Meeting Highlights - August 2022

Supervisor Moy recognized Jonathan Nelson, Boy Scout, in attendance with his father Kurt. Jonathan is working toward a Citizenship in Society merit badge.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Chalker reported that the highway crew has been working on roads with the Towns of Shelby, Barre, Murray and Albion through the workshare program. Two weeks ago there was a water main break in District 13 on Munger Road. When repairing it, it appeared that the line was not bedded in stone as it should have been; was all rock underneath. The highway crew continues to mow town properties. The new mower is in; Superintendent Chalker did a 'test mow' at the town hall. There were no problems so it was taken to the Hillside Cemetery for use. There have been three burials at Hillside Cemetery. Superintendent Chalker reported another tree down in the cemetery and there are five others that are dead and need to come down. Seventeen new digital meters have been installed in the last two days; twenty more to do. Superintendent Chalker has been accommodating residents in evenings when necessary. The second roadside mowing is 2/3 complete. The county used the boom mower in town to mow our roadsides way back to improve line of site at intersections. Several dead deer have been removed from the roadside.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman Dave Griggs submitted the following written report: 06-26-2022 (Regular Meeting) Public Comment: Resident Deb Longer- Stated that there are many inconsistencies in the application package submitted by Saturn Power. (Road name etc.) Chairman Griggs informed her that our engineering firm had reviewed the package and submitted a list of corrections to be made to Saturn Power. He also stated that he had identified several clerical anomalies and had sent that information to Saturn for correction as well. A discussion was had about the definition of "line of Sight" versus "visible". Resident Nick Basile- raised concerns about the buffer being different in the winter as opposed to the rest of the year. Chairman Griggs informs the group that the Planning Board is doing as much as they could within reason to address this. Any trees selected will be a non-deciduous variety. Resident Laura Kingdollar- Observed that a 3,000-acre solar farm is about 10 percent of the town of Elba and Barre. She questioned whether Clarendon can set a percentage of land that they will allow to be used for solar projects? She was informed that any changes to the current Zoning Ordinance should be addressed with the Town Board for their consideration. SD 22-11 David Miller, Pre-conference for site plan review 4115 Bennetts Corners Road, construct a 30' x 40' metal building. Survey map showing setbacks for the building has been submitted. Building is for storage only. No issues noted. The applicant requested to waive the pre-conference. A motion was made, seconded and approved to waive the pre-conference. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve SD 22-11. SP 16-01 Erin Neale Clarendon Gun Shop 4257 Hindsburg Rd. Has been Inspected, Fee has been paid, No outstanding complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve renewal of SP 16-01. SP 22-10 Saturn Power Project- South Holley Rd. Chairman Griggs Informs the Board members that the Town has received notification from Saturn Power Inc. indicating they are discontinuing pursuit of an application for a Special Use Permit to build and operate a Commercial solar project at 5122 South Holley Road due to a disagreement with the land owner.

A motion was made, seconded and approved to acknowledge receipt of the letter from Saturn Power withdrawing their application for a Special Use Permit for a Commercial solar project at 5122 South Holley Road. This project is no longer under consideration. Site Plan Application- Board member White pointed out that multiple forms exist for the site plan review application. He would like to standardize the form. Chairman Griggs and OIO Ierlan will explore the issue and bring something for the board to review at the next meeting. Subdivision review checklist- Board member Bosch is still working on a draft. A motion was made, seconded and approved to table review of the checklist.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Richard Moy reported results from the interview with Tim Hungerford and S&P Global Ratings bringing the town's rating from A minus to A. This credit rating has an impact on the interest rate that the town pays on borrowed funding. All water districts are in the positive, which helps a lot. The report gave the town high praise for the way our money is managed. Supervisor read aloud the schedule of work and agencies involved for a SEQR review on WD#14 to give Scout Nelson an idea of how much is involved. He also informed that the town board needs to meet once every month to at least pay the bills!

CORRESPONDENCE

Orleans County has sent notice of 2023 premium for 2023 self-insurance. Clarendon will pay \$118,564.00; \$110,666.00 for Town and \$7,898.00 for Fire Company. Proceeds from the Traffic Diversion Program in the 2nd quarter 2022 were received from the county in the amount of \$840.00. The Town received notice of change in status for the South Holley Road Solar Project. The project was for 88 acres; the property owner now wants to utilize 1000 acres for such a project. Saturn did comment that they didn't think this would be appropriate use of 1000 acres of farm land; the project application has been withdrawn. The Town received updates on the Heritage Wind Project in the Town of Barre. The Town's dues for membership in the Association of Towns for 2023 will be \$1,099.00. ARPA revenue of \$177,999.46 has been received from the NYS Comptroller. Orleans County Treasurer sent a check for \$3266.71 in payment of the second roadside mowing.

OLD BUSINESS

Discussion was held regarding the payment cycle currently allowed for water bills. Currently the town gives 30 days to pay the bill; then sends notice giving 30 more days to make payment before shut-off notice tags are hung and then tagged again when shut off. By then the town is into the next billing cycle. Board members felt it was too long. Monroe County Water Authority gives 21 days to pay your bill, then another 20 days before shut-off. Currently after the 30-day collection period, the water billing clerk has to run reports, mail out letters, etc... Superintendent Chalker reviewed that the Highway cost for procedure is in excess of \$471.50 (fuel cost, labor and time). This doesn't include clerical work. The Town Board approved changing payment regulations; Section 22: Discontinuance of Service in the Rules & Regulations. Discussion was also held regarding the maintenance fee currently charged on the quarterly water bills for future waterline and water tower replacement/repair. The Town Board approved annual billing for the maintenance fee to all parcels located within a water district; Section 29: Billing in the Rules & Regulations. *(A complete copy of Rules & Regulations is available at the Clerk's Office or at townofclarendon.org on Highway/Water Department page).*

Hillside Sketches

One year, five months and thirteen days. Such a sad headstone for the daughter of Col. Hubbard Rice and his wife Irene.

Hubbard Rice was born in 1795 and died in 1888. His life was extremely long in comparison with his daughter's.

Born in Pompey, Onondaga County, he was 16 years old when his family moved to Orleans County. His father settled on a farm which was the north western portion of what eventually became the Village of Holley. He assisted his father in clearing the land of heavy growth of timber. Later he helped to survey when the Village of Holley was laid out. After the burning of Lewiston during the war of 1812, Rice, then a boy of 18, enlisted and served through a campaign on the Niagara frontier.

The Holley Standard reported that the first frame building in the Village of Holley was built by Hubbard Rice in 1817.

Hubbard Rice was part of the early Militia system in New York State. Military spirit in the region ran high and the settlers of the region and these companies were formed. Clarendon formed their militia company in 1814 and it flourished until about 1843. Col. Hubbard Rice was part of the 25th regiment of artillery and was a commanding officer.

In 1825 he moved from the Village of Holley to the Town of Clarendon. Col. Hubbard Rice, Schubael Lewis and John Stevens all built beautiful homes of limestone block which was taken from the fields around the Stevens home on Holley Byron Road. Two of these homes are standing and are still private residences. Unfortunately, the Hubbard home was demolished in 2008 due to severe neglect and damage which made it unsafe.

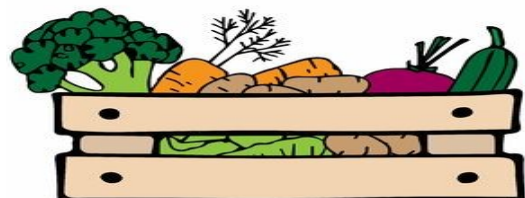

A polio survivor's courage inspired a loving legacy of giving

She was only 11 years old and understandably frightened. Told by doctors in the spring of 1947 that she had this mysterious-sounding disease called polio, Christine Wagner looked up from her hospital bed and asked her ashen-faced parents if she would ever walk again. "They couldn't answer me," she recalled in a conversation I had with her several years ago. "I was just a young girl with my whole life ahead of me. Nobody knew what to expect." The next several years would be harrowing because back then we didn't know what we do now about polio. We weren't sure how to treat this disabling disease that was causing widespread paralysis and death. We didn't have proven vaccines at our disposal. It was a scary, medical mystery we were trying to solve on the fly. Christine wound up spending 18 months in Rochester hospitals and convalescent homes. Her treatments often were tortuous. Therapy sessions included everything from stretching atrophied muscles until they felt as if they were going to snap to placing boiling-hot towels on her uncooperative legs. There were times when the pain was so excruciating she screamed. Somehow, through it all, she kept the faith. Doctors, nurses, therapists and loved ones marveled at her determination, her courage. Christine remained upbeat, kept envisioning a future without crutches, leg braces and supportive corsets. Miraculously, she wound up walking again. And by lifting herself up out of that hospital bed she would raise the spirits of an entire community for decades to come. Sadly, Christine Wagner Welch died the other day at age 86, following a battle with post-polio syndrome, which had confined her to a wheelchair these past two decades but couldn't break her resolve. She leaves behind a husband, John Welch, four children, nine grandchildren, and one, remarkable legacy. Perhaps no one was more inspired by her than her father, former Rochester *Times-Union* sportswriter Charlie Wagner. He was so grateful to the Infantile Paralysis Foundation (now the March of Dimes) for taking care of his daughter's huge medical expenses that he searched for a meaningful way to say thanks. With the help of his former boss, Matt Jackson, they formed the Rochester Press-Radio Club and launched the Day of Champions Children's Charity dinner in 1950. Sixty-nine more dinners would follow, with Muhammad Ali, Willie Mays, Mickey Mantle, Arnold Palmer, Jim Brown, Peyton Manning, Patrick Mahomes, Jim Kelly, and Cal Ripken, Jr. among the sports icons who came to town. Since the initial banquet, the club has raised nearly \$2 million for local charities, and although COVID threw a monkey wrench into plans, with no dinner being held since 2019, the fundraising efforts continue with an annual golf tournament. "People like to thank me for the dinner, but the real thanks belong to my dad," Christine told me. "He was a great father who did a lot of good things behind the scenes. He was a lot of fun to be around, a real people person. He led a great life." So, too, did his daughter. And although she eschewed credit for the banquet that once was regarded as the premier sports dinner in the country during its Hickok Belt Award days, the reality is that she was the source of inspiration for the club that launched it. Without her dogged fight against the ravages of polio, it never would have been formed by Wagner, Jackson and 10 other kind-hearted sportswriters and sportscasters. "When I was going through those treatments, I really didn't consider myself courageous," she said. "I was too young to understand what courage was. I was just an 11-year-old girl and I was really, really afraid because I was in pain and there was so much uncertainty. Doctors weren't exactly sure what they were dealing with. My motivation was the same as other polio patients. I just wanted to be able to do the things I used to do. I wanted to be able to ride my bike and play tag, things like that." She wound up doing those things again – and so much more. After graduating from Our Lady of Mercy High School, she landed a job logging programs and commercials for radio and television station WVET. Her family became her pride and joy. She and her husband were married for 63 years. They reveled in spending time with their children – Marty, Kathy, Eileen and Johanna – and grandchildren. And they enjoyed attending the annual Day of Champion dinners, where Christine's appearance was always acknowledged from the dais. In the late 1970s, the club began presenting an award in her father's name that, for years, honored sports writing excellence and later was changed to recognize people who had devoted their lives to promoting local sports. The first Christine Wagner Welch Inspiration Award was presented in 2008, fittingly, to Christine herself. Since that time, a different inspirational figure in our community has been honored, and the list of winners is quite impressive, including everyone from a college softball coach who continued coaching while being treated for breast cancer to a nun who spent 50 years teaching at and supervising a school dedicated to children and adults with special needs. "I know Chris really appreciated having her name associated with that award, and meeting the people who won it," her husband told me. "She inspired them and they inspired her." The last time I saw Christine was at a Press-Radio Club awards picnic at Frontier Field in early June. Her health had deteriorated dramatically since I last saw her three years ago. I wanted to make sure I thanked her again for inspiring all of us. She wasn't able to say much, but she didn't have to. Her smile said it all. It was the smile of a grateful, 86-year-old woman who had lived a long, rich life after refusing to give up hope in a time of great uncertainty more than seven decades ago.

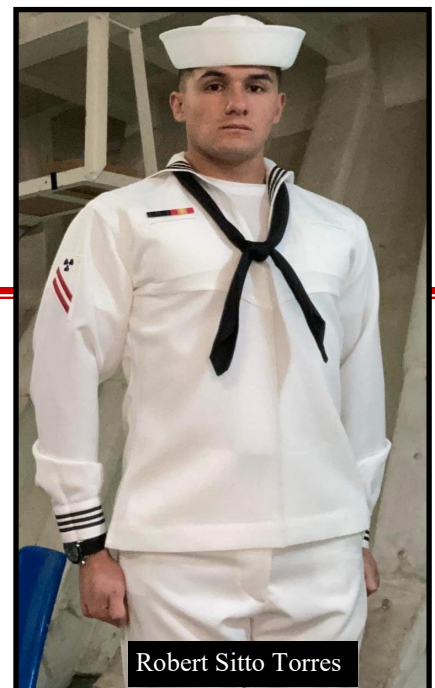
