TAKE NOTICE that the Town of Clarendon Highway Department will be reconstructing Hall Road in early June, 2017. This should be a two to three day process and later in July, the road will be sealed.

Orleans County is accepting enrollment of additional parcels in certified agricultural districts during the month of June, pursuant to New York State Agricultural and Markets Law. This annual 30-day window is for inclusion of property which is predominantly viable agricultural land. During this time period, land may only be added and not removed from an agricultural district. This opportunity does not replace enrollment in an existing agricultural district during the eight-year, formal review process, but allows a once-a-year opportunity for a property owner to request that the County Legislature add parcel(s) to one of Orleans County Consolidated Agricultural District No. 1 (District C-1). Eight year indepth reviews are expected to continue for District C-1 as scheduled. At the conclusion of June, requests for inclusion in agricultural districts will be reviewed, in order, by the Orleans County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board, the Orleans County Legislature, and the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets. Enrollment forms are available from the Orleans County Department of Planning and Development both in-person and online. Completed forms should be sent by June 30th to: Sarah Gatti, Orleans County Department of Planning and Development, 14016 Route 31 West, Albion NY 14411. The agricultural districting program provides eligible operations right-to-farm protection, among other benefits. Please note that requesting enrollment during this 30-day time period is not a guarantee that your property will be added to an existing agricultural district. Moreover, it will not automatically qualify your property for a reduced agricultural property tax assessment. For information on obtaining a reduced agricultural property tax assessment, please contact your local assessor. { A Press release from Orleans County Planning & Development.}

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights May 2017

The Clarendon Town Board held a Public Hearing regarding Proposed Local Law #1 of 2017, A Local Law to Extend a Moratorium on the Installation of Mobile/Manufactured Homes Outside Mobile/ Manufactured Home Parks. Three residents gave comments feeling that the Town needed to address the New York State law and allow mobile/manufactured homes on lots; that working families with children today can't afford stick built homes. It was offered that board members should walk through some of the new mobile/ manufactured homes to see the quality today; that if the property is properly taken care of it can be very nice and we definitely need more tax payers in the town. The Board was asked to act on the State Law instead of delaying it. The law was sent to the County Planning Board for review.

An informational hearing on the next possible public water district was held immediately following the public hearing. Representatives from Chatfield Engineers, Municipal Solutions and G&G Municipal Consulting and Grant Writing were present. Chatfield Engineers explained the process of forming a water district. G&G explained the importance of an income survey in applying for grant funding; that 90% response is needed for use in the application. Municipal Solutions explained the financing of the project informing that now is a good time to apply for grant funding and stressed the importance of completing the income survey. It was also said that letters from residents to the board documenting problems with well water supply would help a grant application.

Adam Johnson, reviewed the situation regarding his Special Permit to operate a service business at 15549 East Lee Road that was revoked for non-compliance of the Permit and compared a residential property that Mr. Johnson indicated has multiple businesses in operation, has never applied for a special permit and has never been issued a fine. Mr. Johnson reviewed the settlement discussed by his and the town's attorney and requested the Board talk through his situation rationally with him and come to a solution regarding his permit. Supervisor Moy said that as it is still in litigation with the court, the board can't discuss it; that the judge will decide the outcome.

OPEN END

Wendy Basile addressed the board regarding a possible noise ordinance due to severe noise caused by vehicles off-road/mudding and building a stock car/mudding type race track at 4790 Bennetts Corners Road. Ms. Basile reported how disturbing the noise is in the entire neighborhood; that outdoor activities and chores have become difficult and her livestock is being affected

by the noise. It was reported that this goes on from four to eight hours every day and well into the night. Ms. Basile presented the board with a petition to amend the Town of Clarendon noise code of the ordinance. Supervisor Moy informed that the town is already looking into the unlicensed vehicles on the property.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPT. REPORT

Superintendent Swanger reported most of the cleanup done from the wind storm. The Village of Holley helped with a tree. A few culverts have been changed and ditches have been cleaned out. Three trees on Hinds Road have been removed and lawn restoration has been done in WD#9 ext. There were three burials at Hillside Cemetery this month and the new truck has been ordered. The Town Board authorized purchase of a roadside mower to replace the 2003 machine. Brand new on State Bid it will cost \$14,000; auction may bring \$400 or \$500 for the old one.

HISTORIAN/CHS REPORT

Melissa Ierlan informed of the new outdoor lighting at the museum site. Superintendent will help with gravel to extend the driveway at the site.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Moy informed of the scheduled meeting of the Orleans County Shared Services Panel at the 4-H Fairgrounds Trolley Building from 6-8PM tomorrow. Last week, the Town Clerk, Supervisor and Assessor attended a presentation by the Association of Towns on the Countywide Shared Services Plan.

CORRESPONDENCE

NYS Department of State has sent a Bulletin delineating many types of motor vehicles which are not subject to the code section's applicability to unlicensed/inoperative motor vehicles. Additional types of motor vehicles not regulated by PMCNYS Section3 02.8 include but are not limited to former military vehicles, heavy industrial equipment such as that used in a quarry; and construction equipment such as backhoes, cranes and bulldozers. Deputy Clerk Robishaw submitted a summary report on her attendance to the State Town Clerk's Conference in April. COVA sent a request to expand its Certificate of Need to include all of Orleans County. Supervisor Moy has contacted Clarendon Fire Chief; there is no need for it. Finger Lakes Regional Economic Development Council sent information that Round 7 of the New York State Consolidated Funding Application is open; projects can seek up to \$800 million of available funding through State Agency Genesee/Finger Lakes Planning Council has Programs. scheduled workshops regarding the Local Update of Census Addresses for the 2020 Census. The Association of Towns sent information regarding part the state's 2017-18 Budget, a plan for county-wide shared services property tax savings.

Clarendon Justice of the Peace;






The marker was purchased with funds from the County Historians Office and the Orleans County Historical Association.

The Clarendon Historical Society will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the start of the Erie Canal with a program by authors Andy Olenick and Richard O. Reisem on Wednesday, June 21, 2017 at 7:00 PM. The authors will give a presentation based on their book Erie Canal Legacy: Architectural Treasures of New York State which features glorious photos taken in villages along the canal. It covers the building of the canal and what it meant to New York and the nation with photographs showing the architectural heritage that the Erie Canal has produced for us. Photographer Andy Olenick created the photographs for the book. His wife, Sherri, business partner and traveling companion, worked as researcher and coordinator on the four-year project. Since graduation from the Rochester Institute of Technology, Andy has been fulfilling assignments nationally in commercial, magazine, corporate, and industrial photography, including illustration, annual reports, advertising, and architecture. He also created the superb photographs for the books, 200 Years of Rochester Architecture and Gardens, Classic Buffalo, and Historic New York: Architectural Journeys in the Empire State which were also collaborations with Richard Reisem. Richard O. Reisem has written fifteen books since retiring from Eastman Kodak Company's Communications and Public Affairs Division in 1986. He spoke last year at the CHS regarding his book Myron Holley: Canal Builder / Abolitionist / Unsung Hero. His other books cover diverse subjects concerned with history and architecture. He is a graduate of Iowa State University with major studies in architecture, history, and journalism. His 31-year career at Eastman Kodak included speechwriter for six of the company's CEOs. He was also producer of Kodak annual meetings, financial analysts' presentations, photographic trade show events, new product announcements, and traveling multimedia programs. He was the author of a series of books on color photography. He is an honorary trustee of the Landmark Society of Western New York, vice-president of the Friends of Mount Hope Cemetery, and a former trustee of the Rochester Historical Society. Assembly Minority Leader Brian Kolb has informed that pursuant to the "Raise the Age" initiative enacted in this year's state budget agreement, counties that stay within their property tax cap will receive full state reimbursement for the cost of implementation; funding will begin in 2018. The Town has received \$1,217.28 from the District Attorney for the first quarter 2017 Traffic Diversion Program revenue.

OLD BUSINESS

The Board adopted the proposed zoning ordinance amendments and scheduled a special meeting to consider adoption of Local Law #1 of 2017 to extend the moratorium on mo-

bile/manufactured homes outside a mobile home park. NYSDOT has determined that a 35 mph speed limit is justified on Upper Holley Road and Upper Holley Road Extension between house number 4606 and Route 31A. Orders for the speed zone are being processed for filing with the Secretary of State and the town will be notified when approved. Installation of signs can follow at that time.

NEW BUSINESS

The Town Board authorized the Hillside Cemetery Chapel Restoration project to be put out for bids, renewed its two year agreement with Municipal Solutions for general financial services and hired G & G Municipal Consulting & Grant Writing to perform a median household income survey in areas being considered for the next possible public water district in Clarendon.

The Board adopted Local Law No. 1 of 2017 extending the moratorium on mobile/manufactured homes outside a mobile home park at a special meeting held May 30th.
