Senate Bill S1894-An Act to Amend the Correction Law in Relation to Requiring Inmates to Make Medical Co-Payments; Calling for complete Repeal of the New York SAFE Act; Urging the State to Adopt Laws that do not impose Further Fiscal Stress on Local Governments and Taxpayers and Build Upon Recent Efforts to Reform Costly Unfunded Mandates.

Supervisor Moy will follow-up with the County Real Property Office in having the owner's name changed on the portion of Hillside Cemetery property located in the Village of Holley. It still reads Hillside Cemetery Association; should be Town of Clarendon.
