CLARENDON TOWN BOARD

Meeting Highlights - May, 2025

HIGHWAY/WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Superintendent Tracy Chalker was absent from the meeting for attendance at water school training. The following written report was submitted: Road signs have been installed on South Holley, South Manning, Munger, LaDue and Hinds Roads. The 403 truck is back from Beam Mack after def issues repaired. Multiple downed trees on multiple roads have been cleaned up. Town properties are being mowed, including Hillside Cemetery until the seasonal employee comes back; it is tough to keep up this year due to the weather. All trucks have been pressure washed and flood washed to get the salt off. A culvert pipe has been changed at 17030 LaDue Road. Three water connections were pushed; after four attempts, one was assisted by Burrow Brothers due to rocks on Route 31A. Plow frames have been removed from the trucks and bumpers attached. New Guinea Road has been graded and 308.32 ton of stone added; Barre assisted – work share program. Approximately 500 ton of 5/8" crusher run has been hauled in for work on road shoulders. Stone has been hauled to Lusk Road; there were two burials at Hillside Cemetery and wood chips have been restocked for residents to take from the pile out front of the garage. Two people with trucks went to Shelby for work share program; Dan Scroger will run the loader for the project. The crew assisted the Village of Holley by hauling stone. The new garage overhead doors are installed. The Village of Holley borrowed the town's mini and there were 26 UFPO's this month. We are going over the mowers; changing blades, oil and a spindle. 119 Red tags were hung for late payment. There were no shut-offs; after making phone calls, everyone paid. Routine water maintenance continues and the 2024 Annual Water Quality Report is complete. The first roadside mowing has been started. Two bulk water meters have been hooked up; purchase of two new bulk water meter set-ups is necessary. Two failed annual inspection and they are too old to rebuild. The crew attended an equipment show and storm water management course in Genesee County. Superintendent is gone for the week to attend water school training. Supplies needed have been purchased for the cemetery.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Chairman Dave Griggs submitted the following written report:

04-22-2025 (regular meeting)

SP 05-03 - Special Permit renewal -- American Tower Corp 16640 Munger Rd. Inspection done, fee paid, no outstanding complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved to grant renewal.

SP 96-002 -Special Permit renewal - Heron Falls 17144 Fourth Section Rd. Inspection done, fee paid, no outstanding complaints. A motion was made, seconded and approved to grant renewal.

SP 19-11 - Special Permit renewal- Vans 4530 Holley Byron Rd. Inspection done, fee paid, no outstanding complaints. Permit holder is requesting to modify this permit to add additional parking spots designated for drop off and for 10 cars instead of 5. A motion was made, seconded and approved to table this item pending further detail from the applicant on this proposal.

SD 25-04 - Pre-Conference for BUILDING LOT APPROVAL Brandon Johnson Fourth Section Rd. tax id# 97.-1-38. Chairman Griggs reviews the application with the board. Setbacks for house and barn are in compliance. Curb cut already exists and was approved by the DOT. Septic will be engineered raised bed and water district 4 is available for hook up. No significant issues were identified. Applicant requested waiver of

the pre- conference. A motion was made, seconded and approved to waive the pre-conference. A motion was made, seconded and approved to grant building lot approval

SP 25-01 - Pre-Conference for Special Use Permit - Article VII, Section 721 - PARKING & STORAGE OF COMMERCIAL TRUCKS & CONSTRUCTION EQUIPMENT, Mike Boss 4630 Bennetts, Corners Rd. tax id# 99.-1-41.123. Chairman Griggs reviews the application with the board. Applicant was asked to describe what his intentions are for that property, how many vehicles you're looking to store, etc. Applicant states that he is looking for three (3) - four (4) truck units. Applicant was apprised by chairman Griggs that the property failed to comply with several requirements of the zoning ordinance for that number of truck units he is requesting due to insufficient lot frontage, insufficient driveway setback. There were several additional concerns raised regarding that location, (blind drive, 6-ton weight limitation of the road, 31A/ Bennetts Corners intersection) were all discussed. Applicant was informed that at this point in time this application request could not be approved and he was limited to one (1) truck unit at that location.. Applicant was also apprised that if he still wished to pursue this application for additional truck units at this location further he would need to go before the Zoning Board and request two (2) variances, one for the frontage and one for the driveway setbacks, in addition there would need to be a sign off from the Town Board regarding any waiver to the roads weight limitation. A motion was made, seconded and approved to table further action on this application to allow the applicant time to decide whether he wished to pursue this application further.

05-13-2025 (regular meeting) Meeting canceled due to insufficient agenda items.

HISTORIAN/HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

Historian and CHS Chairman submitted the following written report: This past weekend I had around 20 students and 2 teachers come to Hillside Cemetery to clean headstones. Lance Babcock was present to assist the interact club and he along with a few others helped to upright a few headstones and we actually uncovered one that was buried and in several pieces. This was sponsored by the Holley Rotary and the students are members of Interact Club. This was also their Clean Sweep weekend. There were around 100 students involved in other projects. One at the VFW was to restore the brick walkway and spruce up around the WWII tank. The cemetery tours are scheduled for the summer and I will be hosting one at the Robinson Cemetery at the corner of Glidden and Rt. 237 on August 10th.

Tomorrow evening is the first speaker at the Clarendon Historical Society this year. Dennis Car will be talking about the rural cemetery movement of the 19th century. Our Hillside cemetery and Mt. Albion are examples of the type of cemeteries that were very popular at the time. Bicentennial events are going on in the county and people can see what's happening by going to the website. <https://www.oreanscountytourism.com/> The Orleans County Historian is coordinating things for the Bicentennial Committee to assist with. I am a member of this committee. We will be prepping another ox and having it painted by an artist. I will have the cemetery chapel open on Memorial Day with displays for people to see after they do the ceremony in Hillside Cemetery. I was asked to restore another historical marker from a woman in Waterport so I am working on this and one other from Millville which Erich Hoak from All American Diesel in Clarendon welded as it was broken.

Comfortable, with this foursome of TRAVELERS, from some other place in time.


What or whom are they? These TRAVELERS from beyond the veil, why do they frequent this place? I long to learn of their tale!

SUPERVISOR REPORT

Supervisor Richard Moy read aloud his letter of resignation as Supervisor, effective May 31, 2025 and advised the board on its options; let the deputy supervisor serve as acting supervisor to fill the term or appoint someone to fill that vacancy. Councilman Marc Major submitted his resignation from the Councilman position pending his appointment as Supervisor. The Town Board did appoint Marc Major as Supervisor effective June 1, 2025 to fill the remainder of the term, to expire December 31, 2025. Board members in agreement that the now vacant Council seat be filled; Frederick Seeman III was appointed to fill the Councilman position, effective June 1, 2025 for the remainder of the term, to expire December 31, 2025.

CORRESPONDENCE

GOGov Apps has sent a quote for annual renewal of notification & alerts to citizens at \$4492.00. Supervisor reviewed that the license period of 11/1/2024-10/31/2025 was purchased at \$4092.00 with ARPA funding. Currently there are only 80 citizens that use the application. Supervisor has contacted the company regarding price negotiation; is waiting for a return call. NYS DEC has sent its conditional approval of Hanson Aggregates Clarendon Quarry mining. The town has received \$89.00 in Traffic Diversion Program revenues for the 1st quarter 2025.

OLD BUSINESS

There is no news on the town's request for speed limit change on Brown Schoolhouse, Upper Holley and Glidden Roads. Water Improvement Benefit Area No. 14 is on hold. RDA approved grant funding for the project but it was not enough to make the debt charge to citizens affordable. Four additional requests have been submitted for additional funding; one has been denied; waiting on the others. Supervisor reported his conversation with the Chair of the County Association of Municipalities revealed that attendance to the monthly meetings is intended for elected officials. Pending on presentation subject, other town personnel can attend (Planning Board members).

NEW BUSINESS

Pursuant to personnel change in the Supervisor position, the Town Board authorized Allied CPAs to perform a fiscal audit for the year ending 2024 at a cost not to exceed \$9750.00.

Hillside Sketches

David N. Pettengill was born in Ogden, NY on July 8, 1820. His family moved to Clarendon in 1823 and he spent his entire life living there.

For 12 years he was employed as the postmaster. David served as town supervisor and school commissioner for several terms. In 1859 he was elected Justice of the Peace and held this office until his death. David married Eliza Robinson, daughter of Chauncey Robinson who was a staunch and outspoken supporter of the Abolitionist movement. Walter True Pettengill was their son and the author of the letter which is directly responsible for the historical marker for the underground railroad at the house he lived in as a boy in the village of Holley. In 1917 True wrote a letter to a relative that described seeing a runaway slave sleeping in his grandfather Chauncey Robinsons house. Presumably he was headed to Canada to escape and live as a free person.

David Pettengill died in 1886 from apoplexy which is a term used then for a stroke or brain hemorrhage. He was just 66 years old. He was laid to rest in the family plot at Hillside Cemetery.



On August 14, 1949 a monument was dedicated to memorialize the soldiers from the area. On August 14, 2021 the monument was rededicated and a historical marker was placed during the ceremony. Since then, a motorist had an accident and the historical marker was broken and damaged. Erich Hoak, owner of All American Diesel Service in



Clarendon welded the sign back together and it was repainted. The town of Murray placed it back at the site. A big thanks goes out to the people who were involved.



The beaver is New York State's official mammal. It is unmistakable due to its large body size (26-65 pounds, 25-35 inches) and broad flattened tail (9-10 inches long, 6 inches wide), not to mention the characteristically altered habitat in which it resides. A unique feature of the beaver is a second set of eyelids. The secondary eyelids, known as a nictitating membrane, are white and form an inner eyelid. Additionally, their ears and nose can close while underwater! Beavers have lips that close behind the incisors which allow them to gnaw underwater. These large incisors are continuously growing and are kept at a manageable length by the gnawing action beaver use to gather food. Their rich, dense fur ranges in color from yellow-brown to almost black. Webbed hind feet serve to compliment the extraordinary swimming ability of the beaver. The second hind toe has a split nail, which appears to aid in grooming. The beaver's tail is flat, which helps them swim throughout aquatic habitats. It serves other purposes as well. The tissue beneath the scaly outer layer, which is actually compressed, grouped hairs, contains many blood vessels at its base. It serves as a thermoregulatory tool (helps them to maintain a consistent body temperature). Blood flows from the surface of the tail, thereby minimizing heat loss. It also assists in fat storage.

Richard (Dick) Moy, after serving the Clarendon Community as Supervisor for twenty-four years has decided to retire. As he well deserves to 'rest', he will be very missed at the Town Hall. Dick began his local government involvement as one of three Assessors before moving on to Supervisor. At the resignation of Supervisor Mike Bove, Dick was appointed to fill the seat on May 8, 2001. During his tenure, Public Water Districts 6 through 13 were established. As the Chief Financial Officer of the town, Dick worked hard on budgets; the tax rate being \$5.19 per thousand in 2001 dropping to \$4.29 per thousand in 2025. Dick served on county committees and attended meetings and gatherings making sure Clarendon was recognized. He was available to residents not only during his office hours weekday mornings, but whenever he was needed. Thank you Dick. Don't be a stranger to the Town Hall!
