

Hillside Cemetery


If you have ever walked around Hillside Cemetery you'll notice names that are familiar to you. Some families have been in the area for generations. Some are

buried in family plots especially on the "old" side. Some are scattered about depending on the person who chose the plot for a specific reason. Some people want to be facing a specific direction, others want to be near the roadside. It all depends on the individual.




One familiar name is **Hovey**. This family has lived in the area for many years. William Hovey and his wife Margery lived on Hall Road. They had 5

daughters and 3 sons. As you look at the headstone you'll notice the engraved barn and tractor, which was the occupation of Mr. Hovey. On July 12, 1934 the Holley Standard reported that during a severe electric storm the previous Friday, a lightning strike caused a fire which burned down the barn. The fire destroyed most of the contents but the livestock was saved. Pic-



CLARENDON TOWN BOARD - Meeting Highlights November 2018



Board members recognized the recent passing of town residents, thanking them for their service to the community; Bill Guilford, Zoning Board Member; Bob Clarke, Zoning Board Member and Roger Novak, 50 year member of the Clarendon Fire Company. The Fire Company was also thanked for hosting the Evan Valentine fundraiser.

Highway/Water Department Report

Superintendent Larry Swanger reported helping the Town of Murray with paving last month and getting the equipment ready for winter. The 2007 Sterling needed repair on the inner-box. Pete and Danny worked at fixing it all day and saved the town about \$10,000 on the repair. The 2011 Mac had an oil pan leak and Danny was able to replace the leaky oil pan with a new one. One water service was installed for a new build on Brown Schoolhouse Road. The water tank is full again and water samples taken. Superintendent is waiting for Health Department approval to open the tank. There is still a bit of wiring that needs to be done into the shed. The Town Board authorized purchase of a new Kubota mini excavator with trade-in at a cost of \$29,757.54 off State Bid and a 2018 Load Trailer at a cost of \$6,011.00 replace the 8 year old trailer that will be sold at auction.

Students attending the meeting as part of their school Participation in Government class were recognized; Aaron Strathearn, Peyton Sargent, Julia Smith, Sarah Klatt and Serene Liu.

Historian/CHS Report

Historian and President of the Clarendon Historical Society Melissa lerlan reported that the Historical Society buildings have been closed for the winter. Speakers for CHS 2019 programs are already set. Melissa informed that she video-taped her interviewed with Lew Bowen. He was interesting and humorous! A couple from Albion has given the town a plate from the Clarendon Centennial in 1910. Six year-books have been added to the collection on hand and at an estate sale, photos of John Murphy Lumber and folks from Clarendon and Holley were obtained.

It was reported that most of the Friday research group (nine people) are active in the Clarendon Historical Society.

Supervisor Report

Supervisor Richard Moy informed that a new sign for the park pavilion has been ordered from Takeform in Medina. Any closures and/or delays that impact the Town will be announced on Channel 13 or Spectrum News. LaBella Associates in Rochester is looking into getting natural gas in Clarendon; trying to negotiate with NYSEG. Legislator DeFilipps had informed Supervisor Moy that LeRoy schools had drilled their own natural gas wells for supply. Supervisor called the driller and was told that the Town of Clarendon has no natural gas in it because of the fault line. Supervisor informed he's been trying to get natural gas in the town for 18 years now. Supervisor informed that the Old Stone Store property is for sale; that the price has been lowered to \$49,900 and is being considered for historian artifacts and records storage housing, instead of an addition to the existing town hall which would cost approximately \$80,000. Town Board members did view and walk-through the building. Supervisor confirmed that the owner has agreed to accept \$47,000. Board members authorized submitting a purchase offer for the property at \$47,000.

Correspondence

The Town has received notice that Dave Moore of Sec-Tel Electric Alarm Service is retiring. The Town's security and fire alarm system will now be handled by Amherst Alarm. Due to recent changes to New York State Sexual Harassment Legislation, all town employees will need to attend sexual harassment training by October 2019. The change in garbage/recycling waste collection was discussed. Recycling collection will be every other week in a 96-gallon recycling tote beginning in July 2019. The first tote will be provided. The town's share of revenues of the Traffic Diversion Program for July through September 2018 was received in the amount of \$1733.33. USDA Rural Development has sent notice of the grant and loan approved for WIBA 12 and WD 13. Supervisor reported that WIBA 12 will most likely be ready to put out for bids in January. DEC has issued a permit renewal to Hanson Aggregates for quarry operations. It was reported that there is no water coming over the falls and no water pumped into the creek. Supervisor stated the pump is still broken; that they are pumping enough water to wash the stone, none to the falls. Board members will look into the matter. The Town of Byron has sent a copy of their proposed Comprehensive Plan and Environmental Assessment for review.

Old Business

Supervisor Moy has spoken to the Murray Supervisor; Murray will not give any money toward the painting of the tower. Supervisor reviewed that there is no signed contract with Murray regarding water. MCWA standards for painting the tower was \$700,000; if needs to be painted again in 20 years, inflation will raise that cost to one million four. Approximately one third of the water that comes through the tank is used by Murray. Supervisor will schedule a meeting with Superintendent Swanger and the Town of Murray to discuss the matter. Municipal Solutions is preparing a report in proceeding with the consolidation of WD9 and WD 9 extension. Charter Communications has not returned Supervisor Moy's call regarding their franchise agreement. Supervisor reported that at the last meeting with MCWA, the Town had requested revisions to MCWA's last document of proposal. MCWA has not submitted a revision yet. If they take over Clarendon Water, MCWA is requesting replacement of 160 water meters at \$40,000 or they will install and charge the residents the cost; if the tank needs to be rehabbed again sooner than 20 years out, MCWA will do the work and charge the town 1/5 of the cost. It would be MCWA's sole decision on whether or not the work would be needed.

New Business

The County wants to do a study on forming an Orleans County Water Authority; they've got a grant and are requesting each town contribute \$2000 toward the study. Board members not in agreement; no action was taken. Supervisor Moy scheduled a water workshop meeting to discuss options regarding the Clarendon Water System. Using the Holley School Policy as a guide, the Board adopted a new Sexual Harassment Policy to replace the existing policy in order to meet requirements due to new state legislation. OIO Ierlan and Supervisor Moy met with the Property Code personnel in Batavia. It has taken ten years, but Batavia has cleaned up the city properties and helped people to do so. Every Friday, Batavia holds Housing Court. Their policy about debris was viewed as a mechanism to bring people in. The Board adopted an amended Final 2019 Budget with changes in the water budgets.

Christmas is a time of traditions: ornamented Christmas trees, gift exchanges, and cookies left out for Santa, who stuffs stockings for good girls and boys. Some families have their own traditions, however-passed down through generations, developed from a unique event, or just looking to establish a new tradition for future generations.

We asked our readers to share some of their traditions with us, and heard about the unique traditions involving cooking, elves, decorations, pajamas and downtown walks.

HANDCRAFTED WITH LOVE

Marlene Loomis of Castile wrote about her family's tradition, which was born from the Perry Knitting Mill Co. "Our family's Christmas tradition started back in the 1960's by Gramma Griggs," she writes. "Back when my two brothers, two sisters and I were growing up, we went to Christmas Eve Mass in Filmore, NY. Every Christmas Eve before we went to bed, we got to open one present, our Christmas pajamas. My grandmother and mother used to work for the Perry Knitting Mill Co. in Filmore, so we had the most unusual pajamas of anybody. They were sewn together from mismatched parts... basically the mistakes, but we never knew that. We thought they were designed just for us!! "This tradition continued, even through our teen years; although the knitting mill closed, our parents continued the tradition. Then when I became a mother, I passed this tradition down to my daughters. At first they were homemade pajamas, then nighties, and then, as they grew up they wanted to pick out their own in the store. Now, all of my daughters, when they come home for our annual Christmas Eve story, either they come in their pajamas or bring their own all wrapped up. The bonus is the girls now buy the pajamas for mom and dad to unwrap. "Last year, I made all four grandchildren (AND PAPA) matching plaid pajama bottoms and black T-shirts for tops. Thank you Gramma Griggs for this gift of tradition and family."

(We'll hit the east side later) When the road narrows we find some great Christmas stores to check out. Later, the road again widens with many more shopping opportunities all the way down to the thruway overpass. It is impossible to run out of stores on this trip! Getting hungry? Lucky us! We are right near Ted's fabulous charcoal grilled hots! This is not a health trip so we just enjoy!

Afterwards, we head back north as we shop the east side of 78. When the road narrows and widens again we find ourselves at a giant farm market loaded with anything and everything for Christmas! From their yearly boiled ham sale to Christmas trees and candy they provide a rich hunting ground for our Christmas parties. We always spend some quality time shopping there and always leave with some orange chocolate for me and sponge candy for my wife. From there we again have many shopping opportunities all the way back to Lockport!

An Open Letter To The Residents Of Clarendon From Your Highway Superintendent

For your safety and well being during inclement weather, you should reduce your speed and drive according to the highway conditions. Winter driving conditions with icy and snow covered roads require more driving care.

If your vehicle becomes stranded, contact the Orleans County Sheriff's Department at 589-5527 and they will notify the appropriate Highway department.

SNOW REMOVAL

The law regarding the depositing of snow on highways, shoulders or ditches is as follows: "Section 1219 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law and Section 214 of the Highway Law of New York State specifically prohibit the placing or leaving of snow, ice or other substance upon any highway (which includes pavement, shoulders and ditches).

As a result, should these practices occur, Police Agencies will be notified of such occurrence(s) with the intent that summonses will be issued to the responsible person or persons.

MAILBOXES

Mailboxes damaged during snow removal: During and after significant snow storms, Highway Departments, in the course of plowing, receive phone calls regarding damage to mailboxes, either from snow plows: directly or from the force of snow being thrown by the plows. If such damage is indeed caused by snow removal, it is not done intentionally but is an unfortunate consequence of snow removal.

As far as the Highway Department replacing damaged mailboxes, it must be pointed out that there is no statutory or legal authority which grants a property owner or resident along a public highway any right to place a mailbox in a highway right-of-way.


That the mailbox is on town or county right of way as a courtesy to the postal service.

Thus, when the necessity of keeping the highway open conflicts with the individuals reception of the mail the latter must stand aside. The owner might even be compelled to remove the box under Highway Law #319.

From past experience, we have found that plastic mail boxes do not withstand the abuse of snow from the plows hitting them and are not recommended.

As a courtesy, the Highway Department will place a temporary box so that a resident can receive mail if their box is damaged by the plow but we will not replace any, fancy mailbox or post.

Mailbox posts with fancy supports are not recommended as they stick down under the box and give the wing plow something to get hold of. A box mounted directly on top of a treated 4 x 4 is the best. Please note illustrations. For further information contact your Highway Superintendent at 638-8547.
