CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights February 2016

Pursuant to bad weather conditions, the public hearings and regular board meeting for February were cancelled. Supervisor Moy called for an emergency meeting on February 19, 2016 at 9:00 AM for the purpose of paying bills, appointing Craig Lane to the vacant alternate Planning Board seat and accepting grant funding from NYS for the Hillside Cemetery Chapel restoration project. Remaining items that were on the agenda will be covered at the March 15th meeting.



(Cont from page 1) CLARENDON RESIDENTS TAKE NOTICE that the Clarendon Town Board will hold a Public Hearing on March 15, 2016 at 6:00 PM at the Town Hall, 16385 Church Street, Clarendon to consider the following amendments to Town Zoning Ordinance Section 301: 1) A new Subsection B shall be added which reads as follows: "B. All buildings or structures 64 square feet or greater within the Town of Clarendon shall require a building permit." 2) Current Subsection B shall be designated as Subsection C and shall read as follows: "C. No building permit shall be issued for any buildings, structures, dwellings, their customary accessory structures and common farm related structures unless a Site Plan has been submitted to and approved by the Planning Board. Note: The Ordinance Inspection Officer may waive the need for a site plan review for buildings or structures provided such building or structure is single width, is a single story and is not permanently attached to the soil or to any other structure." 3) All remaining Subsections of Section 301 shall be designated alphabetically to correspond to the foregoing amendments. ALSO TAKE NOTICE that the Clarendon Town Board will conduct a Public Hearing on March 15, 2016 immediately following the foregoing published hearing, to consider adoption of Local Law No. 1 of 2016 to amend Local Law No. 1 of 2007 to change the size of structures requiring a building permit; to read as follows: 1) Purpose. The purpose of this local law is to give the Town CEO broader authority in issuing building permits for detached structures. 2) Section 5(A)(2)a of Local Law No. 1 of 2007 is hereby amended to read as follows: "2. No permit shall be required for: a. Construction or installation of one story detached structures associated with one or two family dwellings or multiple single family dwellings (townhouses) which are used for tool and storage sheds, playhouses or similar uses, provided that the gross floor area is less than 64 square feet." 3) All other provisions of Local Law No. 1 of 2007 shall remain unchanged. AND BE ADVISED that the regular monthly meeting will begin immediately following the public hearing regarding Local Law No. 1 of 2016.

Hillside Sketches

There is little sadder than the death of a child. And when the child is very young, it is sadder still. Hillside is the final resting place of many children. Two graves that always catch my attention are on



the west side of South Holley Road, just north of the storage building. Within several feet of each other, the marble grave markers are topped by threedimensional lambs. This is the most common animal symbol found on a child's grave. The lamb appears throughout the ages with great regularity in Christian art and because it is a symbol of Christ: "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sins of the world!" (Bible, John 1:29). But, the use of the lamb in religious art even predates

Christianity and appears to have been used first by the Egyptians. It signifies purity and innocence, Christ in his sacrificial role and personifies: innocence, meekness, gentleness and humility. One of these stones is for "Our Darling" Kathy Lee Kimball, daughter of Harry M. and Carrie Kimball. Kathy lived only a few short months. The other lamb is for Mable Grace Lusk, daughter of John L. and Velma Warn Lusk. Mable died before her third birthday.


I find it particularly poignant that flowers are often placed on Mable's grave, 90 years after her death. Someone still remembers and misses her. These small girls have now been reunited with their parents in Hillside Cemetery.

ASSEMBLYMAN HAWLEY LEARNS LIBRARIES ARE MORE THAN JUST BOOKS

Students at Holley Middle School/High School (MS/HS) showed Assemblyman Steve Hawley of the 139th Assembly District that a school library is more than just a place to check out books. During a visit on Feb. 12, Assemblyman Hawley observed students' creativity in action as they used littleBits, electronic building blocks for creating inventions. The littleBits snap

together with magnets and can be used to create simple or complex gadgets. "Today's school library is a very different learning environment, allowing for student learning through discovery, creativity and making," said Lisa Osur, Holley MS/HS librarian. "Providing tools to engage students in learning experiences is crucial." The littleBits were purchased by the Monroe 2-Orleans BOCES (BOCES 2) School Library Systems through grants. The littleBits are shared between school and public libraries in the BOCES 2 region. Coordinator of School Library Systems Jim Belair said funding and support from local legislative leaders helped make this partnership possible. "We are grateful for the continued support of Assemblyman Hawley and the other Rochester area legislators," said Belair. "Due to their advocating for all types of libraries in Monroe and Orleans Counties, we are able to provide needed resources and tools for our communities." "I am happy that area libraries are collaborating as they do," said Robert D'Angelo, Holley district superintendent. "There is a direct relationship between what libraries have to offer students and literacy."

To celebrate the new castle entrance to the Children's *World of Discovery*, the Community Free Library, 86 Public Square, Holley, is hosting a family Children's Expo on Saturday, March 12, from 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon. Bring your family and participate in the ribbon- cutting. Afterwards there will be refreshments, face-painting, balloons, a chance to make your own crown, and, best of all, an opportunity to play in the new play centers and to check out books.

Funded by a grant from Senator Maziarz, the library is expanding opportunities for play. "Play is the work of children," says Library Director, Sandra Shaw. "There are lots of studies being published showing the relationship between opportunities for play and the development of reading and learning skills. We have books... so we decided to expand the play opportunities for children. They can play, then find books in the library related to what they were playing."

And play they can. There is a large puppet theatre, with fairy tale characters, family puppets as well as community helpers. Want to cook? Try the new children's kitchen, complete with shopping carts, plastic food and dishes. Worried about a sick stuffed animal? Try the Doc McStuffin's Veterinary Clinic. Want to build or repair something... use the Black and Decker building center. And would you like to be truly in character and wear a costume? Try the costume cabinet. "Adding these play areas to what already exists in the library provides area families with a creative outlet for their children while the parents either play with them or use other library resources," continued. Shaw. "And I want to thank the members of our Board of Trustees and their families who came in on a cold January Sunday and spent the day putting all of these centers together. Do you have any idea how many parts came in the box holding the kitchen? But they are a dedicated group of people, and doing this for our children was a top priority."

"Our local artist and retired art teacher, Laurence Dabney, has created a castle entrance to the Children's Room. No longer will they just be walking from one room to another.... Now they will be entering a world created just for them, which is why we are renaming it the *World of Discovery*.

RECYCLING

Place all recyclable materials inside the green recycling bins provided by the county. All recyclables can be placed out weekly inside the recycling bin on the same day as trash pickup. Please place recycling bin away from garbage so driver can see it.

GARBAGE

The equivalent of 6 bags or cans of normal municipal solid waste including garden and yard waste, ashes (cold ashes only), plaster, stones, bricks and building materials.

- Place garbage in 20 or 30-gallon watertight cans with covers and handles, or (3 mil minimum) plastic bags. Do not use shopping
 bags. Limit of 60 pounds per container. Securely tie bundles of brush and building materials in lengths of no longer than 4 feet
 and within a 60-pound limit.
- DO NOT INCLUDE: tires, pesticides, oils, solvents, flammable liquids, explosives, animal carcasses, fecal matter, industrial
 waste, other regulated hazardous waste or building materials left by a contractor.
- E-WASTE (MICROWAVES, TELEVISIONS, and COMPUTER equipment) will no longer be picked up. Please take it to the nearest Electronic Recycling facility. Monday through Friday – 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. (Proof of Orleans County Residency is needed)

Holley- Town of Murray Highway Garage- 3840 Fancher Road, Holley

Medina-Town of Shelby Highway Garage- 4062 Salt Works Road, Medina.

FOR COLLECTION

Place garbage and recyclables at your roadside, within 5 feet of the road, before 6:00 am on your pickup day. If you have a ditch in front of your property, place garbage and recyclables between the road and the ditch.

Garbage and recyclables will be collected on the same day in separate trucks, at different times during the day.

LARGE ITEMS

A large item is any refuse that cannot be placed in cans or bags easily. ONLY ONE LARGE ITEM WILL BE PICKED UP EACH WEEK AT THE ROADSIDE. Refrigerator doors and shelves must be removed and the customer must call Modern Disposal (# below) on the FRIDAY prior to their scheduled pickup day. Large items will be collected on the same day as regular service and placed in the compactor truck. These items shall include, but are not limited to furniture, mattresses and box springs, carpets, appliances, Christmas trees, or carpeting (rolled and tied 4 foot lengths).

TIPS

Paint Cans- the lid must be off and the cans are to be set next to the trash can so the driver can see that the contents are dry. Clumpable cat litter can be used to dry up any contents prior to disposal.

Cold Ashes- must be cold and contained either in a bag or a cardboard box so the ashes do not go airborne as they are placed in the truck.

Medical Syringes- Medina Memorial Hospital takes them on Saturday mornings. Please do not dispose of these in the regular trash.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

New Year's Day - Memorial Day - Independence Day - Labor Day - Thanksgiving Day - Christmas Day. If your collection day is on or follows any of these holidays during the week, then your collection will be one day late.

HOW TO GET A RECYCLING BIN

A green recycling bin may be purchased for \$7.00 each from the County Real Property Office in Albion at Courthouse Square. Call (585) 589-5400. If you have built a new home, you are entitled to a free bin. Just present your property tax receipt, showing that the garbage collection fee has been paid, to the Real Property Service Office.
