

CLARENDON TOWN BOARD Meeting Highlights - November, 2023

At the November 1, 2023 special meeting the town board authorized that the unpaid balance for zoning violations and mowing services be re-assessed and added to the January 2024 Town/ County property tax bills. On November 20, 2023 the town board met with representatives of the Clarendon Fire Company to discuss and consider the fire company contract for 2024. Some amendments to the proposed contract were agreed upon and changed. The fire company proposed a 5-year contract, the town requested a 1-year; accepted by both was a 3-year contract. The fire company will come back to the town with slightly higher annual contract amounts because it is not for 5 years. Insurance coverage for other fire companies on mutual aid for Clarendon will be looked into by the town and the fire company. Prior to the regular meeting in November, review of possible ARPA funded projects were discussed and considered; funds remaining unspent and available for project designation total \$92,000. Different town hall repairs were mentioned: front door/ frame to town clerk's office is rusted; repair/replace base and fascia boards and window trim as needed - wrap in vinyl or aluminum; electric service entrance cable and repair gutters. The Clarendon Offices sign posts are rotted at the base; will contact the person making the Welcome signs for a sign similar to replace the offices sign. Discussion was held regarding security posts outside the town hall doors to prevent vehicles from smashing into the building. It was said that the current salt shed will last another 5 years; discussion was held regarding replacing its walls. Superintendent Chalker informed that the loader used to be changed-out every three to four years to have more value for its sale. Superintendent will contact HCH regarding a grant application for a loader. Any funds left from ARPA after town hall repairs will go toward purchase of a loader. Board members acknowledged the passing of former Clarendon resident Pat Giglio who gave the property at Hillside Cemetery by the creek to the Town; it is beautiful there. Pat was also very involved with the American Legion and is fondly remembered for selling poppies on Memorial Day.

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Tracy Chalker reported that the trucks are completely winterized and the crew has already had a spot salt run due to black ice on the bridges. Multiple deer have been removed from the roadsides and the highway crew replaced/ repaired the drain in the fire company parking lot. Two graves were dug for burials in Hillside Cemetery and dead Ash trees have been cleaned up. The new pick-up truck is in; in parking lot if anyone wants to see it. One hundred nineteen red tags were hung on residences for non-payment of water bills. This process took two employees three hours to fill out the tags and 20 hours to hang them. Superintendent suggested that the board may want to reconsider going back to a second mailing prior to tagging houses. With the second mailing, red tags hung were down to 30 or 40. Supervisor informed that this has been the first year ever that there were no water re-levies to put on tax bills. Clerk suggested the water clerk fill out the tags instead; that the highway department just pick them up and hang them.

Councilman Major thought it a good idea. The crew added material and regraded McAllister Drive. Superintendent reported a lot of road name signs missing; an inventory determined 20 signs at 10 different intersections along with information signs (curve, driveway etc.) The Sheriff's Department has been called. Cost to replace the missing signs is figured to be \$5,000. The third roadside mowing is complete and the mowing equipment cleaned and put away. The town received a letter from Mack Trucks informing of a safety recall; reflectiveness of the turn signals is not visible enough and need to be replaced. Two of our trucks have the warranty recall but Mack doesn't have the materials to replace them yet.

The Planning Board reviewed the application and accompanying survey map and decided that minor lot line corrections were required. A motion was made, seconded and approved to table for lot line corrections. 11-14-2023 (Regular meeting) SP 22-01, Erich Hoak, All American Diesel Service, 5267 County Line Road. Fee has been paid, Inspected, no outstanding complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved to grant renewal of Special Use Permit. SD 23-06 - Pre-Conference for subdivision/Merger, 4909 Upper Holley Road. tax id# 109.-1-39, Richard & Wendy Applegate. Requested Lot line corrections have not been completed by the surveyor. A motion was made, seconded and approved to table for lot line corrections. Planning Board calendar - Planning Board members reviewed the draft of the 2024 Planning Board calendar. No issues were noted. Chairman Griggs to submit to the Town Board at the December meeting. 2024 appointment recommendations- Planning Board members discussed and tentatively approved 2024 appointment recommendations to be submitted to the Town Board for their consideration and approval. Chairman Griggs to submit to the Town Board at the December meeting.

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Richard Moy reported that the county legislature has appointed all the town supervisors to the Orleans County Shared Services Committee. The town will be looking to obtain financing in January for Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 14. The Christmas Parade this year will be on December 8th; approval to close the road has been given. Revenues were received: \$2328.00 from Traffic Diversion Program for the 3rd quarter in 2023; \$3920.00 from Auctions International for sale of 2013 Ford pickup truck; \$300.00 from Orleans County for DWI Convictions 2023. Ag & Markets has performed an inspection on the County Dog Control Officer and reports services rated Satisfactory.



CORRESPONDENCE

Notice has been received from the Association of Towns informing of its annual meeting and training. NYS Ag & Markets has performed an inspection on the Municipal Animal Shelter and reports services rated unsatisfactory. The Orleans County Planning Board sent notice that Clarendon's representatives' terms of service on the County Planning Board expires on 12/31/2023 and requests two nominations for new three-year terms. NYS Comptroller has sent reimbursement due to the town for overpayment of court revenue in August.

NEW BUSINESS

The Town Board scheduled a public hearing for comments on the proposed Comprehensive Plan for the Town of Clarendon; to be held on December 19, 2023 at the Town Hall at 6:15 PM. The Plan is available at the Town Clerk's Office or on the home page of the town website - townofclarendon.org. The Town Board adopted resolutions introducing two proposed local laws; A Local Law to Provide for Senior Citizen Tax Exemption Pursuant to Section 467 of the Real Property Tax Law and Define Income Limits for the Same and A Local Law to Provide for a Partial Exemption from Real Property Taxes to Persons with Disabilities & Limited Incomes Pursuant to Section 459-C of the Real Property Tax Law and Define Income Limits for the Same. Public hearings for these laws will be held at the Town Hall on December 19, 2023 beginning at 6:30 PM with the regular meeting to immediately follow. Supervisor Moy supplied information on the New York Cooperative Liquid Assets Securities System (NYCLASS), a local government investment pool (LGIP) and asked that the board members review it for the December meeting. The Town Board adopted a resolution accepting the contract with Monroe Ambulance at a cost of \$25,350 for next year; conditioned that authorization of the same is approved by the involved municipalities of Albion, Barre, Gaines, Carlton, Murray and Kendall.
