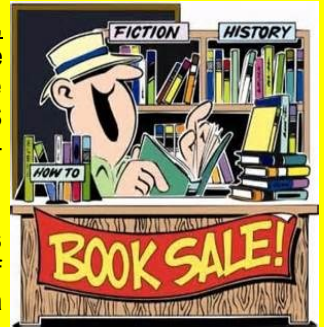

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights May 2016

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Larry Swanger reported fixing the lawns and road edges that were damaged while plowing snow. All highway employees attended safety training and the gravel roads have been graded. Lenny Clark is back to work after three months medical leave, with no work restrictions. Superintendent Swanger found one of the new hydrants in WIBA #11 leaking; Morsch (the contractor) is to fix it. The highway crew has been installing water main for Water District No. 9 extension; there is 460 feet left to put in. Digging has been good. The soil is clay not rock. Numerous unsuccessful attempts were made to have Verizon do a stake-out for the dig; Verizon is on strike and won't do the stake-out; lines have been hit. The second of three hydrants was installed today. Superintendent Swanger informed that the bumper on old Ford pick-up truck is falling off; it needs to be replaced. The Superintendent's truck is three years old. Board members were asked to consider the three-year management plan for the equipment/vehicles. There is a large pile of tires at the highway garage. There was no tire pick-up this year, but people have been calling and dropping them off. Most of the tires are from last year's pick-up.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman Dave Griggs submitted a written report. **Regular Meeting April 26, 2016** – Meeting cancelled due to lack of sufficient agenda items. **Regular Meeting May 10, 2016** - The Planning Board continued review of SP 16-01, Formal Application for Special Permit, Erin Neale-Clarendon Gun Shop 4257 Hindsburg Rd. tax id# 86.-3-52.32. The Planning Board concurred with the recommendations from the County Planning Board. No further issues were noted with this proposal. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve this application.

HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Historian Melissa Ierlan was absent from the meeting. Supervisor Moy reported that the new Akeley Monument will be unveiled at the Hillside Cemetery on Thursday. The Ghost Walk at Hillside was attended by approximately 100 people. Supervisor Moy signed the grant contract for the chapel; when approval is received, the project will be bid out.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Dick Moy reported receipt of a check for court loss restitution in the amount of \$285.72; balance due is \$75,000. Genesee Community College, Genesee County Chamber of Commerce, Economic Development Center and Community College Foundation will present 'The Economic Impact of Genesee Community College in the GLOW Region' on June 9th from 8-9:15 AM at the college. The presentation will feature results of an economic impact study of GCC by Economic Modeling Specialist, Inc. The event is free and open to the public.

CORRESPONDENCE

COVA (Central Orleans Volunteer Ambulance) has sent solicitation for letter of support to expand their Certificate of Need to include Orleans County. Supervisor has spoken to Clarendon Fire Company Fire Chief. Councilman Major, also in the Fire Company, confirmed that they have no intent of using COVA except for a mutual aid situation. No town action was taken. The New York State Department of Public Service Commission has directed Staff to develop a process for consideration of a *Clean Energy Standard (CES)* program; this mandates that by the year 2030, half of the electricity used in the State will come from renewable resources such as solar, wind and hydro. Public hearings have been scheduled and a schedule sent. Chili and Amherst (the closest locations) were held earlier in May. NYS Department of Tax and Finance has sent the 2016 Final Special Franchise Assessments/Full Values. This includes Niagara Mohawk/National Grid, Verizon, Frontier Telephone and Time Warner.

Orleans County Probation Department has sent a \$285.00 restitution payment for the Munger Road Cemetery vandalism; balance due \$960.37. Superintendent Swanger acknowledged that there are more stones in need of repair from that damage and suggested the town work on repairing them. Supervisor agreed; the restitution payments are for the repairs. Solicitation has been received from Jones Specialty Services Group. Services provided include water and sewer maintenance and installation items.

OLD BUSINESS

Superintendent Swanger supplied a list of items that will have to be done if Clarendon keeps charge of the water system. No money costs were included on the list. It was estimated to cost approximately one half million dollars to paint the water tank; between \$5 and \$10,000 to update the chlorinator system. It currently has to be operated manually but should be automatic. It's the original chlorinator (1998). Superintendent Swanger informed that in the summer, chlorine needs to be added to keep the residual up. Monroe County Water Authority puts chlorine in at Route 19 which is lost the farther down the line it goes and more so in the warm weather. This would be MCWA responsibility if they took over the water system. Superintendent Swanger felt a part-time secretary would be needed to handle the paperwork and the billing; Brenda wants to be done with it, but has been waiting for the board to make a decision.

Superintendent Swanger reviewed he has a crew of three and is hoping the WD#9 ext. waterline installation will be completed this week so they can prepare roads for paving. Supervisor Moy feels it was a big mistake to incorporate water into the highway department; that if the town was to hire a separate water person, he/she could handle most things on the list as a part-time employee. It was confirmed that valves were exercised three or four years ago, but should be done every year. There are approximately 700 valves between the main valves and hydrant valves. Superintendent reminded that one needs to have a Class C License for chlorination and a Class D for the other things. You need one year experience to get the license. Supervisor Moy proposed the following areas for another water district: Upper Holley Road to Byron; New Guinea Road to the Sparks property; Route 237 to Byron with two properties across the town line that are interested in water; South Holley Road; Brown Schoolhouse west with approximately 10 houses on Transit Road as Out-of-District Users and Munger Road. There are approximately 65 houses in these areas; number of vacant lots is still unknown. As soon as grievance process is over, Assessor will have time to calculate the distance so Supervisor can get a good estimate at \$40 per foot. Legislator DeFilipps reviewed that on the muck lands, they are putting in big irrigation systems. They are digging wells at 300 feet deep; it will affect the surrounding properties. Legislator DeFilipps stated that Albion is looking to expand its water and sewer department; that they may come in and do maintenance for Clarendon. They are handling the sewer systems for Holley and Elba (out of county). Also, there is another round of grant funding coming available through Senator Ort's office and a possibility of leasing the tower for frequencies. There is a company interested in doing that; they have engineers to handle the installation and won't affect the integrity of the tower. *Action agreed on at this meeting:* Supervisor will contact Kevin Miller in Albion Water Department to see what the charge would be to take care of our water system maintenance. Superintendent will supply cost estimates for truck and chlorination system. Board will wait for estimated cost on new water district. Melissa will put together a proposed plan for veterans and spouses section at Hillside Cemetery after Memorial Day. Supervisor commented on the beautiful job done on the Veterans Memorial at the Cemetery. Supervisor Moy and Councilman Robinson spent five days cleaning up the garbage at Hillside Cemetery.

Quadrupeds Vie for New Position

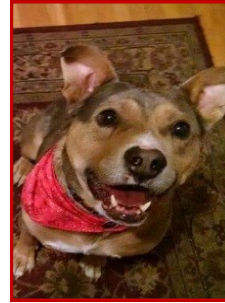

Proposals include: to increase opportunity for junior hunters to take black bear; to rescind an antlerless-only requirement for several wildlife management units (WMUs); to reduce antlerless harvest in WMUs 6F and 6J; to clarify when bow and muzzleloader tags may be used and fisher and general trapping regulatory proposals. NEW BUSINESS

The Board lowered the fee schedule for Accessories & Miscellaneous (Garage, Barn, Shed, Deck, etc.) from \$40.00 plus \$.15 per sq. to \$40.00 plus \$.05 per sq. ft. New York State has adopted legislation allowing mobile/manufactured homes on single lots. The Board adopted a resolution for proposed Local Law No. 2 of 2016 calling for a one year moratorium. A Public hearing was scheduled for June 21, 2016 at 6:30 PM. *(A complete copy of the proposed law is available on the town website or upon request at the Clerk's Office.)*

Supervisor Moy read aloud a letter of resignation from the Planning Board Alternate position submitted by Craig Lane. Mr. Lane has purchased a home outside of Clarendon and will no longer meet residency requirements. Planning Chairman expressed disappointment to see him go. The Board regretfully accepted Mr. Lane's letter. Supervisor Moy explained the need for a licensed engineer in charge of the chapel restoration project in order to meet requirements to get the grant funding. Mr. Bosch has agreed to serve the town in that capacity at no cost; he will then also be covered by the town insurance. The Board appointed Russ Bosch as Project Engineer for the Hillside Chapel Restoration Project.

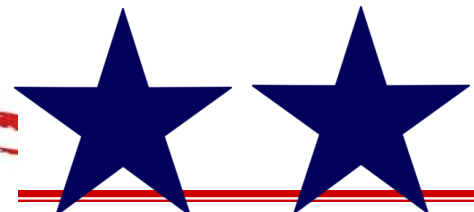

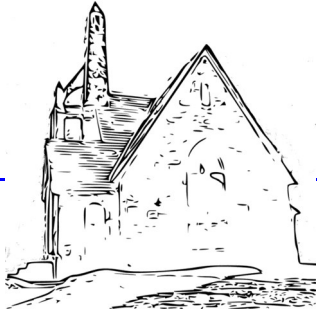

Hillside Sketches

Dr. Henry Dwight Bliss (1854-1900) and several members of his family are buried in Hillside on a terrace near the back of the east side. Dr. Bliss was born in Kendall but moved to Holley as a child when his father took on the position of Manager at Luther Gordon's lumber and coal yard. As Dwight grew, he helped his father with the accounting part of the business. This experience is probably what led him to attend the Rochester Business School. However, it didn't take long for him to decide the business world wasn't for him. He transferred to Cornell University and then to the University of Rochester, from which he graduated in 1880. By 1883 he had earned his M.D. from the University of Pennsylvania's Medical Department.

He moved to Brooklyn and did his residency at St. John's Hospital and then opened a private practice in the city. By 1891, his health was so poor that he took a leave of absence. It is believed he had contracted tuberculosis from a patient. Unfortunately, as he was travelling to Europe for rest and recuperation, stormy seas forced the ship to dock at Plymouth. Overcome with seasickness, Dr. Bliss was hospitalized and unable to make the trip. He never again was completely well. By 1898, he had to sell his practice and return to his parents' Holley home. He passed away on April 12, 1900.

Also buried in the lot are his wife, **Jennie "Jane" Hess** (1857-1926) and two infants. These are son, **Edwin Hess Bliss** (1888-1889), and daughter, **Frances K. Bliss** (1893) each of whom lived less than five months. Another son, **Henry Dwight Bliss II** (1889-1980), his wife, **Ruth**, and Dr. Bliss's parents, **Edwin and Mary Bliss** are also there.
