

May 21, 2014 was our Celebration for Carl Akeley's 150th Birthday at the Clarendon Fire Company Recreation Hall. This event was attended by over 150 people. The Clarendon Historical Society arranged for speakers and had refreshments.

Jay Kirk, author of Kingdom Under Glass read from his book, John Janelli a taxidermy historian from New Jersey gave a presentation and played a short film that was condensed from about 40 hours of film. It showed the process one would go through to mount and make a diorama. Mike Oropallo a partner in a Syracuse Law Firm, Hiscock & Barclay and contributor to Breakthrough Magazine was on hand to present the Historical Society with a letter written by the Blomquists (publishers of Breakthrough Magazine) along with the Carl Akeley medallion featuring Carl Akeley on one side at age 19 and Jumbo the elephant on the other. This is given out each year to the top taxidermists in each category that enter a world competition. A list of all the names that have received this medallion since its beginning was also presented.

John Janelli also presented the president of the historical society, Melissa Ierlan with a copy of one of Akeley's death masks from a gorilla named "the Old Man of Mikeno" given by The Conservation Force and John J. Jackson III.

This was a wonderful evening and the amount of people who came out in honor of Carl Akeley was overwhelming. There is still such pride about this young man from Clarendon who worked tirelessly his entire life to make sure that people would know about the animals he thought would be extinct one day. The contributions he made in his lifetime are still well known since his death in November 1926.

CREATING A CLIMATE ACTION PLAN FOR THE TOWN

Hello residents of Clarendon,

My name is Greg Selke. I am currently a graduate student finishing my Masters in Professional Studies degree in Environmental Policy and Democratic Processes at The SUNY college of Environmental Science and Forestry in Syracuse. I also graduated from college just down the road from Clarendon at the College at Brockport in 2012 with a Bachelor's degree in Environmental Science.

Over the past century we have seen a dramatic increase in global temperatures as a result of the emission of greenhouse gases from burning fossil fuels. According to NASA, the 2000s was the warmest decade on record. 2012 was the warmest year on record in the U.S. according to NOAA. If left unchecked, the temperature will continue to rise 0.5 degrees every decade. The threat of climate change is very real, and we are even feeling its extreme effects today. It is because of this that the town has agreed to bring me in as an intern to draft a Climate Action Plan for the Town of Clarendon.

A Climate Action Plan is a blueprint for the future. CLARENDON TOWN BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

MAY 2014

Prior to the regular meeting, representatives from the Monroe County Water Authority (MCWA) presented information about their not for profit public benefit corporation, which is not part of the Monroe County government. Supervisor Moy acknowledged that Water District No. 2 main line is 20 years old; that NYS will not allow the town to save enough money to replace the line when it needs to. Currently the town has a wholesale agreement with MCWA and is responsible for everything in the water districts except for putting water in the pipes. If the town opted for a retail lease agreement, the town would be responsible for new distribution mains on roads without water (at MCWA specifications) and any existing debt service. MCWA would handle replacements and system improvements; distribution maintenance and repairs; billing/customer service; new service installations, water quality and testing and public fire hydrants. The MCWA has 3200 miles of pipeline and is the third largest in the state. They use a GPS system for leak detection and locating breaks. Supervisor Moy exampled that if MCWA takes over the system, the debt service charge in WD#5 would decrease from \$294.00/year to \$181.00/year; savings would be seen in personnel salaries of superintendent, billing clerk and collection clerk. All retail leases with MCWA are for 40 years. In regard to existing wells on properties that are hooked into the public water system, MCWA offered that the well would need to be abandoned with a concrete cap per NYSDEC regulations or would need a backflow preventer and a Health Department annual inspection of the

well.

An unidentified citizen requested the Board look to have the speed limit reduced from the Holley/Clarendon line south on NYS Route 237 to the top of the hill by the water tower. Supervisor Moy explained that the speed limit there was lowered by the State from 55 mph to 50 mph just a few years ago; that residents had requested 45 mph.

Pat Giglio informed that the Jewell Buckman Post Ladies Auxiliary will hold a fundraiser breakfast brunch on June 8th from 11 to 12.

Councilman Robinson spoke on behalf of family members and friends that live on South Holley Road and asked if semi tractor trailer trucks can be limited on that road. South Holley Road is a county road. County Legislator DeFilipps informed of a similar discussion at the county today; that he will bring it up to the committee.

- Special Use Permit renewal, Thomas Estates West LLC Mobile Manuf. Park SP 96-002 17143 Fourth Section Road. The fee has been paid, inspection has been done by OIO and there are no complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve renewal.

05-13-2014 (regular Meeting)

- The Planning Board held a preconference for a building lot approval, SD 14-05, Jan Maxim 16399 Glidden Road tax id# 109.-1-49.11. Setbacks met. perc passed. No issues were noted with this application. There is a letter from the applicant to waive the preconference if the board sees no issues. A motion was made, seconded and approved to amend the agenda from a preconference to a formal application. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve the application for the building lot approval contingent upon water hook up to the property being complete.
- Special Use Permit renewal, SP 05-01 Chris Neff 5360 Upper Holley Road- Repair Garage. The fee has been paid, inspection has been done by OIO and there are no complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve renewal.
- The Planning Board continued its review of an ongoing drainage issue at 16924 Fourth Section Road. All affected

parties were present for the meeting (Howe, Gomez, McFarland. Oliver. Swartswelder) along with Katie Sommerfeldt, Orleans County Soil and Water. Ms Sommerfeldt presented to the group the four options she has developed based on her survey of the properties. The group agreed to Option C- Installing a 4" underground tile line with a stand pipe at the end traveling from the Gomez property across three adjoining properties (Howe, Swartzwelder, Oliver) for approx 600' and draining into an existing drainage ditch at the rear of the Oliver property. Oliver, Mrs. Swartswelder, and Mr. Howe each stated for the record that they are willing to allow access for this tile originating at the Gomez property to pass on their respective properties. Mr. Howe and Mr. Gomez will share responsibility of the cost. Katie Sommerfeldt has agreed to come back and lay out the project and verify elevations when it is ready to begin. The Planning Board will contact the Town attorney regarding easements/ waivers etc. Chairman Griggs takes the opportunity to tell all parties concerned how pleased he is with their spirit of community cooperation and work on helping to resolve this issue.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Larry Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reported picking up some of the large piles of brush along the roadsides. Gravel roads have been graded and need work. Lawns have been cleaned up due to the plowing. The Highway crew repaired a damaged culver pipe on County Line Road. Pot holes have been patched; Superintendent informed that over fifty ton of patching material since January has been used on the roads. There were four burials in the cemetery last month. A water line in the cemetery is leaking and needs replacement. There are currently four spigots. Superintendent suggested a new line be installed from the garage to the chapel and the ones on the old side be abandoned.

The county helped with trees with its bucket truck. Superintendent Swanger reported swapping out the loader for a new CAT for less than \$3400. We've had the loader a little over a year; will be on state bid for another year, so the charge is \$10/hours used to trade it in; loader has 173 hours on it. New machine is coming in at the end of June.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Melissa Ierlan, President and Town Historian

President Ierlan reported twenty-seven people in attendance at the Society's first meeting of the year; there are 36 paid memberships. Erin Anheier helped clean the museum buildings for Sunday Open-Houses. Superintendent Swanger replaced the water meter in the schoolhouse and the Society has asked for a damage estimate on the schoolhouse.

Historian Ierlan showed framed letters to Eldridge Farwell and receipts from Copeland's Store purchased from New Hampshire. Joanne Major helped Historian Ierlan repaint all the historical markers; the Highway Crew and Fred Seeman helped remove and reinstall the signs.

OLD BUSINESS

The Town Board approved the Out-of-District User Application for hookup in Water Improvement Benefit Area 11 from Town of Sweden resident Jason Misner at 4600 County Line Road.

No plans have been submitted yet for reconfiguring the offices at the town hall. Superintendent Swanger felt his truck does not need an emergency management license plate; the Fire Company always lets him through when there is an emergency situation. **NEW BUSINESS**

The Town Board accepted an estimate from James Ellison, East Lee Road resident, to paint exterior trim of Town Hall, replace broken trim boards, stain the peaks and power wash and restain the gazebo for \$2400.

The Board authorized Supervisor Moy to sign an agreement with Daniel Jones to mow and trim the Glidden Road pioneer cemetery for the 2014 season at a rate of \$400.

The Board adopted a resolution setting standard work days for appointed and elected officials in the NYS Retirement System.

Erin Anhier submitted a portion of the Conditions Report on the Hillside Memorial Chapel as prepared by Paul Minor, Architect in December 2012 along with an estimation of restoration costs in three phases. Erin explained that as the chapel is listed on the National and State Registers of Historical Places, it qualifies for grant funding application. There are currently two that Erin would like to apply for: the Rochester Community Foundation for \$25,000 and the CFA through Parks, Recreation and Historical Places \$500,000 grant is a 50/50, meaning that the Town will need to put in the same amount of funding that is received from the grant. Discussion was held regarding restoration: Phase One - replacement of the roof with slate as originally done at \$118,500. Phase Two - Windows, exterior painting, masonry repairs, grouting and hydro-blasting south and west surfaces at \$68,530. Phase Three - Refurbish and cover casket lift, interior doors, painting, lighting, electric service, lighting and front step railings at \$26,975. Total Project was estimated at \$214,005. At 50%, over \$100,000 will be needed. Discussion was held regarding the money from the Cemetery Association that is being held for Cemetery maintenance; Historical Society will kick-off a fundraising campaign and Erin reported confidence that \$10,000 can be raised. June 9th is application deadline; Erin doubted the state would grant funding for interior work if the roof is leaking. It was reported that Harold Piedimonte and Kevin Johnson have both done temporary roof repair on the chapel. The lead study and architectural study was done with the committee money Assemblyman Hawley. Supervisor reasoned that every year the board renews the BAN for water debt service and truck purchase; it would cost the Town \$6000/year for ten years at less than 2% interest to borrow \$53,000 for a 50/50 grant. Board members in agreement that Erin apply for the full amount of the project. Supervisor Moy gave board members a 'Climate Smart Community' pledge from Greg Selke and asked them to

review it for the June meeting.
