CLARENDON TOWN BOARD Meeting Highlights - OCTOBER 2021

OPEN END

Aaron Kelly addressed the board regarding camping on his property on the Glidden Road. He didn't know that only two campers were allowed. There are no campsites available since the COVID pandemic. OIO Melissa lerlan suggested allowing an operating permit for a weekend; she would check the number of campers and inspect to ensure they are self-contained and inspect again when they leave to make sure no dumping is done. The Fire Company has electric plugs in their parking lot and a couple times a year, there are 6 to 8 campers there. Another property owner would take advantage of a permit as he has electric hook-ups on his property. Some people would take advantage and others will not be affected at all. Planning Chairmen Griggs suggested it be an Event Permit issued on an individual basis. Board members asked that the Planning Board prepare regulations for the zoning ordinance; to be reviewed/considered.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Tracy Chalker reported mowing town properties, working on the third roadside mowing and patching potholes in the roads. The crew has been cleaning up items including a hot water tank, tires and a steel drum with oil in it, dumped roadside. Shoulders have been replaced on Bennetts Corners Road, South Manning Road and Powerline Road. The old oil tank at the Town Hall has been removed. The third guarter water reading have been completed and bills have been sent. Trucks are being prepared for the winter season. Alarms at the highway barns have been going off. Superintendent is looking into getting cameras for the property. Superintendent Chalker attended the fall conference and reported it very educational. The highway department has been receiving many deer pick-up calls. Superintendent Chalker requested consideration for ARPA funding to purchase radialread water meters for the 258 houses that are still probe-read. Cost is estimated between \$66,000 - \$68,000 for the switch over. Currently it takes two employees two days to read meters. If they were all radialreads, it would cut the job down to one person and would take considerably less time. Two highway employees were quarantined for one week due to COVID regulations. Tree limbs have been trimmed. There is a large tree at the Hillside Cemetery that needs to be removed; in the veteran side with a lot of gravestones under it. It was suggested that we get a service with a crane available; not just a climber. Superintendent is waiting for an estimate from Arnold's Tree Service. There is also a long log approximately 18 inches in diameter, 30 to 40 feet long that is estimated to weigh 3,000-4,000 pounds that needs to come out.

HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Historian Melissa lerlan submitted the following written report: The Interact Club, which is run through the Holley Rotary Club, spent time at Hillside Cemetery on October 10th and the turn-out was overwhelming. There were over 30 kids and several adults from Rotary. I think at least 100 headstones were cleaned. It was very rewarding to see the group actually get excited once they saw what a difference cleaning made. It sure doesn't go unnoticed. All supplies were purchased by Rotary and we have brushes to use again next year if they decide to come back.

Joni Robishaw spent time over the last weekend pulling weeds and planting some bulbs in front of the Old Stone Store. It really was a nice

gesture and much appreciated. Wait until you see them next spring! I was asked by the Town of Yates to restore six of their historical markers before they celebrate their Bicentennial next year. They are paying for the supplies. I had only ever repainted one in that area by request. I see this as an opportunity to work with other historians and maybe compile information about the signs for use by all. I am a member of the Orleans County Historical Association and we have talked about doing a book on all the markers in Orleans County. One hasn't been done since the year 2000 and at that time, there were 78 markers. There are currently 136. I have a homeschool group visiting the museum tomorrow. They will tour the barn and I will tell them about Carl Akeley as they are studying animals, habitats, etc. Good opportunity to brag about our famous former resident!

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Dick Moy thanked Superintendent Chalker and the Highway Crew for handling the overdue water bills situation so well. All problems are resolved but one account.

CORRESPONDENCE

The town has received payments from New York State DOT; \$41,473.95 for PAVE NY and \$35,150.54 for WIRPS. Orleans Economic Development Agency has sent the town's PILOT payment for 2021 for Falls Rail Road in the amount of \$36.54.Genesee/Finger Lakes Regional Planning Council has sent notice of upcoming training. The Department of Public Service has sent a request for survey information on broadband service on line www.empirestatebroadband.com; for people without broadband. The County is paying to expand services countywide. Orleans County Board of Elections has sent notice of the November 2, 2021 General Election and a sample ballot. The Orleans County Chamber of Commerce will hold its 23rd Annual Awards Ceremony where Ken DeRoller and John DeFilipps will be presented with Service to the Community Awards. New York State Agriculture and Markets have sent inspection reports of the County Dog Control Officer and of the County Municipal Shelter. The town needs to have an agreement with the County to correct the shelter inspection report. The NYS Public Service Commission has sent an update regarding the solar project in Town of Byron.

OLD BUSINESS

The Town Board adopted a Resolution accepting the Tentative Budget for the Year 2022 and scheduled a public hearing to consider the Preliminary Budget for the Year 2022 for Nov. 1, 2021 at 6:00 PM.

NEW BUSINESS

The Board authorized the old 1000-gallon oil tank from the Town Hall be sold at auction through Auctions International on the internet, adopted a Memorandum of Agreement for Animal Control Services with Orleans County and scheduled a Special Meeting to authorize relevied water and mowing charges onto January 2022 tax bills with an additional \$100 penalty. The meeting will be on Nov. 1, 2021 immediately following the Preliminary Budget Hearing. The Board authorized Supervisor Moy to sign the proposal from G&G Municipal Consulting, 131 S. Union St., Spencerport, NY 14559 for Services to conduct a Median Household Income Survey for proposed WD#14; At a cost of \$3590.00 plus postage. Discussion was held regarding vacation and personal time to be paid to former highway employee Eric Collyer. The Board approved payment of two years unused vacation and personal time as authorized at the January 21, 2020 meeting.

History Outside Our Borders

As the historian for The Town of Clarendon it is my job to educate people on our history. I collect and preserve artifacts pertaining to Clarendon from its very beginning until now. I also believe it is important to know about our surrounding towns and villages.



I have always tried to attend programs at other historical societies to learn something new. Local resident Jim Patt mentioned to me one day that there was an old historic marker located in Oakfield that was in need of repair. I have enjoyed repainting these historic markers for the last several years in Orleans County so I decided to contact Laurie Marks-Nanni of the Oakfield Historical Society and see if they would let me take the sign. This sign actually had a piece missing! Fortunately, I have a few contacts that have helped me in the past to weld signs that were cracked before I repainted them. This was a whole different story. My friend took a piece of a donor sign and cut it in the shape of the missing portion of this marker and welded it all back together. You would never know it un-

less you saw it beforehand. He did such a beautiful job.

Did you know that the Town of Oakfield was the home to one of the largest Native American forts? The Seneca tribe built a large 10-acre fort outside of Oakfield, which was still standing in the 18th century. The Seneca's settled Oakfield long-before the English settlers started to move into the area in the early 1800s. What is still there today is called the best-preserved Indian mounds and earth-works in New York State. Previous archaeological digs have been able to identify structures and what life was like inside the fort. The trees on-site span over 300 years. The fort is another amazing example of Genesee County's connection to United States and North American history.
