

November 8, 2016 GENERAL ELECTION DEADLINES

MAIL REGISTRATION Applications must be postmarked no later than **October 14th** and received by a board of elections no later than **October 19th** to be eligible to vote in the General Election.

IN PERSON REGISTRATION You may register at your local board of elections or any state agency participating in the National Voter Registration Act, on any business day throughout the year but, to be eligible to vote in the General Election, your application must be received no later than **October 14th**.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS Notices of change of address from registered voters received by **October 19th** by a county board of elections must be processed and entered in the records in time for the General Election.

Registration forms and applications for absentee ballots are available at the Town Clerk's Office or at the Board of Elections in Albion. 

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD—Meeting Highlights September 2016

OPEN END

Bob Barrett, resident of Two Mill Road presented the Town with a map of Clarendon that he purchased from an antique shop. The map titles his home on Mill Road as being owned by Adelaide Cook. Bob checked his abstract of title and found that Adelaide Cook owned his home on Mill Road from 1909 to 1927. Bob mounted the map in a glass fronted frame that he hand crafted of wood and rope. This is just one of the items Bob has enhanced and donated to the Town. It can be viewed at the Town Hall. Historian informed it was the map that is included in the 1913 Atlas. All expressed thanks.

HIGHWAY/WATER REPORT - Larry P. Swanger, Superintendent

Superintendent Swanger reported helping the county and other towns with paving the past month. Blacktop was put down on Munger Road. The dirt portion of Chugg Road has been paved; will be sealed tomorrow. This leaves 4 ½ miles of gravel road in the town. Road patching has been done on Brown Schoolhouse Road.

In Water District No. 9 ext. 1, the crew has begun putting soil down for restoration; hydro seed will be added with the county machine when weather permits.

Residents at the meeting addressed Superintendent Swanger about the shoulders on Powerline Road. They felt that the shoulders have not been graded well and will create a mess for property owners in the spring from the plow. Superintendent stated that all roads that have been sealed this year will have the same problem; that every spring the highway crew comes through and cleans up everyone's yard. Discussion was held regarding trees on Hinds Road that residents felt were dangerous and in the town right-of-way. Evan Lusk has removed one of three trees being discussed. Superintendent Swanger will need to schedule use of the county bucket truck for the other two.

HISTORIAN REPORT - Melissa Ierlan, Historian/CHS President

Historian Ierlan reminded all of the program tomorrow at the Historical Society; speaker will be an attorney from Batavia; presentation is Clash of Cultures. October 8th is the rain date for the Ghost Walk at the Hillside Cemetery.

SUPERVISOR REPORT – Richard H. Moy, Supervisor

Next Tuesday, Clarendon is host of the Supervisors/Legislators meeting. Tom Kuryla, Commissioner of Orleans County Social Services Department will be the speaker. On November 14th, there will be a meeting in Point Breeze to discuss paving of the Ontario State Parkway. A resident has requested the 35 MPH speed limit in the hamlet be extended further east on Route 31A. Ron and Diane Whalin have submitted a letter reviewing their interest in having the public waterline extended south on Upper Holley Road. Eight other neighbors have also signed statements of the same; some of who have bad quality, low quantity and some who have completely lost water multiple times. The Town has received a rebate check in the amount of \$593.68 for Water District No. 9 Build America Bonds. Rochester Rhinos will host a First Responders Night at their September 24th game.

CORRESPONDENCE

Orleans County Planning & Development has sent notice of availability of Large Format Scanning Service to the towns. Genesee Transportation Council has invited interested parties to a free one day training regarding Americans with Disabilities Act on September 27th in Rochester. The New York State Unified Court System has sent correspondence asking for the board to complete its annual court audit. Supervisor stated that the Town Clerk books should be audited by board members also. New York State Department of Transportation has announced availability of \$98.7 million in funding to support transportation related projects and programs, including bicycle, pedestrian and multi-use paths and/or projects that will help meet requirements of the Clean Air Act by reducing congestion and vehicle emissions. There will be a ribbon cutting ceremony to mark the opening of the Orleans Business Center at the Arnold Gregory Building in Albion on September 23rd at 2:00 pm. PathStone Corportion sent notice of outreach for the Green Jobs Green NY program through the NYS Energy & Research Development Authority (NYSERDA). They help local families make energy efficiency improvements to their homes with access to low or no cost energy assessments, income based matching grants and low interest loans. The Orleans County Self-Insurance Plan apportionment of assessments has been received; Clarendon's Town assessment for 2017 is \$33,681; the Fire Company assessment is \$208. NYMIR will host a State Environment Quality Review (SEQR) Training for Small Communities on October 24 at the Livingston County Emergency Med Services in Mount Morris, NY. Town 2017 membership dues for the NYS Association of Towns will be \$999.00.

OLD BUSINESS

The Town Board approved amending the Water District Rules & Regulations to include that meters for bulk water purchase need to be *on the hydrant*. Superintendent reviewed that two hydrants have been used; the one at the Fire Hall and one at the dead end on LaDue Road. Superintendent puts a meter on that includes a backflow preventer.

Matt DeSimone is working on the Town Park for an Eagle Scout Project. He has removed and painted picnic tables and painted the pavilion. Bruce Hovey has volunteered community service and has tarred and sealed the pavilion. The two grills have been cleaned and painted. Jessica Skehan has offered to paint a new sign for the pavilion. Board members in agreement to put a trash barrel in the park. Superintendent Swanger will put a 55 gallon drum there from the highway garage.

NEW BUSINESS

Discussion was held regarding a proposed contract with the county for Animal Control; cost would increase from \$2766 to \$8299. The Sheriff wants to add another officer. Board members spoke against the increase. Supervisor will speak with the Sheriff. If the board doesn't approve the increase, services from the county will only include those mandated by NYS Ag & Markets – unlicensed dogs. Action tabled.

The Board adopted a Resolution proclaiming October 16-22, 2016 as 'Freedom from Workplace Bullies Week'.

The Town Board agreed to designate Five Star Bank as its legal bank. First National Bank is becoming Key Bank; the Holley Branch is closing.

The Board accepted the Tentative Budget for the year 2017 and scheduled a public hearing for the Preliminary Budget to be held October 18, 2016 at 6:30 PM with the regular monthly meeting to immediately follow. (See front page of this Gazette for Notice)



Ira Edwards (1834-1925) attended the Albany State Normal School and began teaching in the Albion area before coming to Holley. Mr. Edwards was the princi-

pal of the Holley Academy (private school) in 1865. While presiding at the school, he became acquainted with many of the businessmen in the town.

After one year at the Academy and a teaching position in Medina, he returned to Holley. Edwards opened a hardware store in the south business block on the Public Square. When it burned in 1874, he rented space in the Edwin Bliss block on Thomas Street.

In 1886, he built his own block on the northeast corner of the square. His new store, well-stocked, was considered the finest in Orleans County. After seventy years as a family business, Ira's son, Fred, sold the store to the Gordis family in 1944. They conducted business in the same store for another forty seven years.

Edwards and his son Fred's efforts were greatly appreciated by the business community and customers they served. The

same can be said of the Gordis -VanOrden family.

The Honorable Ira Edwards served as Mayor of the village, Supervisor of the Town of Murray and a member of the NYS assembly for two terms.



In 1925, Edwards died, leaving five children; Fred Frank, Lillian, Ella Ledbetter and Jennie McCrillis.

Roy Bubb's latest book, <u>The Family Scrapbook; An Era in</u> <u>Holley's History</u> will cover more detail. Anticipated publishing date is Spring 2017.



CHS Welcomes Dr. Alison Parker

The Clarendon Historical Society's October program is entitled Temperance and Suffrage: Susan B. Anthony, Frances Willard, and an ented by Dr. Alison Parker. In this

Uneasy Alliance and will be presented by **Dr. Alison Parker.** In this talk, Dr. Alison Parker explores how Susan B. Anthony came to see the links between temperance and suffrage together. Anthony concluded that temperance reform could only be achieved through the votes of women. Why did she stop work with any temperance organization for about two decades--until she lent a helping hand to the Rochester women who organized a branch of the new Woman's Christian Temperance Union around 1874? Even as she sympathized with women protemperance advocates, Anthony told them: "The best thing this organization [the WCTU] will do for you will be to show you how utterly powerless you are to put down the liquor traffic. You can never talk down or sing down or pray down an institution which is voted into existence. You will never be able to lessen this evil until you have votes."

Alison M. Parker is Professor of History at the College at Brockport, State University of New York. She is the author of *Articulating Rights: Nineteenth-Century American Women on Race, Reform, and the State;* and *Purifying America: Women, Cultural Reform, and Pro-Censorship Activism, 1873-1933.* She has also published three co-edited volumes: *Interconnections: Gender and Race in American History; Beyond Black and White: Race, Ethnicity and Gender in the U.S. South and Southwest* and *Women and the Unstable State in Nineteenth-Century America.* Professor Parker co-edits the *Gender and Race in American History* book series for the University of Rochester Press. She is currently writing a book on Mary Church Terrell (1863-1954), the first president of the National Association of Colored Women's Clubs and a founding member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The presentation will be held on **Wednesday**, **October 19**, **2016 at 7:00 PM** at the Clarendon Historical Society which is located at 16426 Fourth Section Road, at the intersection of Route 31A and Church Street in Clarendon.
